FOURTEEN MEN LEAVE MONDAY FOR ARMY DUTY

Fourteen Gilans will leave for Fort Douglas, Utah, to report for active duty on Monday evening at 8 from the community stage in Canal and the amphitheatre in Butte. George Kihara of 52-S-D is leaving from Salt Lake City, Utah.

The Butte boys will be honored at a short ceremony from 7 p.m. The chairman for the service will be Harry H. Nishimura, chairman of the Butte Community Council. The speakers will be Shigeki Ikeda representing the Parents-Relatives Assn., and probably W. C. "Tom" Sawyer, who will represent the appoint personnel.

The Canal program is undecided.

Trial Set For Arson Suspects

Four men, two of them brothers - AWOL from the Army and the other two, brothers and civilian residents of Auburn, Calif., will go to trial before a jury and Superior Judge Lowell Sparks in Placer County Superior Court at Auburn on April 17 on charges of arson and attempting to dynamite a building.

The four were arrested in connection with the attempted burning and dynamiting of the Sumio Doi ranch, near Auburn, on the nights of Jan. 17 and 18.

The two soldiers, Pvt. Elmer R. Johnson, 20, and his brother Alvin, 18, have been held in the Auburn County jail unable to make a \$5,000 cash or \$10,000 personal bond.

The two other brothers, James Edward Watson, 38, and his brother Charles, 35, posted bonds in the amount of \$10,000 each.

SUNRISE SERVICES WILL HERALD EASTER SUNDAY

Canal's morning worship will be held from 10 at the Church. The sermon will be delivered by the Rev. S. A. Stewart. Baptismal services will be conducted by the Rev. Paul Osumi and the Rev. Stewart.

In the evening, the Butte Pilgrim Fellowship will have as its guest speaker, the Rev. Douglas W. J. Noble, chaplain of the "Chapel on Wheels," at chapel 40. De'votional chairman will be Robert Hayashida.

The Canal young people will leave the Fox Butte where they will conduct a sunset service at 6 p.m.

WHY RISK FOOLISHLY

Just to remind ourselves that it's easy to get hurt but difficult to heal, we print this precaution.

Young people often hang on the backs of the intercamp busses to ride from block to block and from camp to camp. For youngsters, it may be rather adventurous, and parents may say, "Oh let those kids have their fun." But this wouldn't be their attitude if they could see their child sprawled on the road at some future date, skull cracked open or arms and legs shattered. It is too easy to say, "It won't happen to me, or it won't happen to my child."

The mess operations worker who fell from a truck last year and died from head injuries had no more thought he would be the next victim than any of us now do.

We urge all bus riders to get inside the bus or stay off completely. We urge parents to watch out for their children's safety.

MESS HALL CONSOLIDATION

The consolidation of mess halls is not entirely unfamiliar in Gila River. Most residents will probably remember that mess hall 45 was at one time closed until the block was re-populated by transferees from Jerome.

Consolidation is being carried on in all centers according to present Washington regulations which require all blocks with food appropriations for less than 125 persons to consolidate with other mess halls.

Through this process mess halls will gradually be cleaned up and inventories taken. WRA officials state that this is not being done to put pressure on relocation, but that it is merely a method to facilitate administration.

GIRLS ENTERTAIN 200 SOLDIERS

Some 200 Nisei soldiers stationed at a camp near New York City were recently entertained by 125 Nisei girls from New York and vicinity at a party in honor of the soldiers at the Nyack, N.Y., USO. The program included singing by Miss Tubbie Kunitatsu, formerly of Heart Mountain, and dancing by Misses Yukiko Amemiya and Mae Enoski, both of whom came to New York City from Gila River. Miss Enoski presented some Hawaiian dances and Miss Amemiya, who is a member of the famous Martha Graham dance company, performed several modern dances.

The Nisei girls made the trip from New York to Nyack and returned in buses provided by the USO. They were rounded up on only several days' notice by the New York chapter of the Japanese American Citizens League at the request of A.L. Esplin, director of the Nyack USO, who said the party was "a grand success."

NISEI ARTIST MINE OKUBO HONORED IN NEW YORK

More than 100 persons attended a tea in honor of Miss Mine Okubo, Nisei artist, at the opening of an exhibit of her documentary paintings and drawings of relocation center life at the American Common in New York City on March 6 under the auspices of the Common Council for American Unity.

Miss Okubo was introduced to the audience by Miss M. Margaret Anderson, editor of "Common Ground," the Council's periodical, and answered questions regarding her experiences as an artist and an evacuee.

Miss Okubo, whose art work won several prizes on

the West Coast before the war, came to New York City from the Central Utah Relocation Center early in 1944 to serve as contributing artist to Fortune Magazine's special issue on Japan. Since then she has contributed as a free-lance artist to the "New York Times," "Saturday Review of Literature," "Survey Graphic," and "Lamp," house organ of the Standard Oil Company. She recently completed a manuscript for a book about the evacuation of persons of Japanese ancestry from the West Coast, with sketches and brief explanatory text.

She is a native of Riverside, Calif., and received the degrees of bachelor of arts and master of arts from the University of California. In 1938 the University awarded her its highest art honor—the Bertha Henicka Taussig Memorial Traveling Fellowship on which she studied for two years in Europe. She returned to the United States when the war started and began work almost immediately at the Golden Gate Fair, demonstrating fresco painting. Late, she worked on a WPA project, painting defense posters and murals for the Army and Navy. At the time of evacuation, she was working on a mosaic for a service man's "hospitality house" in Oakland, Calif.

Prizes and awards won by Miss Okubo include the Anne Bremer prize at the 1941 San Francisco Museum of Art annual oil exhibition, the anonymous donor award at the same show in 1940, and first prize in the 1940 University of California Art Exhibition.
