For the purpose of expressing our own editorial stand, we herewith publish, in full, a letter to the editor which came to us from Arroyo Grande with "One of Your Subscribers" the only signature.

"To the Editor or to whom this may concern:

"In Wednesday night's copy of the Telegram-Tribune, the picture of a Jap boy and his father appeared on tho front page, stating that they had met in Okinawa after eight years.

"NOI"

READER SAYS your subscribers, I thoroughly believe that you should exclude such pictures and put in pictures of our boys who deserve the right to have thoir pictures in the paper and which have done far more for their country than such barbarious cowards which one can't even call thom human. The boys who deserve the right to have their pictures in the paper is our good American Yank who have fought and for our country.

"The saying has always been the only good Jap is a doad one, and it still holds true in every case."

The picture in question was titled "Hiya Pop!" and showed T-4 Seigu Higachi, 10th Army man and interpreter for the 24th Division G-2, greeting his father on Okinawa for the first time in eight years. Higachi was born in Los Angeles, moved to Okinawa with his family as a youngster, and later returned to the states to livo.

It is our feeling that any soldier who went through the Okinawa campaigr, be his name Smith, Jones, O'Brion Greenbaum or Higachi, is more than worthy of having his picture on the front page of any newspaper in the land.

"WHY NOT?" PAPER SAYS

Remember, Subscriber, that to most of us, T-4 Higachi is a soldier of the American Army -- a soldier who, by going through that forccious campaign, has done more for his adopted country than you or I or any of us who are not on the battle line in this war can hope to do.

We have yet to hear any servicemen look down upon a Japanese-American combat soldier, or dismiss him with "A Jap's a Jap" libel.

Doos this Subscriber dare to call this man, an Okinawa veteran, a ocward? Has this Subscriber taken the time to consider the facts in the case? We think not.

T/4 Higachi was good onough for the United States Army--good enough for combat service in one of the most perilous spots of the Pacific war. That makes him good enough for our front page.

## Supreme Court XENIES HEARING

On June 18, the Supreme Court of the United States, when it denied a Petition for Rehearing in the case of Minoru Tamesa, American-born Japanese evacuee from the Heart Mountain Relocation Center, wrote the final chapter in the legal struggle of American-born Japanese imprisonod in relocation conters to secure a court ruling as to whother they were subject to the draft.

Last Monday, Federal Judge T. Blako Konnody of Cheyenne , Wyoming, sen-tonced 22 Heart Mountain evacuees to two years in penitentiary the federal for their refusal to comply with orders from their local draft boards directing them to take physical oxaminations. In 63 cases involving Heart Mountai n evacuoes, Judge Kennedy last year had imposed three-year sentences. He took the view that the law was uncortain at the time that those latest evacuees wore prosecuted, because of a docision by Federal Judgo Louis Goodman of San against e vacue es at Judge Konnody Tule Lake. gave as an additional reason that these latest defendants had not put the court to any expense through a contested trial.

Both Tamesa, in his action before the Supreme Court, and the 2 evacuees in the Federal Court at Cheyonno wero ropresented by attorney A.L. Wirin.

#### EIGHT HOSTELS OPENED IN LA

The metropolitan Los Angeles area now has eight hostels. More than a dozen hostels are being operated by returnees.

Uniform rates reatablished by members of the hostel association are: First 10 days, \$1 a day per person for lodging and three meals; then \$1.50. Children 50¢, employed persons \$2. Without meals, rates are 50¢ first 10 days, then 75¢; employed persons, \$1.

Everyone shares in the cooperative work, which takes about three-quarters of an hour a day. Guests are asked to bring sheets, pillow cases and towels; there is an extra charge to those without shocts.

Ration books are a "must", and should be obtained at the center.

Advance reservations, at least a week in advance if possible, are important.


