MYER SAYS GILA RIVER WILL CLOSE BY NOV. 15

National WRA Director Dillon S. Myer announce d Thursday that Gila River will be closed on or before Nov. 15, and that the last of the seven centers will be closed on or before December 15, 1945.

In the teletype announcement Myer gave the schedule of the closing of all centers as follows:

Granada on or before October 15, Heart Mountain and Gila River on or before November 15, Colorado River and Manzanar on or before December 1, Rohwer by Decomber 15, and Contral Utah and inidola by November 1.

In order to assure an even orderly movement from the centers and a well planned program of assistance, it is essential that all residents should decide where they wish to relocate by Sept. 1 at the latest, he said, WRA advice and assistance cannot be made effective until residents have made that basic decision.

Myer's statement reads as follows:

"Nover once have we of found an individual or family relocation problem which we considered un solvable. We do not expect to meet such problem in the future. It is highly important that we continue rendering this individualized type of

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarship grants to needy and deserving students are awarded from the special funds of the Butte Community Council through its working committee known as the Butte Fund Cormittee. The Fund Cormittee has in its reserve pool a substantial amount of cash for the express purpose of financing needy students who are entering college this fall. A pre-requisite to any award of grant is that the applicant has actually matriculated in the college of his choice or has accepted for entrance. Proof of acceptance along with the scholastic records of his four years of school work is essential before any grant is made. In any event, no cash grant is given directly to the applicant, as all checks are forwarded to the Registra r or Dean of the College in which the applicant has onrolled.

Since the funds available for scholarship aid is limited, all applicants are reminded that any large or unusual grant is impossible at this time however great the needs of the applicant may be. To effect an equitable allocation of funds in fairness to all qualified applicants, it has been decided by the Committee to a ward a uniform sum to each applicant, as far as this can be accomplished.

Applicants are further reminded not to depend too heavily upon the assistance of the Fund Committee for purpose of carrying on their first year in college since any aid to be given now is only of a temporary nature, intended as a carry-over until the studen t finds work of a part-time nature.

EATTLE GROUP Discusses Race

At daily round table sessions of the second annual Institute of International Relations, sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee, held in Scattle from June 17 to 26, discussions were held on race relations.

Robert ... O'B rion, member of the sociology faculty of the University of Mashington, and nation-al director of the Student Relocation Council for 1942-43, directed the round table discussion on the Japanese situation.

Ho pointed out to the group that in Hawaii which once had the largest and oldest Japanese language school, Japanese is now being taught in the public schools just as any other foreign language, thus climinating the need of Japane se languago school. This has been a ccomplished in Portland, Oro. also.

Norio Higano, a Nisei, Phi Beta Kappa, Gave his opinion of the opportunities in America for professional men of Japanese ancestry. He pointed out that less discrimination was shown to such men in the East and middle west than on the West Coast. and that the majority of the Nisci who had gone into medicine, law, engincoring, and other suc h professions were now relocating in St. Louis, Chiesco, Pittsburch and New York.


