Victory - In-Europe Day was announced officially yesterday, May 8, by United States, Great Britain and Russia.

KIBEI**Courage Needed Says N.Y. Artist**

"A Kibei should not hesitate to face life among Caucasian Americans—all he needs is courage," Masaji Murai, of Granada and San Francisco, recently said at the ceramic studio of John Junge at 40 East 19 Street, N.Y. Working there under the pseudonym of "Buffly," which is becoming well-known in New York's art circles, Murai paints upon porcelain ware which is marketed through such exclusive shops as Abercrombie and Fitch and George Jensen's. He came to New York last August and lives with his wife in Brooklyn.

FUTURE DIFFICULT

"Our immediate future may be difficult, but if we regard ourselves as the sons and daughters of immigrants with the responsibility of creating good public relations for ourselves, we shall not only get along better but shall be building for the next generation," Murai said.

Speaking eagerly of the opportunity for artists in New York as "the city of tolerance," he offered as an example the fact that, in addition to his work for Junge, he had been hired on a free lance basis to paint birds from models at the Museum of Natural History in order to illustrate a scientific work by an ornithologist. There is such a great demand for specialist in New York, he said, that an Issei who could paint forget-me-nots, and only forget-me-nots, could find employment "in his field." The facilities for acquiring training, he added, are endless, and an artist could go on improving his skill indefinitely at the day and evening courses offered by the numerous art schools.

AD BRINGS PROTEST

The glaring anti-Japanese advertisement which appeared in the April 23 issue of the Monterey Peninsula Herald brought a storm of protest from readers in Northern California, ranging from thoughtful and moderate protests to "some that are not nearly so gentle" as the editor put it. The editor even felt the need to explain that the advertisement in question was accepted and published in the ordinary course of business and that the Herald does not reflect the views printed in the advertisement.

LETTERS FLOOD OFFICE

The advertisement, sponsored by the Monterey Bay Council on Japanese Relations, Inc., was headlined, "Organization to Discourage Return of Japanese to the Pacific Coast." It solicited membership in this organization, one of whose purposes is to discourage the return of Japanese, to California.

Printed here is one of the many letters of protest that flooded the Herald office.

"Editor, the Herald:

"Destroy Togo and Tojo with my blessing, but I protest with every ounce of decency in me, and advertisement you ran for the 'Monterey Bay Council on Japanese Relations, Inc.' How could you accept such a dastardly approach to race riots--and on the eve of the S.F. Peace Conference! The rooting out of disloyal Japanese is the work of our very efficient F.B.I., not that of a vigilante group.

'PHOOEY!' SAYS ONE

"Who are the members of this 'council'? Why don't they come out in the open? They hide their real intent under a sop to the innocent by excepting 'those (Japanese) in the uniform of the Armed Services, etc.' Phooey! Are we to exclude all Germans and Italians too?

"I think the 'Prayer of Peace' by St. Francis printed alongside the 'council' excrement, should bring many a cynical laugh.

WELFARE ALTERS GRANT PAYMENTS

The welfare department is changing its system of payment of assistance grants, so that all grants to eligible persons who are in need will be made as of the first of the month beginning with the June 1st payment.

Until now payments were made to half of the people as of the 10th of month up to the 10th of the following month and the other half was paid from the 25th of the month to the 25th of the following month. This system made it necessary to use considerable more clerical help and there were often unavoidable delays in getting a payroll out.

In order to change over to the new system of payment it was necessary to make the payments to persons eligible for payment of May 10th for two-thirds of the month which brings the payment to June 1st.

Persons receiving checks for assistance due on May 10th will find that their regular amount has been reduced by one-third. This is the portion which would ordinarily be for the period of the first to the 10th of June.

As of June 1st, these people will receive the regular payment in the regular amount for the month of June.

It is hoped that nobody will be caused any hardship or consternation by this change, especially since the June 1st payment should arrive much earlier than the date on which payments had been received previously.

Only cigarette and sacked tobacco will be on sale and no pipe tobacco will be sold, stated Mas Sakai, assistant general manager of the enterprises.

CALIFORNIA MAN SEEKS LABORERS

Leonard Brothers, San-ger, Calif., growers, packers, and shippers of grapes are looking for workers. George Tanaka is now on the project and will remain about a week, or until he has secured the desired number of workers. Tanaka will interview all persons who may be interested in the work. He is interested in getting about forty single men at this time, although he has housing for one family now, and other family housing is opening up. The company wants at least three workers in a family group, because of the housing shortage. This could include high school age workers. This is year round work, paying 80¢ an hour, with housing furnished. Tanaka will interview applicants in the blocks in both Canal and Butte camps. For further information persons should call at their block manager's office, or contact Tanaka through the relocation office in each camp.

WRA TAKES MEASURES TO HELP FIND HOUSING

Extraordinary measures to assist resettling evacuees in finding housing have been outlined by H. Rex Lee, relocation division chief, in instructions sent to all field relocation officers.

To further this effort, Lee said, a WRA staff member will be assigned to most large offices with the specific responsibility of organizing community efforts toward providing housing for relocating evacuees.

Other principal steps to be taken include: (1) Establishment of a clearing house for all available housing information, either as a part of the community activities program to assist resettlers or as a part of the relocation office; (2) Improving provisions for temporary housing accommodations to take care of the resettler while he is finding permanent living quarters; and (3) Closer examination of all phases of local public housing programs and of FHA privately financed building programs.

Primary responsibility for finding housing for his family still rests with the resettler," Lee said, "However, WRA offices should spare no effort to better coordinate the efforts of all groups working on housing and to make as much information available as possible to the home-hunting relocatee."
