## RED CROSS AIDS FAMILIES OF U.S. SERVICEMEN

The Red Cross has an established home service program for servicemen, ex-servicemen, and their families. The responsibility of this program is to assist servicemen and dependents in meeting the needs which arise from the man's service in the armed forces.

Financial assistance may be required for temporary or for continuing periods. During the temporary period pending the adjudication or payment of family allowances or other government benefits and claims, home service itself gives financial assistance for basic maintenance as food, clothing, shelter, fuel, and medical care. It does not refer such cases to other agencies.

In meeting community needs, home service draws upon the national and community resources, and recognizes the responsibility of the government for basic maintenance.

In cases involving special and non-recurring financial needs home service, in general, assists through referrals to other agencies, as it is clear that the Red Cross cannot itself continuously meet all such needs of the families of ten million servicemen.

Home service functions include communications, information, benefits and claims, and reports.

## KANSANS ATTEND HOSTEL OPENING

About 300 Kansas Citizens attended the open house last Sunday afternoon at the Kansas City Hostel, 2411 Independence Avenue. Among them were many of the more than 400 persons of Japanese descent who are students or employed in the community.

The visitors were registered at the door, served with punch, and escorted through the large building which once served as the Independence Avenue Methodist church parsonage. The well-wishers, arriving between 3:30 and 7 o'clock, expressed congratulations on the results of the complete renovating and re-decorating by the various groups backing the project.

Dr. George Nagamoto, temporary director, and Francis O'Halley of the United States Department of the Interior, greeted the visitors, explaining the new facilities for housing Japanese Americans as they arrive in Kansas City from relocation centers and while they are being located in jobs and living quarters here. Cooking, dining, and social facilities are on the first floor, bedrooms on the second floor and dormitory and recreational possibilities on the third.

## NISEI SEEK REHEARING

Urging the Supreme Court of the United States to reconsider its order refusing to allow an appeal in the case of Minoru Tamesa, Heart Mountain evacuee, convicted for violation of the draft law, a Petition for Rehearing was filed last week with the Supreme Court by Attorney A.L. Wirin.

### REFUSE DRAFT PHYSICAL

Tamesa, with 62 other Heart Mountain evacuees, was convicted by Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy at Cheyenne, Wyoming, for having refused to report for a physical examination in compliance with an order of his Local Draft Board. Tamesa and the other Heart Mountain Nisei took the position that since they were virtually prisoners of war by virtue of their detention in concentration camps they were not free persons within the provisions of the draft law, and hence were not subject to a draft board order to serve in the armed forces. The Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals at Denver upheld the three year sentence imposed upon Tamesa and the 62 other Heart Mountain Nisei.

### CERTIORARI DENIED

On May 28, the Supreme Court of the United States denied a "Petition for a Writ of Certiorari" without opinion. The Petition for Rehearing seeks to have that order denying the appeal set aside. This latest Petition is directed at criticism of a former decision by the Supreme Court, in which the Court ruled that the courts cannot review an order of a local draft board unless the person receiving the order complies with it and goes into the Army.

### CORRECTION

#### It's Springfield, Mass.

To correct here an error which appeared in the June 27 issue, page 2, where we printed a letter from the Mayor of Springfield, calling for the federal agency to cooperate with his city in filling job offers and helping evacuees relocate.

The letter was sent by Mayor J. Albin Anderson, Jr., of Springfield, Mass., not Springfield, Ill., as erroneously printed in the previous issue.

Mayor Anderson is the chairman of the Springfield, (Mass.) Relocation Committee, which is organized to assist resettlers in finding housing, jobs, and social relationships in cooperation with WRA. He has been working to create a receptive atmosphere in the city. It was after he had lined up about 30 jobs for resettlers and had received little or no response that he asked WRA to take steps to fill those positions.

Springfield, Mass., is the home of the famous "Springfield Plan" which comprises a program of education from kindergarten through high school and extension classes of adults, teaching as a standard school subject racial understanding and acceptance for all groups regardless of race, creed, and color.

# REPORTS CONDITIONS IN IDAHO, OREGON AREA

# SOLDIERS DEPENDENTS MAY SEEK ALLOTMENTS

After a ten days' tour of conditions and visits to the chapters of the intermountain area, National JACL President Saburo Kido returned to Salt Lake City. He commented on the great progress that the Ontario district, which is the eastern portion of Oregon, has made during the last three years. The city of Ontario is enjoying a regular boom because of the agricultural development which has taken place with the advent of the Japanese evacuees into Malheur County. As long as the population of persons of Japanese ancestry does not increase too rapidly, conditions are expected to remain favorable. The saturation point, however, may have been reached.

Families not receiving allotments for soldiers' dependents may apply through the local Red Cross at 69-6. The welfare section will also assist in any capacity they can. The final determination of allotments will be made by the Office of Dependency Benefits in Washington after investigation made for that office by the welfare section.

## Placement Plan For Nisei Vets

A placement plan for Japanese American soldiers returning home after gallant fighting with the regiment in Italy and France has been organized by the officers of the United States 442nd Infantry Regiment.

### BAD SPOTS

Spots in Idaho appeared to be unfavorable. In Mampa and Caldwell, the old time residents seem to be treated without discrimination. But the newcomers are not welcome. There are no eating places available excepting one in each of the cities.

Here and there throughout the area of Western Idaho, there are signs, "No Japs Allowed."

### FAVORABLE PARTS

In Eastern Idaho, the situation seems to be favorable. There are farms available but no applications from the centers. The potato crops have been bringing in good prices and so the farmers are optimistic about the immediate future. Public acceptance has been favorable because of the Nisei in uniform. Memorial services held in Pocatello have been attended by many Caucasian friends, and have opened the eyes of the public about the Nisei soldiers in American uniform.

The leading newspapers of Idaho have been fair and therefore have helped to check any troublesome development.

### Seeks Hatanaka

Information on a Tomogoro Hatanaka, bachelor about 65 or 70, last heard from in Modesto, California in 1936, is being sought. Anyone with information on the above man is asked to contact Yoshiyompon Higashi, 12-4-5, Kanzanar, California.

Through arrangements by a committee of three officers, every Nisei soldier takes with him the names of men already contacted in America who will help him locate in the place and in the industry or profession he desires.

The system was arranged specifically for soldier victims of exclusion tactics on the Pacific Coast like T/4 Sagle Nishioka, Hood River, Ore.

Members of the committee of three are Lt. William Wolf, originator, Lt. Edward R. Williams, and Capt. California Ushiro of Heart Mountain.

## \$6,000 GRANT RECEIVED

The grant of \$6000 by the Rosenberg Foundation of San Francisco to assist the National JACL to operate its San Francisco offices was announced today by National President Saburo Kido in Salt Lake City. The favorable news was communicated to the JACL through Mrs. Leslie Ganyard, the secretary of the foundation.

The money is to be used "to support an executive and activities related to establishment of a District Office and promotion of activities of the League in California north of Kern County to the Oregon border."

## BUDDHIST HOSTEL OPENS IN FRESNO

The Fresno Buddhist Hostel with a capacity of about 100 accommodations has opened at 1340 Kern Street. The supervisors are the Rev. and Mrs. Kokumin Fujinaga, formerly of Rivers, and the managers are Mr. and Mrs. G. Takada.

Board and room is \$1 per person per day for the first 10 days; \$1.50 after 10 days or after getting job (one half for children). Lodging only is 25¢. Limit is one month.

Room rent for families is limited to two months. Families must do their own cooking by using kitchen facilities whenever they are available. The rent is \$25 for the first month, \$30 for the second. For families with more than five members the rent is \$30 and \$35.

Applicants must apply in advance, giving number of family members, sex and ages.

Residents must bring their own ration books, sheets, pillow-cases, towels. The hostel is self supporting and requires mutual assistance and cooperation.

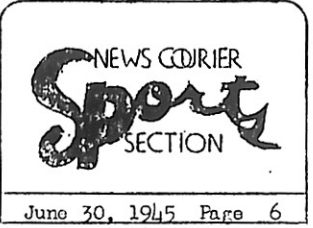

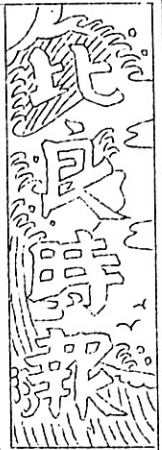
