CAMOUFLAGE FUND CONVERTED FOR COMMUNITY USE NISEI TROOPS SPEARHEAD DRIVE INTO NORTH ITALY

The Butte Community Council, in a special meeting Wednesday morning, thrashed out the problem of the camouflage trust fund and finally voted to create the community fund as previously planned. Thus \$2,420.57, the amount released by individuals who signed the authorization and release, will transfer from the camouflage net fund to the Butte community fund.

The Butte Council unanimously approved announcing publicly its appreciation to those donors who signed the authorization and release waiving their rights in order that the present community fund could be created.

The special meeting was called Wednesday morning because some blocks had expressed disapproval of the creation of the Butte community fund. It was

stated that some persons signing the affidavit of authorization and release had misinterpreted the contents of the form and wished to reconsider.

After two hours of argumentation the following three propositions were voted on:

1—Create the community fund as previously planned.

2—Refund to the camouflage trust fund, the portion in argument.

3—Return the full amount received to the camouflage fund trustees.

The result was in favor of proposition 1, to create the community fund.

CAPTURE GENOA

Making sensation all gains of 76 miles in five days, the 442nd took part in the capture of Genoa, Italy's largest seaport, on April 27, and then forged ahead to enter Turin, last great city in the Po River Valley, on April 30. The 442nd entered Genoa along with the 473rd Infantry Regiment, which then swung around in a southwesterly direction. Both Regiments are attached to the 92nd Infantry Division made up of Negro troops.

FAMOUS BATTALION

Activated on February 1, 1943, in response to request of many loyal American-born Japanese to serve in the Armed Forces, the 442nd set a high standard of training at Camp Shelby, Mississippi. The Japanese American arrived in Italy late May, 1944. The famous Japanese American 100th Infantry Battalion, already fighting in Italy and composed of former activated Hawaiian National Guardsmen, became the First Battalion of the New Regiment. The 100th Battalion was one of the first ground units to receive the Presidential Unit Citation for fighting in Italy.

RED CROSS PROGRAM

Officially acquainting its local chapters with WRA's post-exclusion trend, the American Red Cross Home Service Division has sent instructions to every chapter—one in each county in the United States—highlighting the relocation program and pointing out how local Red Cross Chapters can assist evacuee resettlers with family members in the service.

Home Service Division workers of the ARC have been advised to provide any needed service within their program to evacuees who are veterans, members of ex-servicemen's families, or members of families of active service men.

NISEI SOLDIERS' FAMILIES

At the same time WRA has suggested to District Relocation Officers that they contact Home Service Directors of chapters in their district to check on special services available through ARC to families of evacuee soldiers.

ARC emphasized to its Home Service Directors the immediate importance to newly relocated dependents of soldiers of its service providing reclassification of dependency allotments when servicemen's families move from centers. While dependents receive their chief support at projects they are usually eligible only for the \$37 maximum Class "B" allotment. After Resettlement and with a soldier son their chief support, the family may be eligible for the considerably higher Class "B-1" allotment.

ADDITIONAL ASSISTANCE

In addition to assisting in the application for family allowances, claims for pensions and other benefits, the Red Cross Home Service Program provides additional services and assistance to soldiers, veterans and their families. Chief among these are: (1) Assistance with communications between servicemen and their families when normal means are unsuccessful or unavailable; (2) supplying information on legislation and regulations affecting their group; (3) providing military and naval authorities and the Veterans Administration with information necessary in questions involving diagnosis, medical and psychiatric treatment, discharge, furlough or clemency, and for veterans ratings; (4) guidance and counselling in personal and family problems, or referral to appropriate agencies; and (5) financial assistance to servicemen, disabled ex-servicemen and their dependents and dependents of deceased servicemen, on the basis of need and not of citizenship, settlement or legal residence, but subject to certain limitations.

CORONET**MAGAZINE COVERS
100TH BATTALION**

The Purple Heart Battalion and why it fights so gloriously is explained in the leading article in the May issue of Coronet magazine.

Writer Sidney Carroll, who has seen wounded soldiers of the 100th Battalion come home to Honolulu and has interviewed such heroes as Tank Destroyer Masao Awakuni, traces the history of the Purple Heart Battalion which has "proved its loyalty with blood."

Carroll concludes his five-page article with this statement:

"While the prejudices of a 'white' and pious citizenry flourish in the United States, the men of the Nisei fight and die to gain a little respect from those same citizen patriots. The Nisei wants us to trust him—not with the trust of the patron or overlord, but with an abiding trust; as between brothers. That is why the gentleman of the Puka Puka fight so gloriously."

**CLEVELAND OPENS
SERVICE OFFICE**

The Resettlement Committee of Cleveland has just opened an office in the Community Services Building, 1001 Huron Road, Cleveland, and hired an executive secretary to help coordinate resettlement services for evacuees.

When WRA no longer exists, this office will fully assume any necessary coordinating community services.

The Resettlement Committee is voluntary in nature and represents a cross-section of prominent Clevelanders and some evacuees who are interested in the WRA program in Cleveland. Funds to defray overhead expenses were collected by the Committee under the chairmanship of George Trundle, Jr., from Issei and Nisei groups, Committee members themselves, and from Clevelanders at large.

28 families comprising 78 persons have lived in the hostel during this period; the size of families ranged from two to seven members; the average length of stay was ten days--the spread being, one family stayed one day and another family stayed two months before housing was finally obtained.

CHAPLAIN**CAPT. AKI HOPES
FOR EARLY PEACE**

Hope for a speedy victory over Japan was expressed by Capt. George Aki, 30, only Japanese American chaplain of the United States Army, born in the United States, who has adopted St. Louis as his home and is spending a leave with his wife, Mrs. Misaki Aki, and 8-month-old daughter, Jeanne, 135 North Bompert Ave., Webster Groves.

Captain Aki is one of approximately 400 Japanese Americans, 95 per cent of them Christians, in St. Louis and St. Louis County. Ordained a minister of the Congregational Christian Church June 11, 1942, he was formerly assistant pastor of Oakland Independent Congregational Church, Oakland, Cal. Captain and Mrs. Aki came to St. Louis from the Jerome Relocation Center, in March, 1944.

Miss Mary E. Brooks of the War Relocation Authority said Captain Aki is one of only three Nisei chaplains in the United States armed forces. However, the other two are natives of Hawaii. They are overseas, and Capt. Aki is awaiting an order to go across.
