Resettlement assistance for families of three or more members who need help in buying household equipment or furniture during the first month of relocation is now available at the welfere offices i n Butte or Canal. either This service was formerly given by local welfare agonoies in various parts of the country to evacuoes after they had relocated.

BASIS OF NEED Project Director Pennett said that this assistance is available only on the basis of need and oan only be available to onotenth of the families in This WRA asthe .conter. sistance will be available only to those who need tomporary help in reestablis h ing themselves and their households. Needs will include household equipment, transportation of from railway stations to residence, and one menth's rent.

Single persons o, r couples without children are ineligible for rosottlement assistance tocause it is assumed they oan get furnished apartments. Families returning. to their old homes which are furnished would also be ineligible as well as those who tako jobs where furnished housing is provided by employer.

DEDUCTIONS When a family applies for this assistance, eash resources such as currency on hand, funds in a bank, loan association, U. S. Postal Savings account, the market value of bonds, major items of personal property or income antifrom property or cipated investments will have 'to he deducted from the maximum amount allowable for such a family.

(Editorial from Arizona Daily Star, June 3, 1945) "... In the town of Parlior, Calif., the law abdicated in favor of community opinion, in the case of the farmer who fired a shotgun into the home of Chries Iwasaki, a Japanese American. The guilty man

was given a six-month sentence -- suspended.

"L.B. Crosby, the justice of peace, defended his leniency with the plea that feeling in the community was such that he did not feel that public opinion would support any other sentence. The community docided that if he was lenient with the guilty man, there would be no more shootings! In other words, the law abdicated in favor of a localized public opinion, sections. It was dosigrad which in this instance is merely polite termino-

logy for mob rule.

"It will be our national shame, and not morely a matter of one state, if this situation is not corrected. Those Nisoi were removed from their homes and business due to an army order under the stress of military nocessity. Most of them have behaved in a manner which displayed exceptional poise and dignity undor oxtremo stress. Now, the government which ordered thom removed, has issued orders for their return. I t is up to the government to see that they are permitted to return to their homes and businesses without being met with gun fire and arson at the hands of some super-patriots. It is equally a task for the government which moved them to see to it that they have the protoction, under the law to which they are entitled. They 'obeyed the law when they were moved. The law should insure them safety as they return.

"Any other action, such as the one taken at Parlier, an abdication of law in the face of mob rule, regardless of what protty words are used by the justice of peace to explain his lenioney. It takes little imagination to figure out what would have happened in Parlior had the shotgun been fired into

other man's home by Iwasaki."
