SUGGESTS STATE BUY MANZANAR

An effort to get the State of California to purchase the Manzanar Relocation Center to provide shelter and care for some 2000 sick and indigent Japanese expected to be returned shortly to Los Angeles County was made last week by the Board of Supervisors, according to the L.A. Times of July 19.

The proposal that the state buy the center from the government was made by William A. Smith, chairman of the Board who asserted that the property, complete with hospital facilities and many buildings will soon be abandoned by the federal authorities and put up for sale as surplus property.

RECOGNITION FOR NISEI

(Editorial in the San Louis Obispo Telegram-Tribune, July 17, 1945)

For the purpose of expressing our own editorial stand, we herewith publish, in full, a letter to the editor which came to us from Arroyo Grande with "One of Your Subscribers" the only signature.

"To the Editor or to whom this may concern:

"In Wednesday night's copy of the Telegram-Tribune, the picture of a Jap boy and his father appeared on the front page, stating that they had met in Okinawa after eight years.

READER SAYS "NO!"

"As one of your subscribers, I thoroughly believe that you should exclude such pictures and put in pictures of our boys who deserve the right to have their pictures in the paper and which have done far more for their country than such barbarious cowards which one can't even call them human. The boys who deserve the right to have their pictures in the paper is our good American Yank who have fought and died for our country.

"The saying has always been the only good Jap is a dead one, and it still holds true in every case."

The picture in question was titled "Hiya Pop!" and showed T-4 Soiyu Higachi, 10th Army man and interpreter for the 24th Division G-2, greeting his father on Okinawa for the first time in eight years. Higachi was born in Los Angeles, moved to Okinawa with his family as a youngster, and later returned to the states to live.

It is our feeling that any soldier who went through the Okinawa campaign, be his name Smith, Jones, O'Brien, Greenbaum or Higachi, is more than worthy of having his picture on the front page of any newspaper in the land.

PAPER SAYS "WHY NOT?"

Remember, Subscriber, that to most of us, T-4 Higachi is a soldier of the American Army—a soldier who, by going through that ferocious campaign, has done more for his adopted country than you or I or any of us who are not on the battle-line in this war can hope to do.

We have yet to hear any servicemen look down upon a Japanese-American combat soldier, or dismiss him with "A Jap's a Jap" libel.

Does this Subscriber dare to call this man, an Okinawa veteran, a coward? Has this Subscriber taken the time to consider the facts in the case? We think not.

T/4 Higachi was good enough for the United States Army—good enough for combat service in one of the most perilous spots of the Pacific war. That makes him good enough for our front page.

EVACUEE TRAIN LEAVES ROHWER

On July 26, the first complete evacuee railroad train will leave Rohwer for California carrying 425 passengers and is expected to reach California around July 31. Harold L. Ickes, Secretary of the Interior, said the arrangement was in agreement with the Office of Defense Transportation regulations.

Besides a diner and two baggage cars, the train will include seven day coaches and one sleeper, reserved only for the aged, infirm and the sick.

Nearly 100 children under 15 are included in the 125 families, of which a few families planning to resettle in the Mountain States will get off at Pueblo for Denver, Ogden, and Salt Lake City. The remaining travelers are planning to get off at Lodi, Sacramento, Stockton, Fresno and Los Angeles.

DRAFT TRIAL

SUPREME COURT DENIES HEARING

On June 18, the Supreme Court of the United States, when it denied a Petition for Rehearing in the case of Minoru Tamesa, American-born Japanese evacuee from the Heart Mountain Relocation Center, wrote the final chapter in the legal struggle of American-born Japanese imprisoned in relocation centers to secure a court ruling as to whether they were subject to the draft.

Last Monday, Federal Judge T. Blako Kennody of Cheyenne, Wyoming, sentenced 22 Heart Mountain evacuees to two years in the federal penitentiary for their refusal to comply with orders from their local draft boards directing them to take physical examinations. In 63 cases involving Heart Mountain evacuees, Judge Kennedy last year had imposed three-year sentences. He took the view that the law was uncertain at the time that those latest evacuees were prosecuted, because of a decision by Federal Judge Louis Goodman of San Francisco, dismissing cases against evacuees at Tule Lake. Judge Kennody gave as an additional reason that those latest defendants had not put the court to a ny expense through a contested trial.

Both Tamesa, in his action before the Supreme Court, and the 2 evacuees in the Federal Court at Cheyenne were represented by attorney A.L. Wirin.

FRESNO HOSTEL Will Hold 100

The Fresno Buddhist Hostel has opened at 1340 Korn Street, with ready accommodations for 100 persons under the supervision of the Rev. and Mrs. K. Fujinaga, formerly of Rivers.

Since all the work on the hostel is done on a cooperative basis, all those who stay will be expected to contribute his share of duties for the upkeep of the hostel. Up to date, more than 50 persons have stayed at the hostel.

The room and board charge is \$1 for the first 10 days and \$1.50 after 10 days or after being employed, and children under 10 are asked to pay half price. Twenty-five cents per person is the cost for room only, and for families of five or less, \$25 for the first month, \$30 for the second month, and \$5 additional for larger families.

Veteran Seeks New Assignment

A Purple Heart and two battle stars, plus a sojourn in Army hospitals, isn't enough for S/Sgt. Edward Ikogami, Los Angeles soldier in Uncle Sam's artillery.

So he's asked for another overseas assignment--this time in the Pacific.

The sergeant, 30, joined up with the Army back in 1941, before Pearl Harbor. He served with the 522d Field Artillery Battalion, part of the famous 442nd Central Postal Directory Team which so distinguished itself in France and Italy.

Before the war he lived at 312 North Alma Street and attended Van Nuys High School. His mother is at Manzanar Relocation Center.



EIGHT HOSTELS OPENED IN L.A.

The metropolitan Los Angeles area now has eight hostels. More than a dozen hostels are being operated by returnees.

Uniform rates reestablished by members of the hostel association are: First 10 days, \$1 a day per person for lodging and three meals; then \$1.50. Children 50¢, employed persons \$2. Without meals, rates are 50¢ first 10 days, then 75¢; employed persons, \$1.

Everyone shares in the cooperative work, which takes about three-quarters of an hour a day. Guests are asked to bring sheets, pillow cases and towels; there is an extra charge to those without sheets.

Ration books are a "must", and should be obtained at the center.

Advance reservations, at least a week in advance if possible, are important.
