RESERVE CORPS STATUS CANCELED EFFECTIVE JUNE

Effective from this month, all citizens of Japanese ancestry and those Japanese aliens who volunteer for induction and who are forwarded by their selective service local boards for induction will not be transferred to the enlisted reserve corps after induction, the leave office was notified yesterday. Such registrants will be inducted and forwarded to reception centers for processing and assignment in accordance with current instructions for other registrants.

Miscellaneous and aliens who volunteer and who have been or will be inducted and transferred to the enlisted reserve prior to June 1, 1945, will be called to active service not later than June 30, 1945.

Summer Classes Are Voluntary

The Butte Elementary School will open its summer session Monday, June 18.

From 8 to 9:30 make-up work in arithmetic, reading, English, or social studies will be offered. No pupils are to be enrolled for this work unless the teacher has notified them.

From 9:30 to 10:30 a general club program will be offered in activities such as hobbies, library, music appreciation, crafts, games, sewing, girl and boy scouts, etc. A weekly movie of educational, feature, and comic films will also be shown at this time.

Attendance is strictly voluntary and will have no effect on promotions. Parents of pupils designated for summer work are urged to have their child attend school until they relocate. As soon as parents are sure

Summer Session Starts Monday

Butte High School summer session, which begins on June 18, will provide only for make-up work to remove failures and incompletes, announced W.F. Miller, superintendent of education. No credit courses will be offered.

Enrollment will be held today and tomorrow from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the school office. Only students who want to remove their incompletes or those who have a below C average may enroll. Boys who are 18 and believe they will be taken into the Army before Jan. 1 may take P.O.D. and English IV provided they will have enough credits to graduate.

Remedial work in English will be emphasized. Instrumental music activities will be continued.

ITALY

PFC. WADA WINS STAR FOR VALOR

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY -- Pfc. Takashi Wada of Sanger, Calif., whose mother lives at 4-8-C in Canal, recently was awarded the Bronze Star for heroic achievement in action.

The presentation was made by Lieutenant Colonel Alfred A. Pursall of Crystal City, Mo., commander of the 3rd Battalion, 442nd Japanese American Combat Team, at a ceremony in Carrara, famous marble mining town in northern Italy.

Wada was cited for risking his life to rescue an injured comrade when their unit was attached to the 36th "Texas" Division and fighting in the French Vosges Mountains.

During a German artillery barrage, a loosened boulder rolled over a slit trench, crushing the occupant and leaving him exposed to flying shell fragments. Wada and another rifleman, heedless of the danger, exposed themselves above ground and extricated the injured man.

Wada administered first aid while the other went for a litter. Then they evacuated the casualty.

Wada also holds a Distinguished Unit Badge, the Purple Heart, a battle star for the Rome-Arno campaign on the Fifth Army front, the Good Conduct Medal and the Combat Infantryman Badge.

EDUCATION GOES ON

Thanks to the rigid standards set and maintained by the teaching staff of the Rivers schools, the youth in this center have not suffered the educational setbacks that might have been suffered through the disruption of normal living. The 230 diplomas that were received by high school graduates this year and those given in the past two years will be passports into normal lives and into colleges outside.

STANDARD HIGH

Students who have relocated to outside schools and are making the honor rolls both in scholarship and activities are proof that Rivers schools, working under handicaps, have been able to keep its head above national average. And the fact that colleges like Wellesley, which gave scholarships to Rivers students last year and again are more than willing to accept local students, is credit to the high standards here and to the excellence of students who have taken what facilities Rivers had to offer and made the most of it.

Camp life may have stunted the growth of evacuees in various ways, but it has not in education. The opportunities now offered to prospective college students, in fact, seems almost better than it ever was! Japanese American students have been recognized as needing financial aid and encouragement, and various organizations are helping them to get just that.

JOB WELL DONE

We feel fortunate that the education of youth has been the least hit by evacuation. We join the communities of both Butte and Canal in thanking the education staff, both appointed staff and evacuee educators, for a tough job well done. We look forward to the successful relocation of students, who will take advantage of the opportunities opened by the Nisei who sacrificed so that their friends might live, and by other Americans who are accepting and aiding resettlers.

**Fox Film Corp.
Employs Nisei**

The New York office of the Twentieth Century Fox Film Corporation of California has just engaged about 25 Nisei residing in New York City for parts as Japanese officers and soldiers in a film it will soon produce. It is based on the current best-seller, "The American Guerilla in the Philippines."

The New York WRA relocation office teletyped this job offer to the centers promptly on its receipt from the film company, but all the jobs were taken within a few days by evacuees already residing in New York. The company received more than 50 applications for the available jobs.

The movie is to be filmed in Puerto Rico beginning late in July. Traveling expenses to and from Puerto Rico, in addition to the salary, will be paid by the film corporation for each of the men selected for a part in the picture.

FINAL HARVEST OF HAY NEAR

The hay crew is putting up enough hay to last until late this fall, which will probably be the last chance to harvest hay before the land is turned back to the Pima Indian Agency, stated Don Stewart, acting chief of agriculture. Yoshio Sato of 54-4-A, who is planning to relocate, had been in charge of the hay and seeding crews, and Ishimi Tagawa of 63-10-B will take Sato's place as foreman, Steward announced.

The dairy will operate on into the fall if enough trained milkers are available to do the milking. Milk production has increased through better use of pastures, balance of grain feeding, and careful milking.

The dairy herd is approximately the same size as that it was a year ago. Culled animals have been replaced by fresh heifers.

Censaburo Ishimoto is in charge of the dairy farm with Motoharu Osako as sub-foreman in charge of feeding and care of the cattle.

CONNECTICUT Miss Montgomery Aids Relocation

Miss Frances Montgomery, former Butte High School instructor, who is intensely interested in the successful relocation of evacuees, has personally looked into the following job offers and has written to the project concerning them.

The location of these jobs is near New Haven, Conn.

One is poultry farm work, Guilford, Conn., for older couple up to 60 years which is sober, steady, and willing to stay close to the job. Could have one high school student. \$100 to \$150 plus quarters with radio, light, bath, chicken and eggs, garden plot, access to swimming pool. Light work gathering eggs, grading, packing. Could work to 80 or 85 years.

Another is an apple orchard and vegetable farm. A couple or family, \$100 for the man with quarters for family plus light, water radio, heating plant, garden plot. If wife cares to do house work, she would get prevailing wages. Man must understand pruning, speak English, drive truck and tractor.

Dairyman would furnish 7-room quarters, 2 quarts milk daily and pay \$150 for dairyman who understands cows.

All employers insist the jobs are post war permanent.

VEGETABLE FARM PLANS CLOSING

Kambo Minamide hit a double, single and a triple for the Taiyos.

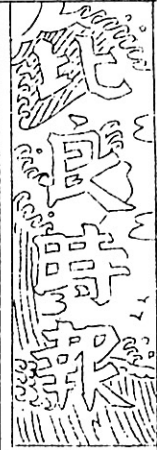
