# THIRD ANNIVERSARY OUGLAS M. TODD NAMED ANNIVERSARY NEW PROJECT DIRECTOR

Yesterday, July 20, was the third anniversary of the opening of Gila River Center. But aside from this little reminder, Gila's historic day is passing almost unnoticed, buried behind immediate and pressing problems that this year brings.

Looking back over the past three years we find the population figures as follows;
July 20, 1942.....520
July, 1943.....12,386
July, 1944.....10,024
July 20, 1945.....6,921

We have not passed a year mark without being alarmed by the passage of time and the growing lethargy that inactivity broeds.

This year 6,900 of us look ahead to activity and to more permanent lives on the outside.

"A home is in process of being opened in Gardena for a large number of old Japanese men to be sheltered and given care. We have this date (July 9) had an interview with Mr. Henry Kobayashi formerly of Lancaster, who has been working with the Christian and Buddhist hostel authorities on this problem."

Todd comes from the Hoart Mountain Relocation Conter in Wyoming where he has been a member of the War Relocation Authority staff since that center was established in 1942. He is a native of Utoh, and has 'spent most of his life in that State in farming and in banking busi noss. Prior to entering government service he was engagod in mining and metallurgical work in Colorado.

Todd's family still is in Heart Mountain, Wyoming, but soon will join him here. Two sons and three sons-in-law are with the armed forces. One of his sons fought in the Okina-wa campaign.

Bennott, who has been project director at Rivers since December, 1942, is loaving to enter private business as distributor of the Monitor Electrical Appliances in Norther n and Contral California.

Also effective July 20, James L. Shelly, in addition to his other duties as assistant director in charge of community management, will assume added responsibility for general supervision of the relocation program at Rivers.

(From the Milwaukee Journal, July 5, 1945)
"Those of us who have had the privilege to fight alongside the Nisei look upon him as a brother, a comrade who has fought and suffered with us as American, " achievement in action dur wrote Pfc. Philip E. Lerman of Milwaukee to his wife Ann, who lives in San Francisco, Calif. Commenting on the refusal of some Californians to work alongside employees who have returned to their west coast homes from war relocation camps, Lerman said, "We do not ask you to let them work with you. We demand it."

Writing from Italy, where he is still stationed, Lerman said that his company's final victorious offen sivo was mado possible "because a regiment of Japaneso Americans had a few days previous started a diversion-

ary action on the Ligurian coast.

"These men did not stop to consider what you would do or say. They picked up their weapons and savagely advanced against the Nazi."

Lerman, a graduate of Washington high school and of the University of Wisconsin, is a son of Ben Berman, 2750 N. 48th St.

### BOB HOPE ENTERTAINS NISEL

Bob Hope, in his column "It Says Here" which appear od in the July 10 Indianapolis News, wrote of the Nisei as follows:

"Somewhere on the Atlantie -- I woke up and found the sea very calm today. In fact, it was so smooth I decided to live dangerously and walk to the moss hall standing up instead of on all fours.

"We did a show for about 1400 enlisted men, mostly Japanese American GIs this evening. These boys a rereally sharp and just as American as a hamburger sandwich. Of course, its hard to lose any kind of anaudionce on board ship. You can fall on thom right into their cabins .

"Col. Dalles D. Dennis, U. S. Army Commandant on board, asked us to give the show. I said, Where'll we put it on?" And he said, "The mess hall is avail-That will be a nice setting for ham" .....

### SON OF GILAN WINS ARMY STAR

K. Euro-Pfc. James da, formerly of Marysville. Calif., recently was swarded Brenze Star for heroic ing the fighting in the Vosges Mountains in Northeas tern France.

His mother, Mrs. Chiye Kuroda, is a resident of this center. His brothen Sgt. Harry Kuroda, is al= so a member of the Combat

Team. The action for which Kuroda was cited occurred in the vicinity of Biffontaine, France. Communication lines between a battalion forward command post and rifle companies were continually subjected to prolonged and heavy hostile artillery barrages, making continual repair necessary.

On one such occasion, Kuroda and comrade volume tarily set out to repair to a rifle company 1200 yards away. While the repairs were being made, and only 200 yards of repair remained a barrage forced the mon to suck cover . The intensity and proximity of the falling shells made them realize that therifle company was sustaining casualties and communication . was necessary in order to call for medical aid.

Without waiting for the barrage to lift, the mon left their cover and checked the remaining length of line, splicing wire from their position to the company.

By maintaining communication, evacuation of the wounded men with a minimum loss of time was made possible.

In addition to the Bronzo Star, Jamos Kuroda wears the American Defense Ribbon, Combat Infantryman Badge and four battlostars on the European Theater Ribbon .

to obtain birth certificates before rolocation has prevented many of them from getting good jobs, and has made them take less satisfactory ones, writes Prudence Ross, relocation supervisor in Chicago.

The Issei ordinarily do not encountor such difficulties, as they have identification papers which are generally satisfactory to employers. Es pecially in jobs with Army and Navy contracts, employers usually cannot hire anvone without birth certificate to prove his citizenship. Young people under 18 cannot, in most states, get work permits without showing their birth cortificates, regardless of other documentary evidence such as high school diploma.

It is therefore advisable for the Nisei to obtain birth certificates at the earliest possible moment if they do not have them as yet, and take them out with them whon relocating.
