EDITORIAL Consumer Coops — Fair Deal

Lying dormant in the minds of progressive leaders in the community has been the creation of a Consumer's Cooperative in this center. Because of the lack of knowledge and general misunderstanding, the program has not been carried through in the past. Meanwhile, untouched and untouchable was the accumilation of profits accruing from the Community Enterprises.

Nonths have flown by since, and at long last in Butte, machinery has been created for the organization of a cooperative body. It is yet only in the study stage, and it seems hardly likely that its effort will come to fruition by February 1 as is planned. But the first definite step has been taken in the right direction.

It is the right direction, because money now lying unused can be turned to profitable community good or into the pockets of the residents. Under the present system much of the profits will go to income taxes, and as they accumulate, a major share of it will be lost to the Federal and state taxes, which otherwise may be put to much-needed use here. The organization of a cooperative will prevent this loss.

It is the right direction, because residents can, by its formation become responsible for the disposition of community funds. Then it will behave them to acquaint themselves with the community and its diverse activities to place the money where it is most needed.

And finally, it is the right direction because the critics of Community Enterprises will be given a procedure whereby their grievances, if just, can be translated into action through the medium of a democratic process—the vote.
