Opposing restrictions will be Rivers! Attorney Terry and S. H. Feeny of Mesa, instructor of social science at the Mesa Union High School.

NIISEI BAITTALLION HIGHLY LAUDED

The 100th or "Cno Puka Puka Battalion," rated by "Axis Sally" as the Seventh · U. S. Army's "secret wcapon," boasts officers with the highest I.Q. in the Army, that it has lost only three of its soldiers as prisoners-of-war, that it has approximately 1600 wearers of the Purple Heart, and that never has one of its soldiers gone absent without leave.

This is how Catherine Coyno, feature writer for tho Boston Herald, doscribed the Nisoi battalion in an article of March 26, 1945. Parts of hor article follows: .

VITAL

"This infantry battalion of Amoricans of Japanose ancestry, with other units of the 442nd Regimontal Combat Team, is holding the enemy at the Franco - Italian border bordor, ongaging in a containing action high in the Maritime Alps, not far from tho Coto D'Asur, s h o writes. The place and the action are disagrocable, yot so great an improvoment are they over the holl of Anzio and the Vosges, the boys hope they will be .. kopt here, unless of course the War Department were to reverse itself, to let them demonstrate their Americanism by fighting in the Pacific thoatre.

"Sixty -five per cent of battalion comes from the Hawaiian Islands and, surprisingly to me a t least, speaks with what approximates a New England accent .

CONSTRUCTIVE

"The front here i s miserable; the boys live in foxholes built stones and protected from the cold mists by blankets and tarpaulins. As in the typical "combat outfits, they get three days rest every three weeks at a rest camp. Their camp is "the swankiest joint wo could find, " according to the Maj., MoKenzio, on French Riveria, a large in a setting of flowering mimosa and palms.

Director Dillon S. Myer's comments on the 21 recommendations submitted by delogates to the all-center conforcince at Salt Lake City arrived here last week in an eight-page mimeographed pamphlet.

Each of the 21 comments are long and in detail. terproted in concise terms they range all the way from "not feasible" to "will bend every offort to assists" The full text will be distributed to blocks soon.

Recommendations which were in effect termed "not feasible" are the following:

1. Spocial governmental agoncies be established solely for providing assistance to evacuous who need funds in roestablishing.

2. The present relocation grant be increased.

should be given to every relocatee.

9. WRA accopt for reinduction into centers those who relocate and who find themselves unable to make satisfactory adjustments.

11. "RA provide transportation of evacuoe property

door to door.

12. WRA negotiate for establishing old people's homes exclusively for persons of Japanese ancestry.

14. Short term loave rules be changed to permit 2 months absence with one month extension privileges.

· 18. WRA obtain establishment of some avenue of gevernmental indomnities for relocatees who may become victims of anti-Japanese violence in terms of personal injuries or proporty damago.

3. Long tarm loans at a low rate of interest be mado availablo.

4. WRA give consideration to help evacuees get

5. WRA make every effort to obtain a return of evacuee property of evacuees who, due to evacuation, lost them because of inability to maintain installment payments.

15. WRA make every affort to release frozen assets

It will be necessary for individuals, or heads of families, desiring to return to the Hawaiian Islands at government expense to initiate the following in advance of their arrival at the port of debarkation:

1. Each individual or head of family will write to the 12th Naval District Out-Bound Passenger Section, San Francisco, California, indicating the desire and eligibity to rourn to the Hawaiian Islands at government expense and should request application for priority and clearance. Such clearance is in addition to that required by the Provest Marshal General.

2. Application will be filled out and mailed by the individual, or individuals, in question to the Office of Internal Security, U.S. Navy, Ielin a Palace Grounds, Honolulu, T.H.

3. On receipt of the application at the Office of Internal Security, it will be acted upon and priority will be set up for their return. Notification will be sent to the applicant, as well as the Office of the 12th Naval District, San Francisco, or other district ports of debarkation who have jurisdiction over that

4. It is the San Francisco VRA office's suggestion that this request be made out by the applicant in sufficient time in advance before they leave the centers or the localities in which they are residing at that time.

20. Provide students of Japanese ancestry with adequate protection and equal opportunities.

21. VRA make every effort to get work opportunities for returnoos and relocatoes on equal basis with Caucasians.

The following should be met by individual applications; WRA will assist:

13. "RA arrange so that former civil service employees will be reinstated, and so that persons of Japanese ancestry can secure business licenses as famerly.

17. Secure outright releases for parolees who relocate.

19. Arrange for adequate government compensation against losses to evacuee property while in government storage or transit.

To recommendation No. 10, that "RA establish hostals and build new housing through F.H.A., Myer says, "Every effort is being made to encourage hostel establishment ... VRA is constantly working on the housing problem from various other angles.

Recommandation 8: Continue operation of evacue of property offices for duration. Comment: On the West Coast until April, 2, 1946, but in no case beyond that date.

Rocommendation. 16: "RA negotiate sc that alien parents may operate proporties with powers of attorney issue by their children. Comment: We are investi gating; will provide further information at later date.
