## VET'S FAMILIES ELIGIBLE FOR FEDERAL HOUSING

The Federal Public Housing Administration is making available to servicemen's and veteran's families regular FPMA apartments in California cities where such housing projects are located. The average cost of these apartments, which are completely furnished, is as follows:

Three bedrooms - \$38,  
two bedrooms - \$35, one  
bedroom - \$32.50, and no  
bedroom - \$27.50.

These houses are being made available in San Francisco, Los Angeles, and San Diego, and must be applied for during the first week of September.

## FORMER GILA OFFICIAL DISCUSSES RELOCATION

Early relocation planning was emphasized by Hugo W. Wolter, former assistant director here and present head of the center liaison section in Washington, who visited Rivors, this week. He arrived here from Poston and left for Washington yesterday. Wolter's statement is as follows:

"Rapidly changing conditions make it necessary for residents to make plans now. Field offices will operate only to March 31, which leaves about 7 months during which WRA will help evacuees get started on the outside.

"Changes in the war will increase the work of other federal agencies all over the country. Evacuees now have federal agencies working for them, but within two months, the change in emphasis brought about by reconversion and the returning of servicemen will put the problems of evacuees in the background. It is very advisable and important that people choose their destinations immediately while the services of WRA and other federal agencies are still concentrating on evacuees."

Concerning the Wilson Plantation offer, Wolter stated, "I personally would recommend consideration of the Wilson Plantation. Arrangements and contracts have WRA approval and have been studied from every angle. The future of the Mississippi Valley in vegetable production is excellent because of climatic conditions and the nearness to markets. During the life of WRA we will always protect the interests of evacuees and do whatever we can to assist them. We feel that the Wilson Plantation offers excellent opportunities for anyone interested in more future security. Here also, a delay in signing up may mean the difference between future success or hardship."

In conclusion he said, "I wish to extend personal greetings to all of my friends at Gila and hope that the future will bring successful readjustments for all."

**NISEI IN UNIFORM**

Dallas E. Wood, newspaper columnist widely read in the San Francisco Bay region, takes issue with adverse criticism of the WRA's policy in widely circulating copies of a brochure entitled "Nisei in Uniform." Wood writes (Palo Alto Times, May 28):

"A protest has been made by some California congressmen because of the publication by the War Relocation Authority of a brochure titled "Nisei in Uniform," describing the activities of a Japanese American combat unit in Italy.

**GIVE CREDIT**

"One congressman said, 'The WRA was never set up for the purpose of convincing the American people that the Japanese are a superior or better race, but that seems to be the conception of their mission.'

"It is a misrepresentation of the character and the purpose of the booklet to imply that it attempts to convince readers that the Japanese are a superior race. Its only purpose appears to have been to give the Nisei due credit for patriotic performance where such credit has been won.

**WHERE CREDIT IS DUE**

"While it is true that other units have made 'as good or better records' than the Nisei, the performance of those other units has been duly acclaimed. Appreciation of the patriotic service of the Nisei, on the contrary, is discounted by an unfair distrust. There has not been need for pamphlets to win recognition for the valiant records made by the white units. Whether the size of this particular appropriation was out of proportion to the importance of its purpose, this column cannot say. But it is obviously unfair, when we demand armed service of the Nisei as an automatic obligation of citizenship, to withhold automatically credit for meritorious performance because of racial prejudice."

**SHIPPING****BILL OF LADING IS IMPORTANT**

The importance of having the original bill of lading when freight shipments arrive is stressed in a teletype from the Washington WRA office.

Many evacuees are still appearing at various west coast offices claiming to have lost or misplaced the original bill of lading. Prompt surrender of bill of lading will not only avoid storage charges to evacuee but will reduce the number of visits to district offices, it was pointed out.

**Utah Schools Accept Evacuees**

Elementary and high schools in Utah and Idaho accept evacuee students as residents and allow them to attend schools without paying tuition.

In Utah, individuals relocating from centers are accepted as residents of the state to enter grade and high school tuition-free. Kindergarten are available in larger cities and rural areas.

There is a little requirement to become a resident of Idaho, that being 30 days in the school district. Non-resident students are required to pay tuition, which amounts to about \$10.00 for high school, \$7.50 for junior high, and \$5.00 for the grade school.

Text books and school supplies are furnished free in most cases in the grade schools, and high school students must buy their own books and supplies in Idaho, while in Utah, text books are furnished for students who attend grade and high school.

Since Carthage College is definitely a church college; I doubt if the others would find themselves at home in the prevailing atmosphere."

The cost for attending Carthage is only \$57 which takes care of all expense, so the small scholarship of \$50 has significance.

Carthage College is controlled by the United Lutheran Church and is co-educational. and is calling his family out early next month.

three presidential unit citation streamers; and single white combat streamer, they will lead a parade of about 15,000 U.S. soldiers.

Of the Nisei soldiers Berger writes:

"They will be in the van in this history march as they were when they spearheaded the attacks that opened the Vosges mountain doorway to Strasbourg last October and when they snatched the 36th Division's lost battalion of Texans from the encircling Nazis. These actions cost them 2300 casualties in three weeks.

"Colonel V. R. Miller of Kinnebec, Wis., who commands the Nisei, will lead them in the march. Beside him will stride Maj or Mitsuyo Fukuda, a Honolulu High School teacher who is the last remaining member of the 100th battalion still in Italy.

"It was learned that their casualties totaled 9230, or three times their original battle strength and that the only A.W.O.L.'s against their record were six. These six were men who escaped from hospitals without leave, to return to combat.

"The original shoulder patch designed for the Nisei troops was a yellow hand clutching a yellow dagger. They rejected this unanimously and were given instead a white arm upholding a white torch of liberty."

## NISEI EMPLOYED BY WALT DISNEY

Getting a job in Hollywood pictures was no trick for 20-year-old Iwao Takemoto. He left Manzanar May 11, and by June 4 was on the payroll at Walt Disney's cartoon studio as an apprentice animator.

Lack of experience or special training didn't stop him from applying direct for the job. First he phoned the studio and got an appointment. He had taken incidental free-hand sketching at Thomas Jefferson High School, Los Angeles, where he graduated in 1942, and had talent for pen-and-ink drawing.

Then he went to Burbank for the interview -- showed samples of his work -- filled out employment forms and went home to await work. A week later he was notified to report to begin work.

"I like it fine," Iwao said, "even if the apprentice pay was only \$27.50 a week to start; there are regular pay raises"

# CITATION Medal Awarded To Sgt. Noguchi

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY ITALY -- First Sergeant Takao Noguchi, Pasadena, Calif., recently was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for heroic achievement in action in Italy.

He served on the Fifth Army front in the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Takijiro Noguchi live here at 47-5-D1.

A building in which several Cannon Company men were sleeping received a direct hit by an enemy shell, related the award citation. Noguchi went to the building, exposed to continuing hostile fire, and with another man administered first aid to three wounded soldiers.

A second shell hit the roof directly over, sending debris and dust down on him but Noguchi continued to render aid. He then assisted in evacuating the injured men by hand carrying and as the last man was moved out a third shell hit the adjoining building.

Noguchi went to the company command post, obtained blood plasma and with the help of others, administered the plasma to the wounded.

His brother Pfc. Hideo Noguchi also received a Bronze Star, the Fifth Army announced last week.
