

CAMOUFLAGE NET STIPENDS HERE

Pay day for networkers scheduled for today has been delayed to tomorrow because of a new ruling which will fatten the December wages, stated manager Thomas Reynolds.

The ruling states that the 5% victory tax does not apply to services rendered in 1942, though the payment is made in 1943. The net work payroll which had been prepared minus the victory tax has been scrapped and a revision is being made.

Draft Registration

18-19 Year Old Sign-Ups Begin Tomorrow In Gila

Eighteen and 19 year old youths will register for Selective Service tomorrow at Canal, 13-11-A and Butte, 43-1-A, with members of the high school faculty as registrars, disclosed John Landward, administrative assistant.

On Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, eligible high school students, born on or after July 1, 1924, and attained 18 years of age, will be required to register. W. C. 'Tom' Sawyer, superintendent of Butte schools, estimates that some 150 students will be in this category. On Saturday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., the registration office will be open for workers and others.

800 GAS STOVES TO BE INSTALLED

Part of the 800 gas stoves, four carloads, for recreation halls, mess halls, wash rooms, and hospitals are here, Firman Brown, deputy director and acting senior engineer, announced this morning. The rest are due shortly.

Each of the 54 recreation halls will be furnished with four heaters; and the mess halls will have the same number of unit blower type stoves equipped with circulating fans. Every washroom will receive one each.

Brown stated that contracts have been let to gravel few of the most traveled roads in the center. Part of the others will be graded to facilitate deliveries to the mess halls.

According to the last Selective Service Act, any youth upon attaining 18 years of age is required to register on his birthday except on Sundays when he must register on the following work-day. Landward's office in Butte and the office in Canal will be available for such use.

Though forms will be filled here, and each registrant will be recorded with the local board in his home community, according to Landward. Some 450 registrants are expected.

EDITORIAL

Consumer Coops — Fair Deal

Lying dormant in the minds of progressive leaders in the community has been the creation of a Consumer's Cooperative in this center. Because of the lack of knowledge and general misunderstanding, the program has not been carried through in the past. Meanwhile, untouched and untouchable was the accumulation of profits accruing from the Community Enterprises.

Months have flown by since, and at long last in Butte, machinery has been created for the organization of a cooperative body. It is yet only in the study stage, and it seems hardly likely that its effort will come to fruition by February 1 as is planned. But the first definite step has been taken in the right direction.

It is the right direction, because money now lying unused can be turned to profitable community good or into the pockets of the residents. Under the present system much of the profits will go to income taxes, and as they accumulate, a major share of it will be lost to the Federal and state taxes, which otherwise may be put to much-needed use here. The organization of a cooperative will prevent this loss.

It is the right direction, because residents can, by its formation become responsible for the disposition of community funds. Then it will behoove them to acquaint themselves with the community and its diverse activities to place the money where it is most needed.

And finally, it is the right direction because the critics of Community Enterprises will be given a procedure whereby their grievances, if just, can be translated into action through the medium of a democratic process--the vote. JN

NUMEROUS JOB OPENINGS FOR YOUNG PEOPLE GIVEN

For the benefit of the mess workers under 30 who will soon be released, William Huro, placement officer, named the following openings that are now available. Camouflage workers, college graduates for night school teachers, expert translators and interpreters, con-

structors, cement, plumbing, and carpenter workers, and helpers, and experienced stenographers. He also added that outside employment is now opening its doors of opportunity in the following fields: Stenographers, billing machine operators, calculating machine operators, dishwashers, cooks, second cooks, bus boys, stewards, lobby porters, laundry workers, domestic workers, recreational workers, couples for farms, and various positions in the U. S. Coast Guard at \$95 a month.

FAITHFUL WARDEN GETS PROMOTION

Untiring devotion to duty culminated in the promotion of Shoji Hiraga from Warden to Lieutenant, according to Fred J. Graves, associate director of Internal Security at Canal. Lieutenant Hiraga will head the newly formed Traffic and Emergency Division within the Internal Security.

Lieutenant Haruo Ishihara will be in charge of the Juvenile division, Graves disclosed.

COMMUNAL COOPERATION - FOR SUCCESSFUL PROGRAM

That cooperation is necessary and the only way in which community good can be accomplished was the gist of talks given by Jiro Oishi, Ken Kitasako, Gilbert Kuramitsu, and Tom Hirashima Sunday night at the Butte Youth Fellowship Forum.

As coordinator of Community Activities Section, Oishi declared that with limited facilities and lack of organization and a definite administrative policy, the CAS has been severely hampered in its work. Kitasako, executive secretary of the Butte Temporary Community Council, held that the unfounded and destructive criticism of people has been responsible for some of the backward conditions of the center.

Stated Kuramitsu, gen-

eral manager of Community Enterprises, "Because of distrust and unjust rumors, this community is yet to organize a Consumer Cooperative. As a result it is impossible to touch the profits accumulating from the Enterprises. It looks as though Butte is now on its way to its establishment, and it has been long overdue."

Representing the Farm Management, Jocular Hirashima reported the state of the farm.

NEW BARBER SHOP PROVES POPULAR

"We had an approximate 30 customers at the opening of the barber shops at 42-E-1 and a marked increase in number followed," so stated Supt. B. Ikonoue.

At present, there are seven barbers under the supervision of Saisuko Mori. A request is made for twenty more barbers to apply immediately.

Hours are from 9 to 5:45 p.m. but it is hoped by the early part of next week to open from 9 to 9 p.m.

Adult Classes IRRIGATION, PORK PRODUCTION, DAIRY

Adult classes in dairying, irrigation, and pork production will begin within the next two weeks in both Canal and Butte Communities, it was announced by the adult education office today. Planned for the near future are seed production, woodworking, and farm machinery.

Sixty-nine students attended the first session on dairying in Butte on Friday night, but enrollments are still open.

All classes will have actual labor training as well as theoretical instruction.

Emphasis will be on both production for relocation centers and on skills which will equip workers to relocate to excellent jobs.
