PFC WADA WINS STAR FOR VALOR

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY -- Pfc. Takashi Wada of Sanger, Calif., whose mother lives at 4-8-C in Canal, recently was awarded the Bronze Star for heroic achievement in action.

The presentation was made by Lieutenant Colonel Alfred A. Pursall of Crystal City, Mo, commander of the 3rd Fattalion, 442nd Japanese American Combat Team, et a ceremony in Carrara, famous marble mining town in northern Italy.

Wada was cited for risking his life to rescue an injured comrade when their unit was attached to the 36th "Texas" Division and fighting in the French Vosces Mountains.

During a German artillery berrage, a loosened boulder rolled over a slit trench, crushing the pecupant and bowing him exposed to flying shell fragments. Wada and another rifleman, heedless of the danger, exposed themselves above ground and extricated the injured man.

Wada administered first aid while the other went for a litter. Then they evacuated the casualty.

Wada also helds a Distinguished Unit Badge, the Purple Heat, a battle star for the Rome-Arno campaign on the Fifth Army front, the Good Conduct Medal and the Combat Infantryman Badge.

The 230 diplomas that were received by high school graduates this year and those given in the past two years will be passports into normal lives and into colleges outside.

STANDARD HIGH

Students who have relocated to outside schools and are making the honor rolls both in scholarship and activities are proof that Rivers schools, working under handicaps, have been able to keep it's head above, national average. And the fact that colleges like Wellesley, which gave scholarships to Rivers students last year and again are more than willing to accept local students, is credit to the high standards here and to the excellence of students who have taken what facilities Rivers had to offer and made the most of it.

Camp life may have stunted the growth of evacuees in various ways, but it has not in education. The opportunities now offered to prospective college students, in fact, seems almost better than it ever was! Japanese American students have been recognized as needing financial aid and encouragement, and various organizations are helping them to get just that.

JOB WELL DONE

We feel fortunate that the education of youth has been the least hit by evacuation. We join the communities of both Butte and Canal in thanking the education staff, both appointed staff and evacuee educators, for a tough job well done. We look forward to the successful relocation of students, who will take advantage of the opportunities opened by the Nisei who sacrificed so that their friends might live, and by other Americans who are accepting and aiding resettlers.
