WELFARE ALTERS GRANT PAYMENTS

The welfare department is changing its system of as sist ance payment · of grants so that all grants to eligible persons who are in need will be made as of the first of the month beginning with the June 1st payment.

Until now payments were made to half of the people as of the 10-th o f month up to the 10th of following month and other half was paid the from the 25th of the month to the 25th of the following month. This system made it necessary to use considerable more clerical help and there were often unavoidable delays in getting a payroll out.

In order to change over to the new system of payment it was necessary to make the payments to persons eligible for payment of May 10th for twothirds of the month which brings the payment to June 1st.

Persons receiving checks for assistance due on May 10th will find that their regular amount has been reduced by one-third. This is the portion which would ordinarily be for the period of the first to the 10th of June.

As of June 1st, these people will receive the regular payment in the regular amount for the month of June.

· It is hoped that nobody will be caused any hardship or con sternation by this change, especially since the June 1st payment should arrive much earlier than the date on which payments had been received previously.
