TWO DYNAMITERS GIRL IN AURURN FACE FFDFRAL (HARGE

Federal charges will be brought against two civilian brothers for the dynamiting of a Japanese American's property in Auburn, United States Attorney Frank J. Honnessy an-nounced on July 24, the San Francisco Chronicle reports.

"I have instructed the United States attorney in Sacramento to ask the Federal Grand Jury there for indictments against the two civilian brothers on two counts," Hennessy announced. The brothers are James and Charles Watson.

TWO COUNTS

Charges will be conspiracy to possess dynamite and the illegal possession of dynamite. Maxisum ponalty for the first count is two years in a Federal Penitentiary and a \$10,000 fine and for the sou ond, on e year and \$5,000.

Jamos E. Watson, 38, an Auburn bartonder, was acquitted in a State court last April of attempting to dynamito the packing shod of Sumic Doi, who returned to his ranch near Newcestlo in January from the Granada Scater. His brother, Charles Watson, 35, a randoor, originally was accused of the crime by local officials, charges were dropped.

No Tuition For Legal Residents

Questions concerning the enrollment of returnees in the University of California are answered in the following information obtained by John W. Lawton, the Oakland district relocation officer.

"All evacuess who were legal residents of the State of California before evacuation and who expect to roturn to the State now that the exclusion order has been rescinded may enter the University of California as residents of the State and will not be required to pay non-resi-dence tuition fees. Of course, any evacuoo who has takon steps to establish himself as resident of a state other than California would be required to pay the non-residents tuition foo.

"In the case of minors returning to California to onter the University without their perents, it is nocessary that the parents submit to the Univorsity authorities an affidavit stating that the parents expect to return to California as soon as housing can be arranged, in order for the student be admitted as a Cali; fornia rosident."

To evacuees who have inquired as to their eligibile ity to build homes after relocation, it may be of interest that the National Housing Agency has clarified its H-3 housing program to include resettlers who qualify as "hardship" cases, according to the Washington D.C., WRA office.

BUILDING

NLDING PRIORITIES NHA defines "personal hardship" as arising from increases in dependents or consolidation of the family, or considerations of health, physical disability or safety. Under these conditions, evacuous would qualify if a family is separated because of a local housing shortage or if members are living together in overcrowded or temporary housing, such as a hostel.

In a letter to Dillon S. Myor, WRA Director, the MFA Administrator, John B. Blandford, Jr., wrote: "Except for a blanket provision extending eligibility to returning veterans, prioritios under the H-3 program are issued on a case basis -- each application being approved or disapproved on its own merits. In other words, each Japanese-American family will have to present evidences to FHA (Federal Housing Authority, agency under NHA direction) offices as a 'hardship Realizing the difficulties which confront caso. those families in finding living accommodations, I

am sure man; of them will qualify under the H-3 pro-"I am sure, moreover, that FHA offices will give duo consideration to all the factors entering into the admittodly difficult situation of those who are now

required to leave relocation centers.

REMODELING "Should any cases come to your attention which indicate that the personal hardship criterion is not Meing proporly applied to applications made by Japanosc-Amoricans, please let me know. I am circulating copies of this letter to our regional representatives with the request that they discuss the situation with tho state and district directors of the Federal Housing Administration."

Where lack of housing in an area is causing difficultios in living conditions, resettlers will be permittod, if applications are approved by FHA, to remo-

del or convert existing structures.

Voterans of World War II may build, alter or improve housing in an area where a housing shortage exists." Conter relocation program officers and field relocation officers can supply further details on the H-3 housing program, as outlined in relocation division memorandum no. 91.
