From far flung points in Europe and in the Pacific, letters no longer will come home to Rivers, for many Nisei soldiers from Gila, 18 to be exact, have fallen in the foxholes they bug or were stopped for the last

SOLDIERS, CIVILIANS approximately 202 civilians and on the home front, approximately 202 civilians of Rivers have died of illness and accidents since the center became the temporary home of some 14,000 of us.

It is to those fallon comrades of this center to be specific and of all other fallen comrades of all races throughout the nation and the world in general that we the rest of the nation today to pay respects on join this Momorial Day.

There is a bigger significance in Memorial Day this year than others because of the number of men who have boon killed in conflict and because of the cause for which they have died and are dying.

FIGHT FOR CAUSE
Men have fought and are fighting for a right to return to their mansions, or to their shacks. Men have died so that their families may live free from op-pression. Men have fought so that these of all races will be accepted on their character and ability rather than on their color. Millions of specific ideals and goals, each a little different from the other, all peint in the same general direction -- to clear the way for the common man's right to breathe, act, and think frooly and without foar, and to attain that froodom onco and for all timo.

Today we need to remember the dead and the dying with more than just respect and sympathy for those who wont ahoad, but with a promise to keep alive the troasuros for which they gave lives.

To date our search has been unsuccessful. In any ovent wo plan to stay in Cleveland for a time after the hostel closes to help evacuees in any way we can.

"At the present we have the hostel fully reserved until the week of June 24. This will give those who come to the hostel between now and that time a mini mum of three weeks to make relocation plans. All hostelers will be expected to move from the hostel not later than July 15.

"This stop by the Baptist Home Mission Society does not mean that we regard Cleveland as unfavorable for relocation. We feel Cleveland is as favorable as any other area in the country."

Pvt. Iwasaki's lotter in parts is as follows:

The 442nd did a neat job in Italy. They sort of opened up the offensive and they put the finishing touches to it.

"As we stopped in one French city we could tell that the people were happy over Hitler's death and the surrendering of the Nazis.

"Then we went into Belgium. We stopped at one city and ate there. A lot of the boys threw candy at civilians and kids and how they went wild.

"After traveling on wo piled off and marched through a town (in Garmany). It really is a scene of destruction. I can say that the air force really did a noat job of leveling off the city. There was
