Deadline for Selective Service Registration for 18 year old youths is today at 4 p.m. at the high school offices for the two communities.

At Butte, H.C. Freeland and Nagao Fujita, registrars, are taking them as they come. Of the estimated 100 eligibles in Rivers, 20 had registered up to today in Butte. Figures for Canal were unavailable.

The announced total of 420 eligibles has been revised upon the knowledge that 18 and 19 year olds had been registered in the Assembly Centers. John Landward, administrative assistant, warns the youths that every one of their age group must register.

Experts Study Coop Set-Up Primary Organizers Meet

Chairman and vice-chairman of Sections I, II, and III of the cooperative representatives from the blocks, three business experts from the Community Enterprises, and six committeemen from the Butte Study and Research Committee are meeting this afternoon as primary organizers of a cooperative in Gila.

The Study and Research committee has prepared a cooperative plan to present to Masato Kato, co-chairman of the committee.

Thursday night, to Section I and II, and last night to Section III and interested people, James Shelly, superintendent of Enterprises outlined WRA's suggested form in the institution of a cooperative. Gilbert Kiramitsu explained the present Community Enterprises set-up, and spoke on the necessity of having cooperatives.

Army Control For Camps Sought

Chairman Reynolds, Democrat, North Carolina, of the senate military affairs committee announced today a plan to restore army control over Japanese relocation camps to halt what he called "pampering" and anti-American demonstrations in these colonies, according to an

AP report from Washington. Dillon S. Myer, chief of the WRA, will be called before the subcommittee to investigate camps headed by Chairman Chandler, to be questioned on the situation, after which the committee intends to visit the Japanese in the Colonies.

53 PERCENT FAVOR JAPANESE RETURN TO WEST COAST

Results of a recent survey by the Gallup Poll in five western states on the question whether evacuated persons of Japanese ancestry should be allowed to return to their homes on the Pacific coast, revealed that 53% of the people polled in California, Washington, Oregon, Arizona and Nevada, favor-

ed the return of citizens of Japanese ancestry.

Twenty-four per cent would allow only citizens to return, while 29 per cent would permit all to return. Thirty-one per cent would allow none to return, while the other 16% was undecided at present.

National opinion on the same question declared that 61% of the persons polled would allow citizens to return, while 35% would permit all to return to their west coast homes. Seventeen per cent would allow none to return while 22% were undecided.

RURAL WAR PRODUCTION TRAINING PROGRAM BEGUN

Backed by Out of School Youth Administration (OSYA) the night school at Rivers has instituted a Rural War Production Training Program of which the intensive classes in dairying are now being conducted in Butte and to begin in Canal Monday night in the first of a series of courses offered, announced W.C. 'Tom' Sawyer, superintendent of schools.

Monday night, three other classes in the series will also start. In Butte, an intensive job training class in wood work will be conducted five nights a week from 7 to 10 under Howard Brunell, Butte high school drafting teacher at 43-1-D. A similar class under Marion Lester Brooks, Canal high school woodshop teacher, will be held in the other community. A theory and labor training course in poultry will commence in Butte on the same night with instructor David King, high school science teacher.

The OSYA program is operated by partly federal and partly state funds administered by the state. By coming under it, the school system here is provided with funds and will be able to obtain tools and machinery that the schools have not been able to get unaided.

(b) One member can have only one vote.

(c) Board of Directors are elected by members.

(d) Any surplus may be returned to the members by the decision of the Board of Directors.

What kind of work are they doing? Producing cutter for our rafts? Making nylon hose for our lady's pins? Turning out chewing gum for stenos and college girls? Well, hardly. Some are fighting. Some are helping the men who fight. Some are turning out munitions and trucks and planes and tanks and what-not.

Out of every eighteen men who formerly worked to clothe and feed and house and entertain us, ten are now at war work. The amount of time that people used to spend to raise our standard of living has been cut nearly in half. The other half goes for war work.

Small wonder, then, that there's a shortage of butter, a shortage of meat, a shortage of clothing, a shortage of housing material, and transportation. Those who realize the reason will help with cheerfulness. Those who are ignorant or hostile will squawk. They are the civilian gronlins.
