Families desiring more than one pin may place an order for additional pine at the education office in the ad building. The money for the pins has come from the local chapter of the Red Cross.

Four - hundred families will receive one star pins; 110 will receive two star pins;34 will receive throe star pins; 4 will requive four star pins and 3 will receive five star pins.

Arii, Rivers, Ariz.,"for heroic achievement on Dec. 29, 1944, in the vicinity of Grimaldi, Italy as a member of a three-man patrol on a mission of obtaining information regarding the enemy's disposition, Sgt. Arii displayed outstanding fortitude and disregard for personal safety while under enemy fire. His soldiorly skill, resourcefulness, and ability to coordinate his efforts with the other members of the patrol enabled the group to out-maneuver a superior enemy force and to return with valuable information regarding the enemy's positions."

The following resolution was adopted by the Oregon State C.I.O. Council in an executive board meeting at Portland, Oregon, April 7, 1945.

Oregon State C.I.O. Council in executive sion in Portland, April 7, 1945, recognizes the recent order of the War Department and the War Relocation Authority permitting the return of loyal American of Japanese ancestry to the Pacific Coast as a commendable and correct step; one in line with the principles for which this war is being fought.

"In view of the established fact that thousands of Japanese Americans are now serving their country our with honor and distinction on the battlefront, we'be lieve that such action as taken by the American Legion, Hood River, Oregon, in erasing the names of Japanese from the honor roll of World War II veterans, should be condemned as regrettable and unjustifiable.

"This attempt to foster race hysteria must be recognized by all Americans as a threat to the unity of our people and further indicates a lack of confidence in the judgment of our War Department.

"The experience of our country since Pearl Harbor has been that those Americans of Japanese ancestry have proven themselves responsible and loyal Americans, participating in all phases of the war. As such they are entitled to as much protection under our constitution as any Americans regardless of race, creed or color.

"The Oregon State C.I.O. Council wholeheartedly supports the action of the War Department and condemns those who are attempting to split the American people by arousing racial prejudices for their own partisan ends.

"The Oregon State C.I.O. Council further calls upon all public officials of State, County and Municipal governments and all people of this State to do everything within their power to cooperate with the War Department in order to assist in the readjustment of these loyal Japanese Americans in our community lifo."

ARSON

JUSTICE NEEDED

The acquittal of the three Auburn suspects, charged with attempted dynamiting and burning of the Sumio Doi home, will go down in the records as another California type justice handed down. Doi had his counsel, the case was heard in court, the Bataan March was brough t in, the supremacy of the white race was pointed out, the jury of 12 conferred and turned in a verdict of "not guilty" for the arson suspects. The defendants did not even deny setting fire to the house. Doi had

had a fair California trial.

Needless to say the decision was a discouraging one only to the Japanese and Japanese Americans who have been shot at, terrorized, and had their homes set afire. It also was discouraging to others of Japanese descent and to all Americans who believe in democracy, fair treatment of loyal citizens, and just punishment of criminals. Most of the culprits have never even been caught; they still roam free. The suspects in the Doi oase were three of the few apprehended by law enforcement, officers in California; they too are free.

California has not been able to protect its Japanese Americans citizens. Some persons are still going around shooting and burning, and law enforcement officials are still promising protection, but are unable

to find the criminals.

Perhaps the move made by the Kishi brothers, American soldiers at Fort Snelling, who reportedly wrote directly to Secretary Harold Ickes for protection of their Merced home and their parents and sisters there, will bring better results. We look to the Kishi case with hope for a better justice and with faith in a democratic United States if not in a democratic Calif.

The wire to the secretary, relased by the WRA, was signed by T5 Sherman Kishi and Pfc. Fred Kishi, both stationed at Fort Snelling, Minn. It told secretary that their the parents had been terroriz-"vandals" and reed by quested "necessary steps be taken to protect their lives and properties."

Another Nisei home was fired upon less than a half hour after the first attack on the Kishi home. It was the home of Bob Morimoto, a n honorably discharged soldier, according to WRA reports.

Art Hoffmann, deput y sheriff in charge of the investigation said t w o bullets had been found which indicated they had been fired from a pistol and a .30 caliber caliber rifle.

Okada is a veteran from Maui, T.H., and has seen service in .Italy and France. Having been wounded in one of the campaigns, he was sent back for treatment and is presently visiting t'h e Rev. Yeisho Miura of block 39.

According to Pfc. Okathere are no fox-hole atheists, and he told of several miraculous incidents which seem to bear out his convictions. He told of the time when a buddy of his captured two Germans with a tommy-gun, and found out later that the firing pin was missing from the gun. He told of another time when his Company was pinned down under terrific shelling. It was so terrific that the concussions from the blasts fairly lifted the boys off the ground. It happened during one particular tremendous barrage. A large shell passed right under the stomach of the groundhugging pal of his without even touching him.

Deviating from the usual grim tales of the battle, Pfc. Okada concentrated on the humorous side of the war, and his informal chat was enjoyed immensely by the small but interested audience.
