GIRL DISCLOSES THREATS DURING CALIFORNIA VISIT ICKES BLAMES OFFICIALS FOR CALIF. TERRORISM

Miss Mary Masuda, of 49-11-D, who was threatened and told to get out of Santa Ana by several Orange County farmers during her short term visit there last week, returned to Rivers Thursday.

Miss Masuda has four brothers with army service records, one of whom was killed in action, another injured.

On the night of May 11, several men came to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Trudeau, where Mary was staying. One of the men named Geisler called Trudeau names for letting the Nisei girl into his house. Trudeau, she learned, was one of the leaders of the group to keep Japanese out.

Miss Masuda explained she tried to reason with the men that her brothers were fighting as well as their men. Another man Toad Patterson, then told her that as long as she had come in a taxi, he would get her a taxi to get back to Los Angeles in, but that maybe she wouldn't get there alive.

Sheriff Jesse L. Elliot, who at first stated that there was nothing he could do about it, was reported on May 16 as saying he will send a deputy to contact the men named in Miss Masuda's statement.

Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes this week blamed California officials for not prosecuting the hoodlums who are carrying on a program of planned terrorism against Japanese Americans who have returned to California.

"In the absence of vigorous local law enforcement, a pattern of planned

terrorism by hoodlums has developed," he said. "It is a matter of national concern because this lawless minority seems determined to employ its Nazi storm trooper tactics against loyal Japanese Americans and law abiding Japanese aliens in spite of state laws and constitutional safeguards.

The WRA office in Santa Ana said it would wait now for the sheriff to act to stop the alleged threats.

Miss Masuda stated that after reports concerning her appeared in the papers, she received many sympathetic telephone calls from Caucasians. She was appreciative of the aid given her by WRA officials there, who not only urged her to give a full report of the incident but also ask all other returnees to report such occurrences immediately.

"Many of the evacuees' Nisei sons are fighting the Japanese enemy in the Philippines, at Okinawa and in other Pacific combat areas. They are far more in the American tradition than the race baiters fighting a private war safely at home.

"The shameful spectacle of those incidents taking place at the back door of the San Francisco conference, now in session to develop means by which men of all races can live together in peace, must be ended once and for all."

Soldiers Hurt Some Time Ago

Sgt. Fred F. Hiroto, formerly of Rivers and Glendale, Calif., was injured in Europe Oct. 28 of last year. He has already recovered and is back in active duty.

Jimi Oda, formerly of block 25, now of Ogdën, Utah, was injured in Europe recently. He is the cousin of Todd Sakohira who was killed in Italy on June 17, 1944. Both are former natives of Fowler, Calif.

CONSERVE WATER SUPPLY

The necessity of conserving Butte camp's water supply was voiced yesterday by Joe H. Janeway, project engineer, as hot weather and greater use of water brought the tank supply down to a dangerous low.

Residents should not water the streets or their lawns with the domestic water supply, he said. Water from the canal will be used for such purposes.

Also, cooler water should be turned off at nights and when fans are not in use.

Unless all persons cooperate, Butte's water pump will not be able to keep up with the outflow, and residents will not only be inconvenienced by a lack of shower water but also will be faced with greater fire hazards because of low water pressure.

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UNBLOCKING OF FUNDS

To aid WRA in its relocation and liquidation program, the Treasury Department has informed the W.R.A. that they will unblock all but a limited number of the accounts of evacuees on the Army clear list.

Through the Project Director, forms to request unblocking orders will be forwarded to the Federal Reserve Bank in San Francisco. The bank will determine whether the statements on the individual forms are correct. Individual unblocking orders will be mailed in care of the Project Director, and private banks will be notified.

THOSE INELIGIBLE

Evacuees in these categories are ineligible to apply for unblocking orders through the special arrangement with Treasury: (1) persons not on the Army clear list, (2) those who have been issued specific blocking orders, (3) evacuees who have represented or acted as agents for any person outside the continental United States on or since July 26, 1941, and (4) persons who now hold funds belonging to blocked nationals. As far as can be determined there are no persons in category (2) at Gila.

Those who are not eligible may, however, apply for reconsideration of their cases by filing Form TFG-1 with the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco. Business enterprises may apply for unblocking through the same procedure.

PARTIAL RELEASE

Certain individuals may be denied unblocking orders. However, they will be permitted to withdraw sufficient funds to allow them to relocate. Former internees whose accounts remain blocked may upon application withdraw up to \$200 a month for living expenses. Other persons whose accounts are not unblocked may withdraw as much as \$500 per month.

Any blocked person or enterprises may apply for a special license which will permit sufficiently free use of funds to conduct business.

Evacuees who wish further information or wish to secure necessary application forms should see the project attorney or the relocation program officer. Resettled evacuees may communicate with the director of the project from which they relocated.

On Student Returnees

Mabel G. Crumby, a assistant professor of education, San Jose State College, has written an article on "How the Schools Can Prepare for the Return of the Japanese American Children," in the April, 1945 issue of Sierra Educational News published by the California Teachers Association.

Professor Crumby states that there are two avenues open to the teachers: work with the parents and with their children. The article points out that the FTA, mothers clubs, and newspapers can play a vital part in the right development, or in the

dwarfing, of children's personalities -- those of Japanese Americans and those of American stock. In fact, the latter may grow in intolerance and race hatred unless parents and teachers give the right guidance in relation to this problem of the children's return.

More than through what the teachers says however, is her own attitude toward the child. This she will reveal to her class as she graciously receives each returning "citizen" and makes him feel he is welcomed home, the article concludes.

FRESNO PASTOR OPENS HOSTEL

The Fresno Japanese Methodist Church, situated at the corner of Kern and D Streets, 1260 Kern St., in westside Fresno, is now ready to provide emergency lodging for evacuees who return to make arrangements for family relocation or to seek employment," according to Rev. Hideo Hashimoto of the church.

The Congregational and Methodist Churches, both nationally and locally, are supporting the project, which is open to all returning evacuees regardless of religious faith.

The building is limited as to facilities. Only beds, mattresses, and blankets (no sheets) will be furnished; these will be arranged on dormitory basis. A shower has been installed. Other pertinent information follows:

1. Lodgers bring their own sheets, towels, and personal effects with them.

2. No meals will be served. No kitchen facilities are available. Restaurants are located nearby.

3. No smoking in the building.

4. Lodgers will be charged 25 cents per night to cover expenses.

5. Lodgers are urged to make their stay as short as possible to give place for other desiring lodging. Limit, two weeks.

6. Those desiring lodging should apply to Rev. Hideo Hashimoto, 1228 Kern Street, Fresno 1, Calif., in advance and receive confirmation. They should notify him of the time and date of arrival and the mode of travel.

7. The pastor will be available for consultation at the church office.

8. The phone number of the parsonage is Fresno 4-4135.

DETROIT INDUSTRIES CUT WORKING HOURS

Curtailment of indus-
trial work in hours is tak-
ing place in Detroit and,
according to Wendell P.
Geo, Detroit relocation
officer, many evacuees are
now focusing their inter-
est on Michigan farming.

The industrial situa-
tion has not directly af-
fected Michigan resettlers
yet, but the 60-hour-plus
war overtime week is grad-
ually being trimmed down
to the standard 48-hour
war week, and some plants
have been granted permis-
sion to cut back to 40-
hours per week. Reconver-
sion to civilian goods is
moving slowly in Detroit
and it will be several
months before those idle
because of outbacks are
re-employed.

Male workers are still
finding immediate employ-
ment, if at curtailed
hours, and, in some cases,
lower starting wages.
With the exception of work
for trained stenographers
and domestics, female em-
ployment is extremely
slack. Domestic and gar-
dening offers are still
numerous, and the wages
for this type of work are
high in the Detroit dis-
trict.

BUFFALO, N.Y. HAS FEDERAL HOUSING

Evacuees employed in
essential industries are
eligible and can obtain
housing in government pro-
ject in suburban Buffalo,
George Graff, the Western
New York district reloca-
tion officer, revealed.

"Government housing au-
thorities met with repre-
sentatives from the Bu-
ffalo Resettlement Com-
mittee and myself recently,
to discuss the problem of
securing proper hous-
ing for evacuees," Graff
said.

"The results have been
fruitful. The housing au-
thorities said that quart-
ers for small family
groups are available now.

ARMY, NAVY EXTENDS 'SURVIVING SON' POLICY

In a joint extension of their "sole surviving son" policy, the War and Navy Departments have announced that they will place in non-hazardous duty other service members of families in which two or more persons have died in line of duty or are reported missing in action or prisoners of war.

War and Navy Department officials estimate that the new policy will affect approximately 10,000 individuals in both services. They stated that no action to reassign surviving members will be taken unless requested by the serviceman involved or by a member of his immediate family.

Requests involving Army personnel should be addressed to the Adjutant General, Washington, D.C. Cases which previously have been submitted and denied should be resubmitted for consideration under the new, broader policy, the joint statement advised.

CASUALTIES

Casualties considered under the new plan will include servicemen who have been killed, died as a result of wounds, accident or disease, or have been reported missing or prisoners.

Non-hazardous duty may mean assignment to the rear area of an active theater, duty in an inactive theater, or duty in the United States.

The persons making application should furnish the name and relationship of the writer to all members of the immediate family. For members in the armed forces grade, serial number, organization and station assignment should also be included. Full information as to death, capture, or missing status of family members involved should be given in the request.
