WAR DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES FOUR MORE GILA MEN RECEIVE BRONZE STARS IN FRANCE HURT IN ITALY

War Department notices of four more boys wounded in action were sent to the next of kin in this center this week.

The wounded are as follows:

PFC. KATSUMI KAIDA, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kikutaro Kaida of 57-2-A, formerly of Concord, Calif., seriously wounded in Italy, April 16.

PFC. KAZUHIKO MINAMIDE, brother of Osamu Minamide, 4-2-D, formerly of Vacaville, Calif., seriously wounded in Italy, April 14.

PFC. SEIGI IMAMUR A, brother of Miss Miyoko Imamura, 57-9-A, seriously wounded in Italy, April 16.

PFC. TAKESHI WADA, son of Mrs. Rai Wada of 4-8-C, formerly of Sanger, Calif., slightly wounded in Italy on April 15. He was wounded once before July 6, 1944.

Parents Order Service Pins

Five-hundred and fifty-one service pins denoting the number of family members serving in the armed forces have been ordered for Gila parents, said W. C. "Tom" Sawyer. One sterling pin will be given to each family.

Families desiring more than one pin may place an order. For additional pins at the education office in the ad building. The money for the pins has come from the local chapter of the Red Cross.

Four-hundred families will receive one star pins; 110 will receive two star pins; 34 will receive three star pins; 4 will receive four star pins and 3 will receive five star pins.

The pins will be available within three or four weeks, said Sawyer.

CASTOR FLOWER SHOULD BE CUT

Some activity in the control of hay fever and asthma by eliminating the castor bean plant, blooms has started, but unless the entire project participates and keeps up the activity, the ultimate control of those diseases will fail, the medical staff announced yesterday.

All residents are requested to cut and destroy all flowers of the castor bean plants around the barrack and within blocks. There are still scattered areas where castor plants are in full bloom.

Okumura, Rivers, Ariz., "for heroic achievement on Nov. 14, 1944, in France. When two riflemen were severely wounded 25 yards from an enemy strong-point, Sgt. Okumura disregarded enemy machine gun fire to go to their aid. He then brought the men to cover, rendered first aid and again exposed himself to the enemy fire to crawl back to his post. Later, when his patrol leader was seriously wounded in the head, Sgt. Okumura sent his men to a safer position, attended to the injured man's wounds, and remained with him until he could be safely evacuated."

The Bronze star medal was presented to S/Sgt. William E. Arii, Rivers, Ariz., "for heroic achievement on Dec. 29, 1944, in the vicinity of Grimaldi, Italy as a member of a three-man patrol on a mission of obtaining information regarding the enemy's disposition, Sgt. Arii displayed outstanding fortitude and disregard for personal safety while under enemy fire. His soldierly skill, resourcefulness, and ability to coordinate his efforts with the other members of the patrol enabled the group to out-manuever a superior enemy force and to return with valuable information regarding the enemy's positions."

ARSON

MORE JUSTICE NEEDED

The acquittal of the three Auburn suspects, charged with attempted dynamiting and burning of the Sumio Doi home, will go down in the records as another California type justice handed down. Doi had his counsel, the case was heard in court, the Bataan March was brought in, the supremacy of the white race was pointed out, the jury of 12 conferred and turned in a verdict of "not guilty" for the arson suspects. The defendants did not even deny setting fire to the house. Doi had had a fair California trial.

Needless to say the decision was a discouraging one not only to the Japanese and Japanese Americans who have been shot at, terrorized, and had their homes set afire. It also was discouraging to others of Japanese descent and to all Americans who believe in democracy, fair treatment of loyal citizens, and just punishment of criminals. Most of the culprits have never even been caught; they still roam free. The suspects in the Doi case were three of the few apprehended by law enforcement officers in California; they too are free.

California has not been able to protect its Japanese American citizens. Some persons are still going around shooting and burning, and law enforcement officials are still promising protection, but are unable to find the criminals.

Perhaps the move made by the Kishi brothers, American soldiers at Fort Snelling, who reportedly wrote directly to Secretary Harold Ikes for protection of their Merced home and their parents and sisters there, will bring better results. We look to the Kishi case with hope for a better justice and with faith in a democratic United States if not in a democratic Calif.

CIO RESOLUTION

The following resolution was adopted by the Oregon State C.I.O. Council in an executive board meeting at Portland, Oregon, April 7, 1945.

"The Oregon State C.I.O. Council in executive session in Portland, April 7, 1945, recognizes the recent order of the War Department and the War Relocation Authority permitting the return of loyal American of Japanese ancestry to the Pacific Coast as a commendable and correct step; one in line with the principles for which this war is being fought.

"In view of the established fact that thousands of our Japanese Americans are now serving their country with honor and distinction on the battlefield, we believe that such action as taken by the American Legion, Hood River, Oregon, in erasing the names of Japanese from the honor roll of World War II veterans, should be condemned as regrettable and unjustifiable.

"This attempt to foster race hysteria must be recognized by all Americans as a threat to the unity of our people and further indicates a lack of confidence in the judgment of our War Department.

"The experience of our country since Pearl Harbor has been that those Americans of Japanese ancestry have proven themselves responsible and loyal Americans, participating in all phases of the war. As such they are entitled to as much protection under our constitution as any Americans regardless of race, creed or color.

"The Oregon State C.I.O. Council wholeheartedly supports the action of the War Department and condemns those who are attempting to split the American people by arousing racial prejudices for their own partisan ends.

"The Oregon State C.I.O. Council further calls upon all public officials of State, County and Municipal governments and all people of this State to do everything within their power to cooperate with the War Department in order to assist in the readjustment of these loyal Japanese Americans in our community life."

SONS OF THREATENED FAMILY APPEAL TO SECRETARY ICKES

Two American soldiers of Japanese ancestry, whose

family living near Livingston, Calif., was fired upon by unknown terrorists on April 22, have appealed to Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes to protect their parents and sisters from terrorists shooting raids, the San Francisco Chronicle reports.

The entire royal court was nominated and elected by the students of Canal High.

Six Gila boys have arrived for training at Camp Wolters, Texas, according to word received from the camp headquarters. The boys names are Stephen Ichiki, Masaru Okada, George Nakai, Iwao Nakayama, Nob Yoshida, and George Kihara.

Special Coach For Relocates

The special coach which left May 1 carried 54 persons including visitors as well as relocates. This coach appeals to those who have heard stories of the difficulties of securing a seat on trains. The coach leaving May 8 is also filling, with 22 signed up Monday for space in it. These coaches will be continued throughout the summer.

YBA MEETING

There will be a YBA cabinet meeting, Thursday night, 7:30 p.m. at the clubroom, 42-3-D.

The appeal followed the firing of four rifle bullets into the home of Mrs. Chiyoko Kishi and her disabled, invalid husband living near Livingston, Merced County.

The wire to the secretary, released by the WRA, was signed by T5 Sherman Kishi and Pfc. Fred Kishi, both stationed at Fort Snelling, Minn. It told the secretary that their parents had been terrorized by "vandals" and requested "necessary steps be taken to protect their lives and properties."

Another Nisei home was fired upon less than a half hour after the first attack on the Kishi home. It was the home of Bob Morimoto, a n honorably discharged soldier, according to WRA reports.

Art Hoffmann, deputy sheriff in charge of the investigation said two bullets had been found which indicated they had been fired from a .38 caliber pistol and a .30 caliber rifle.

WRA POLICY IS WORK ON V-DAY

On the day that an official announcement is made of victory in Europe, it will be the policy of the War Relocation Authority to remain at work during the usual hours, Acting Director Malcolm E. Pitts announced. Pitts said that the policy was in compliance with a request from William H. McReynolds, assistant to the President, that employees of Federal agencies observe V-E Day by staying at their posts of duty.

L.A. INSTITUTE GIVES RETURNNEES AID

The International Institute of Los Angeles is anxious to be of service to returning Japanese, says Elsie D. Newton, executive secretary. The following services are mentioned especially:

A Japanese speaking Caucasian worker for family case work services. Group activities for all persons interested. Plan for open house on alternate Monday evenings for social and get-acquainted parties.

Financial assistance will be extended on a case work basis for a person who is having difficulty establishing eligibility for county aid.

N.Y. AREA HEAD VISITING HERE

Gordon Berryman, relocation officer of the Middle Atlantic area including Rochester, N.Y.; Albany, N.Y.; New York City; Newark, N.J.; Philadelphia, Pa.; Seabrook Farms, N.J.; Maryland and Washington D.C., is now on the project. He will remain until May 22.

Berryman has the names and addresses of families and persons who have resettled in the New York City district. He says that while the list is incomplete, there are 93 Gila families known to have one or more members in and around New York City and that 51 of those families have all members living there. The remaining 42 families have 91 member resettled (with one or more in New York City) and 103 members remaining in Gila. Berryman will call on those persons to assist them in making their plans.

He has brought with him over 500 job offers from the New York City district, many of which have housing in connection with the job. He also has current information on public and private schools. Berryman will be glad to talk with residents and can be reached through the relocation offices.

TEXAS WRA MAN HERE WITH JOBS

Texas offers opportunities for those who wish to establish themselves permanently says W. Homer Hills, relocation officer from the Dallas, Texas, office who is now on the project. He will remain until Sunday, May 6, when he will go to Poston for two weeks. He will then return to Gila May 21 for another week. Hill will discuss specific job offers and opportunities in general in the southern and eastern part of Texas. Here are a few of the offers he has:

In a letter to the new York WRA relocation office, the owner of an exclusive dressmaking shop in the national style center, Mrs. Carrie Munn of 640 Madison Avenue, has complimented four Japanese American resettlers employed in her shop as "very satisfactory workers" and asked center residents interested in obtaining "steady work in pleasant surroundings at good salaries" to write directly to her.

Mrs. Munn's letter to the WRA office follows:

"For more than a year I have employed Japanese Americans in my high class dressmaking establishment, and I am glad to say that I have found them to be very satisfactory workers. The following girls are now working for me and are very happy here:

"Miss Michiko Takahashi, Topaz; Mrs. Yukiko Matsuo, Granada; Miss Fumio Oike, Poston; Miss Yoshie Helon Kobayashi, Gila River.

"I should like to employ quite a few more girls and women of Japanese ancestry. I can guarantee them steady work in pleasant surroundings at good salaries. We have a five-day week, with time and one-half over forty hours. The regular hours of employment are from 8:30 a.m. to 5:15 p.m.

**HOW TO START
WARTIME WORK**

Japanese-prepared foods are being purchased in the Fujimoto store in Chicago, according to a picture on the front cover of a booklet, "Starting a Small Business In Wartime", just released by the North Central area. The picture shows an Issei resettler, Shigeru Yamamoto, examining a can of abalone (awabi) in a store operated by a resettler family, Kumasuke Fujimoto, formerly of Los Angeles and the Jerome Center.

The booklet contains detailed data on Chicago as a business area and is intended mainly to serve the evacuee as a guide for investigating business opportunities in Chicago or elsewhere.

The English edition of "Starting a Small Business In Wartime" is available now in Relocation Centers. The Japanese edition which is illustrated with additional pictures of Japanese American businessmen in Chicago will be available at the Center within a week.

BUSSEI HEAR
WAR VETERAN**

Purple Heart holder Pfc. Harry Okada, former machine gunner in the 442nd Combat Team gave an interesting and humorous angle of the European War to a group of Bussei after the close of last Sunday's service. Pfc. Okada is a veteran from Maui, T.H., and has seen service in Italy and France. Having been wounded in one of the campaigns, he was sent back for treatment and is presently visiting the Rev. Yeisho Miura of block 39.

According to Pfc. Okada, there are no fox-hole atheists, and he told of several miraculous incidents which seem to bear out his convictions. He told of the time when a buddy of his captured two Germans with a tommy-gun, and found out later that the firing pin was missing from the gun. He told of another time when his Company was pinned down under terrific shelling. It was so terrific that the concussions from the blasts fairly lifted the boys off the ground. It happened during one particular tremendous barrage. A large shell passed right under the stomach of the ground-hugging pal of his without even touching him.

Deviating from the usual grim tales of the battle, Pfc. Okada concentrated on the humorous side of the war, and his informal chat was enjoyed immensely by the small but interested audience.
