CALIFORNIA HAS TAX EXEMPTION FOR VETERANS

Veterans are exempt from taxes to the extent of \$1,000 in property value under a provision of the California State Constitution.

To claim such exemption the veteran or servicemen must appear in person and make affidavit before the county assessor as to information required by him. However, if an applicant is unable to attend in person before the assessor then the affidavit may be subscribed to before any person authorized to administer an oath.

Thus a qualified evaouse should write his county assessor giving his reason for failing to appear in person and request necessory forms in order to subscribe to such affidavit as may be required before a notary in a relocation contor.

Affidavits must be filed with the assessor by the last Monday in June.

The exception does not apply to any person owning property worth \$5,000 or more or "whose wife owns property worth \$5,000 or more."

New Rule Eases Parolee Travel

New procedures have eased traveling restrictions for parolees and will eliminate some of the delays which have been encountered by them, stated Dillon S. Myer, national director. Procedures:

(1) Provide for prompt approval of the travel pormit authorizing the parolees to proceed to his destination;

(2) Direct the parolee to report to an officer of the Service or in some instances to a designated public official, within 24 hours after arrival at his destination;

(3) Provide that travol permits shall not be detrimental to the national security.

The San Francisco Chroncilo, which has maintained a last Friday, reprinmended Superior Judge Lawler of Se-saving the lives of a attle for chalf hearted sentence in the case of arsenist Harolf Burton, who was fined \$1000.

"California is all too familiar with halfheartedness of worse on the part of peace officers regarding outrages against the persons or property of Americans of Japanese descent. Now the State of Washington furnishes an example at the judicial level.

SEVERITY JUSTIFIED "For the crime of burning four homes belonging to evacuated Japanose, Superior Judge James I Lawler, of Scattle has accepted a plea of second-dogroo from Harold S. Burton, and fined Burton \$1000.

"Burton was allowed to plead in second degree because the houses were unoccupied when he fired them. This deal in itself, in view of the necessity to set up an example of West Coast hoodlums, was questionable onough. But, in addition, Judgo Lawler meted somcthing like the minimum possible punishment, even under the. second-dogree plea. He was empowered to impose a \$5000 fine and sont onco up to 10 years in prison, or both.

Pets such as cats and dogs may be shipped in accordance with state laws and regulation, stated Malcolm E. Pitts, acting WRA director.

railroads Since most will accept pets such as cats and .dogs as checkable baggage and transport them in the baggage car on the porsonal transportation ticket of the traveler, evacuees desiring to ship pots shall be permitted to do so provided the pets are transported as a part of tho free baggage allowance thoy are entitled to under thoir personal transport ation ticket. I f ovacuces are unwilling to so use their free baggage allowence, shipment will be made at their expenses.

The shipment of pets is subject to state laws and regulations; all such laws and regulations must be complied with. Passenger agents will be able to furnish full particular in each case.
