In connection with appeals from exclusion or-ders, the excludees may request written statements. to be forwarded to the Western Defense Command by appointed project personwho have sufficient basis of knowledge of the excludee or his record at the center. Personne l furnishing such statements must secure approval from the Project Director Such statements may expedito action on the appeal.

GILA LAND LEASE. EXPIRES OCI.

A letter from Washington received by the farm managoment stated that the land loase on the Gila River Rolocation Center will expire October 7, 1945; land will be returned to the Indian Reservation.

This means that nurseries of flowers, plante, and shrubs will be closed down by October 7.

The WRA is reducing livestock rapidly and putting in about 17,500 head of cattle privately owned. As the .project cattle doorenses t h. a private owned cattle will increase. To keep the soil working and fresh the planting of alfalfa is being done as soon as the vegetable fields close. About 1,900 acres of now, alfalfa have been planted

already. The harvest for the month of April are as follows: 394,414 pounds of vegetables, 70 tons of hay, 12,357 dozen eggs. 6,455 gallons of milk. The vegetable with the biggest harvest was strawberries with 6,301 pounds. Six carloads of vegetables have been sent to other relocation centers.

SINATRA URGES RACE TOLERANCE

Frank Sinatra recently speke on "Racial Tolerance" ata high school Fe llowship Group in Philadelphia ..

Grayce Kaneda, formerly of the Rohwer Relocation Center, who was in the audience describes Sinatra's visit as follows:

"Sinatra, was just what everyone expected him to be -- friendly, natural, and sincere. He was dressed in a loose sport coat and deeply-pleated slacks, and wore a large grey bow tie. He was surprised by a new audience which did not go completely wild. However, "ohs! and 'Fran n-nkie' were heard whispered all over the room.

"During his talk Sinatra said that 'Fellowship Hou se is one of the most wonderful things I have seen in my life.' He said that more should be done for the House and its cause. He edded that after he roturns from his overseas trip to the armed forces in May, he would organize a rally to raise funds for the House to carry on its inter-racial and interfaith work on a groater scale. He indicated that he would interest other talents from the West and East Coasts in carrying forward this type of work, he said, 'disunity only helps the enemy.'

"After Frank Sinatra finished his talk, a more dozen or so were fortunato in gotting his autograph. My sister and Ruby Tomino, who were almost in front of him were among, those who got his much-prized signature. For the rest the day they were doliriously happy oxpres sions."

OREGON'S LAND LAW

That two sections of Oregon's new Alien Land Law "of very doubtful constitutionality" was the are "of opinion expressed this week in an analysis of the law prepared by the WRA Solicitor's office in Washington.

PROVIDES NEW PENALTY

"The new Oregon law ... does not change the ... prothe alien land law of 1921, but/ merely hibitions of provides a new penalty and...sets up certain presumptions of evidence ", Edwin E. Ferguson, Solicitor, stated in a supplement to Opinion No. 82, sent recently to all projects.

If an alien evacuee wishes to return to Oregon as a farm laborer, or to live and work on or manage land (wholly owned and possessed by citizens of the U.S.) there is no reason in law why he should not do so, Ferguson said. He should be able, however, to furnish evidence that he has no interest in the land if he is called upon to do so by Oregon law enforcement of ficials.

ALIEN NEEDS EVIDENCE

Sclicitor advised that such evidence may be in the form of powers of attorney or employment contract s making it clear that any compensation is for service s rendered and that it is not dependent on the crops produced. here the alien manages the operations on behalf of the owner, the agreements should be supplemented by accurate and complete records. To show that he is actually an agent and not a share cropper, tenant or owner, he should have bank accounts; sales receipts and expense statements that clearly reflect this to be the case.

The winners garnered a total of 9 hits through the offerings of B. Tsu-tsui while B. Mitsuyoshi was being touched for 7 bingles.


