# RED CROSS AIDS U.S. SHERWICHMEN

Red Cross has an established home service servicemen, program for ex-servicemen, and their families. The responsibility of this mogram to assist servicemen and dependents i n meeting the needs which arise from the man's service in the armed forces.

Financial assistance may be required for temporary or for continuing periods. During the temporary period pending the adjucation or rayment of family allowances or other government benefits and claims, home service itself gives financial assistance for basic maintenance as food, clothing, shelter, fuel, and medical care. It does not refer such cases to other agencies.

In meeting community needs, home service draws upon the national and community resources, and recognizes the responsibility of the government for basic maintenance.

In cases involving special and non-recurring financial needs home service, in general, assists through referrals to other agencies, as it is clear that the Rod Cross cannot itself continuously meet all such needs of the families of ten million servicemen.

. Home service functions include communications, information, benefits and claims, and reports.

#### RIHFARING

Urging the Supreme Cort of the United States reconsider its order refusing to allow an appeal in the case of Minoru Tamesa, Heart Mountain evacuee, convicted for aviolation of the draft law, a Petiti on for Rehearing was filed last week with the Supreme Court by Attorney A.L. Wirin.

REFUSE DRAFT

DRAFT PHYSICAL with 62 other Heart Mountain evacuees, was Tamesa, with 62 other Heart Mountain evacuees, was convicted by Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy at Cheyenne, Myoming, for having refused to report for a physical examination in compliance with an order of his Local Draft Board. Tamesa and the other Mountain Nisei took the position that since they were virtually prisoners of war by virtue of their detention in concentration camps they were not free persons within the provisions of the draft law, and hence were not subject to a draft board order to serve in the The Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals at armed forces. Dr. George . Nagamoto, . Denver upheld the three year sentence imposed upon temporary director, and .Tamesa and the 62 other Heart Mountain Nisei.

CERTIORARI DENIED

On May 28, the Supreme Court of the United States denied a "Potition for a Writ of Certiorari" without opinion. The Petition for Rehearing seeks to have that order denying the appeal set aside. This latest Petition is directed at criticism of a former cision by the Supreme Court, in which the Court ruled that the courts cannot review an order of a local druft board unless the person receiving the order complies with it and goes into the Army.

CORRECTION

To correct here an order which appeared in the June 27 issue, page 2, where we printed a letter from the Mayor of Springfield, calling for the federal agency to cooperate with his city in filling job offers and helping evacuees relocate.

The latter was sent by Mayor J. Albin Anderson, Jr., of Springfield, Mass, not Springfield, Ill., as e r-

roneously printed in the previous issue.

Mayor Anderson is the chairman of the Springfield, (Mass.) Relocation Committee, which is organized to assist resettlers in finding housing, jobs, and social relationships in cooperation with RA. He has been working to create a receptive atmosphere in the city. It was after he had lined up about 30 jobs for resettlers and had received little or no response that he asked WRA to take steps to fill those positions.

Springfield, Mass., is the home of the famous "Springfield Plan" which comprises a program of education from kindergarton through high school and extension classes of adults, toaching as a standard school subject racial understanding and acceptance groups regardless of race, crowd, and color.

The city of Ontario is enjoying a regular boom because of the agri-

cultural development which has taken place with the advent of the Japanese evacuoes into Malheur County. As long as the population of persons of Japanese ancestry does not increase too rapidly, conditions are expected to favorable. The romain saturation point, however, may have been reached. BAD SPOTS

Spots in Idaho appeared to be unfavorable. In Nampa and Caldwell, the old time residents seem to be treated without discrimination. But the new-comers are not welcome. There are no eating places available excepting one in each of the cities.

Here and there throughout the area of Western Idaho, there are signs, "No Japs Allowed." FAVORABLE PARTS

In Eastern Idaho, the situation seems to be favorable. There are farms available but no applications from the conters. The potato crops have been bringing in good price's and so the farmers are optimistic about the immediate future. Public acceptance has been favorable because of the Nisei in uniform. Memorial services held in Pocatello have been attended by many Caucasian friends, and have opened the tyes of the public about the Nisci. soldiers in American'uniform.
