PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT DEAD

THREE RECEIVE ARMY NOTICES FORACTIVEDUITY

REALIGNMENT

Relocation Will Handle Property

Vices, formerly directed jointly by the Administrative Management Division in Vashington and the San Francisco field office has become the responsibility of the Rolecation Division at all levels, effective April 10. URA Director Dillon S. Myer announced.

Under a general realignment of basic functions outlined in Administrative Notice 239, West Coast area relocation offices in Arizona, California, Oregon, and Vashington will report directly to the Relocation Division in Washington, and will function exactly as other area of fices.

The assistant director in San Francisco reporting directly to the director, a staff relationship will coordinate the problems of VRA over the entire in dealing West Coast, state officials in California and federal officials, including the military; coordinate publio 'relations throughout that area; and in general, expedite established policies and procedures with all WRA personnel.

HARRY TRUMAN SWORN IN AS 33RD U.S. PRESIDENT

Roosevelt is dead! The radio announcement was hard and blunt. There was no way to soften its blow, for the passing of the President was as stunning as it was sudden.

Thus Rivers learned that Franklin Delano Roosevelt had passed away at Warm Springs, Ga., 3:35, Central time, Thursday afternoon, April 12, from what was medically described as a "massive cerebral hemorrhage".

The 63-year-old president was being sketched in his cottage at Warm Springs Thursday afternoon. At 1 p.m. he said, "I have a terrific headache." At 1:15 he fainted. At 3:35 he died without regaining consciousness. He had been at Warm Springs since March 30.

At 7:09 p.m. Washington time, just a few hours after the President died, Vice President Harry S. Truman of Missouri was sworn in by Chief Justice harlan Fiske Stone as the thirty-third president of the United States. He takes over to complete what was to be Franklin Roosevelt's fourth term. Funeral services will be held this afternoon in the East Room of the White House. Burial will be at Hyde Park tomorrow afternoon.

In Rivers, Project Director Leroy H. Bennett decreed a 15-minute period of repsect from 9 to 9:15 colook this morning in respect and in memorium. Churches will remain open today for prayer and meditation.

LIFE HISTORY

Roosevelt was born on Jan. 30, 1882, at Hyde Park, N.Y. In 1913 he was appointed assistant secretary of the Navy. In August 1921 he was stricken with infantile paralysis. The healing waters of Warm Springs, Gall proved beneficial, and he established a foundation there to help other sufferers.

He was elected Governor of New York in 1928. In 1933, at 51, Roosevelt became president. He was elected for the fourth time in 1944 and was starting his thirteenth year as president.

Civil Service Test Next Week

Tom Sawyer announced that education in cooperation with relocation will conduct Civil Service exfor simple aminations clerical, typist, a n d stenographic employment. The tests will be held in Butte at 45-16-D on Monday morning, April 16, at 8:30 and in Canal at 13-13 Tuesday morning April 17 at 8:30. Typewriters will be furnished for the use of those taking the tests.

According to Lyston Black, personnel officer, an excused absence will be allowed for those who are employed on project jobs if the immediate supervisor is notified.

There will be a Civil Service representative to assist in the examinations. Anyone is eligible to take, these tests, including high school students. Applicants should have form sixty (one copy) completed. This form may be obtained at the high schools, relocation offices, and at the personnel office.

CALIF. LA WRA Office Gets Autonomy

A streamlined decentralization of the War Relocation Authority, under which the Los Angeles office and its Southern California branches will operate as an autonomous unit directly responsible to Washings ton headquarters, becomes effective this week.

announcement was made by Dillon S. Myer, director of WRA.

Headod by Area Relocation Supervisor Paul G. Robertson, the Southern California organization has been operating under jurisdiction of the WRA western field office at San Francisco since last December.

SEATTLE TOO

The FRA Southern California area consists of San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, Ventura, Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Orange, Riverside, Imporial and San Diogo counties, and Maricopa county in Arizona.

Myor announced that the Seattle office henceforth will function direct l y under Washington.

Myer said the total number of evacuees who have already left the relocation centers now has climbed to 40,000. These have either returned to normal civilian life or , in the case of the younger mon, are now serving in the United States armed services.

The Var Department has informed WRA that approximatcly 17,600 Japan e se Americans from the mainland and Hawaii have been inducted into the army since November 1, 1940.

1.196 RETURNEES

During the three months which the Army's new order has been effective, Myor announced, 1196 persons have severed permane tly thoir connection with WRA relocation centers and have returned to homes, jobs, businesses an d' schools in California.

AGENCIES HELP

Social agencies throughout the Midwest have been fully informed on the war's dislocation of our Japaness American population and have already assisted a number of center residents in resuming normal lives again, according to Miss Prudence Ross, acting supervisor of the North Central area. Services of both private and public agencies will be available to Japanese Americans long after WRA has been liquidated.

GRANTS ON NEED

Grants from the Rosettlements assistance Fundare not limited to emergency situations nor are they strictly "relief". Grants are made on the basis of nood, and a noed may be defined as any obstacle to resettlement. A. number of employed resettlers have requested grants for their travel expenses to a relocation center for the purpose of helping their family or parents leave the center. Others have requested grants to purchase furniture or to rent larger apartments or houses on having their families join them in a Midwest ocmmunity. Such financial assistance is not a loan but an outright grant to minimize for the evacuee undue stress and worry over finances in trying to begin life over again in the world outside the centers.

Future issues of the Field Bulletin from the Central Area will include the names and addresses of social agoncies which have assisted resettlers either financially or in family planning.

MEDICAL SERVICES

Until recently most of the assistance grants to resettlers in the Midwest have paid for medical services--dental, eye and internal surgery--and hospital bills and daily living expenses for persons having longterm illnesses such as tuberculosis or infanti le paralysis. In the case of several older Issei who suddenly had a stroke and died, Assistance grants paid for their hospitalization and funerals.

TIDINGS FROM A REFUGEE CAMP

William Taylor, former design engineer at Rivers, wrote to Project Director L.H. Bennett from a refugee camp in Egypt to say hello to his friends here.

Taylor's V-mail letter, dated March 27, states:

"For the last four months I have been working in a large Jugoslav Refugee Camp' at El Shatt in Egypt charge of work shops and a little construction. The facilities are much different than at Rivers. Dormitory space for 16-18 people in a double desert tent is provided, 15' x 40. Several families live one space withou t in privacy or storage space. Mess-halls feed 1,200 people each, army field style. The camps are located in an absolutely barren desert where there is no possibility of agricultural production. camps in the El Seven Shatt group house 27,000 refugees.

υI have been recently reassigned to the Jugoslav country mission, division of Industrial Rehabilitation as Architectural Assistant Engineer. I anticipate a good deal of field work with supply require-

ments."
