Thus \$2,420.57, the amount released by individuals who signed the authorization and release, will transfer from the camouflage net fund to the Butte community fund.

animously approved approuncing rublicly its appreciation to those donors who signed the authorization and release waiving their ned rights in order that the present community fund could be created.

FAMOUS BATTALION

Activated on February 1, 1943, in response to request of many loyal American-born Japanese to ser-ve in the Armed Forces, the 442nd seta high standard of training at Camp. Shelby, Mississippi. The Japanese American arrived in Italy late May, 1944. The famous Japanese Amer -ican 100th Infantry Battalion, already fighting in Italy and composed of former activated Hawaiian National Guardsmen, became the First Battalion of the New Regiment. The 100th Battalion was one of the first ground units to receive the Presidentia 1 Unit Citation for fighting in Italy.

CROSS PROGRAM

Officially acquainting its local chapters with FRAL's post - exclusion trend, the American Red Cross Home Service Division has sent instructions to every shapter-rone in each county in the United States-highlighting the relocation program and pointing out how local Red Cross Chapters can assist evacuee re-settlers with family members in the service.

Home Sorvice Division workers of the ARC have been advised to provide any needed service within their program to evacuees who are veterans, members of ex-servicemen's families, or members of families of active service men.

SOLDIERS' FAMILIES NISEL

At the same time WRA has suggested to District Relocation Officers that they contact Home Service Directors of chapters in their district to check on special services available through RC to families of evacuee soldiers.

emphasized to its Home Service Directors the immediate importance to newly relocated dependents of soldiers of its service providing reclassification of dependency allotments when servicemen's families from centers. While dependents receive their chief support at projects they are usually eligible only for the \$37 maximum Class "B" allotment. After Resettlement and with a soldier son their chief support, the family may be eligible for the considerably higher Class "B-1" allotment.

ADDITIONAL ASSISTANCE

... In addition to assisting in the application for family allowances, claims for pensions and other benofits, the Red Cross Home Service Program provides additional services and assistance to soldiers, voterans and their families. Chief among these are: (1) Assistanco with communications between servicemen and their families when normal means are unsuccessful or unavailable; (2) supplying information on logislation and regulations affecting their group; (3) providing military and naval authorities and the Voterans Ad--ministration with information nocossary in quostions involving diagnosis, medical and psychiatric treatment, discharge, furlough or clomency, and for votorans ratings; (4) guidance and counselling in personal and family problems, or referral to appropriate agencies financial assistance to servicemen, disabled -cx-sorvicemen and their dependents and dependents of docoased servicemen, on the basis of need and not of citizenship, settlement or legal residence, but subject to cortain limitations.

CHAPLAIN CAPT. AKI HOPES FOR EARLY PEACE

Hope for a speedy victory over Japan was expressed by Capt. George Aki, 30, only Japanese American chaplain of the United States Army, born in the United States, who has adopted St. Louis as his home and is spending a leave with his wife, Mrs. Misaki Aki, and 8month-old daughter, Jeanne, 135 North Bompart Ave., Webster Groves.

Captain Aki is one of approximately 400 Japanese Americans, 95 per.cent of them Christians, in St. Louis and St. Louis County. Ordained a minister of the Congregational Christian Church June 11. 1942, he was formerly assistant pastor of Oakland Indopendent Congregational Church, Oakland, Cal. Captain and Mrs. Aki camo to St. Louis from the Jereme Rolocation Center, in March, 1944.

Miss Mary E. Brooks of the War Relocation Authority said Captain Aki is ono of only three Nisci chaplains in the United Statos armod forces. Howovor, the other two are natives of Hawaii. They are overseas, and .Capt. Aki is awaiting an order to go across.
