Members of the Commission were deeply concerned over the situation and agreed to do everything possible to induce workers to apply for these positions.

Lyston S. Black, per-sonnel officer issued a special call to all workers who have some knowledge shown in Canal tomorrow classes or but oring during "of clerical work, typing, stenography or bookkeeping to report immediately to the personnel management office for assignment.

It is not necessary, Black pointed out, that a worker be an expert in this line of work in order to apply for such a position. In fact, he stated, this is a marvelous opportunity for a person to get the necessary job experience to qualify for a position after relocation.

NISEI BUSINESS INCREASE RAPID

Less than 20 persons of Japaneso ancestry owned a small business in the Midwest at the outbreak of war, but today the number has jumped to 70 and more retail shops are needed, according to a booklet just published by the North Central Area. The booklet entitled "Rusiness Opportunities for Issei in the Midwest" is available in an English edition and a special Japanese illustrated edition at the relocation center.

Every Midwest city can support one or more restaurants specializing in Oriental foods, and openings exist also in a wide variety of other businesses-laundries, hotels, rooming houses, produce markets, grocery stores, toy factories, handicrafts, dry cleaning and dressmaking establishments, and specialty repair shops.

Resettlers who have set up a business in the last year or two and older Issei who have been in business for years were interviewed by Relocation officers in the North Central Area. Their comments comprise this book let. Every businessman interviewed stated that he would glad to advise or assist Center residents interested in going in to business.

EVACUEE THRIVES In SOUTHERN GA.

"Why evacuees don't move to Southern Georgia instead of wanting to return to California is beyond my understanding," was the earnest comment of S. Butsuyen of White Oak, Gonorgia.

Butsuyen and his business associate HI. Omaye went to work as their own farm hands several years ago on Pented land known today as the Maryfield Plantation located a short distance from the town of White Oak, Georgia.

CALIF LAW ENFORCEMENT

(Excerpts from an address to the sheriffs of California by Robert W. Kenny, attorney general of California, sheriffs meeting, Sacramento, March 16, 1945.)

Today California is peculiarly in the eyes of the world. The San Francisco Conference, which will begin on April 25, is one of the most important international: events that will take place in our time. Many hundreds of foreign leaders will be here. There will also be more than 500 newspaper correspondents, according to information presently available. These leaders and correspondents will represent every nation of the world with the exception of enemy and neutral countries. These visitors will hear the story of democracy, the story of equality among men. They will be working out the machinery to build a world democracy and a perpetual equality among men and nations——We must, therefore, make absclutely sure that nothing interferes with the welcome we extend.

PROTECT RETURNEES

With the determination by the War Department that military necessity no longer requires the exclusion of the Japanese Americans from the West Coast, and the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States that the rights of the Japanese Americans must be restored, these rights again are theirs. And it is the duty of law enforcement officials to cast aside any personal projudices they may have and fully to protect the returning Japanese Americans...

Most of the incidents that have taken place are specifically prohibited by law and it has been possible to take prompt and definite steps to quell disturbances and take into custody those who transgress against the peace. I know from firsthand experience how promptly and officiently all of you have move do the definite at your sorvice for any assistance we can render. Offendors must be apprehended and quickly.

UPHOLD THE FREEDOMS

Whatever else reaches the ears of natives of Japan, we may be assured that treatment of persons of Japanese extraction is fully reported to them in every case where that treatment is contrary to our declared democratic principles. The atrocities which have been committed against American prisoners are unthinkable. We have the urgent duty of protecting them from additional hardships. Don't give the enemy Japanes e a chance to visit worse horrors on our people who are still in their clutches. They may be looking for excuses which would to them justify further mistreatment.

Rosenthal, whose daring have seen them in action is in making the historic picture of the Marines raising the Stars and Stripes at the crater rim of Mount Suribachi after the bloody battle for the island caused Navy Secretary Forrestal to remark that Rosenthal was "a s gallant as the men who raised the Flag," told Gotthard :

"There are thousands of Japanese Americans in United States service in all theaters. All of those with whom I came into contact are anxious to prove their loyalty to this country. Ofton their anxiety is touching, for they volunteer for all sorts of dangerous missions

DOUBLE RISK

"They work so close to the onemy on these missions that, along with the danger of being killed by Japs, they run the risk of being shot, unintentionally, by our own Marines. From a distance it's hard to tell them from the enomy. Their dungare es soon become ragged i n rough country and the similarity of their physical appearance makes their job that much tougher.

Rosenthal condomned isolated instances of antagonism toward Japanese American fighting men by United States groups. He tormed a "crying shame" the action by the Hood River, Oregon, American Legion Post in removing the names of Japanese Americans from the city's honor roll, a move that also was condemned by the National Legion organiza-

Two families of resettlers have already made use of the apartment hostel until they obtained more permanent quarters Cornwall said.

A family may occupy the apartment hostel, which has sleeping accommodations for four persons, until permanent living quarters are found. No rental is charged, but persons occupying the apartment may contribute to the church fund if they so desire.

Uyeda had his .. store front and interior attractively painted, and he had succeeded in getting together "as a starter" a small but complete stock of notions, ranging from "unbreakable" kite strings to "holeproof" socks.

The proprietor has made friends in Bronzeville, including negro leaders who presented him with floral pieces to celebrate the opening of his store. "But," he says, "you can't just leave friendship to chance -- you must actively go out of your way to cultivate it. in this neigh borhood."
