Raising the issue of free speech, free press and free assemblage, a brief filed in behalf of Frank Emi and six other Heart Mountain evacuess in the Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals at Donver, Colorado, urging that their conviction for conspiracy to evade the draft law be set aside, on the ground that their rights under the First Amendment were violated, was filed last week. Frank Emi, as well as Kiyoshi Okamoto, Paul T. Nakadate, Tsutomc Wakaye, Minoru Tamesa, Isamu Horino and Guntaro Kubota, American born Japanoso evacuated to the Heart Mountain Relocation Centor word sontenced after a trial at Cheyenne, Wyoming, to penitentiary sentences running from two to four years.

all leaders of the Fair Play Committee, They were originally organized by Okamoto to secure a clarification of the rights of American-born Japanese, and to protest the military evacuation and the WRA detention. When the Selective Training and Service Act was enforced against Nisei at the relocation centers, the fair Play Committee, as claimed by its leaders, took the position that the applicability of the draft to persons detained in relocation centers should be challenged in the courts; and made the following announcement in a circular distributed at the relocation contors;

". . . the members of the F.P.C. unanimously decided . . . that until we are restored all our rights, discriminatory features of the Selective Service abolished, and measures retaken to remedy the past in justices through Judicial pronouncement or Congresional act, we feel that the present program of drafting us from this concentration camp is unjust, unconstitutional, and against all principles of vivilized usage, therefore, We, Mombers of the Fair Play Committee Hereby Refuse to Go to the Physical Examin nation or to the Induction If or when We are Called in Ordor to Contest the Issue."

This and other activities of the Fair Play Committeo along similar lines constituted a conspiracy to violate the draft law, according to the Government; according to the defendants, urging a test case, and refusal to comply with draft board orders until the logality of the orders were determined by the courts, constituted merely an exercise of freedom of speech, guaranteed by the federal Constitution.

The appeal is set for hearing in the Federal Court of Appeals at Denver, Colorado on September 6; the defondants are represented by Attorney A. L. Wirin, ap-

NEW YORK USES Reports llob lincreases

Rocent reports from the United States Employment Service and the War Manpower Commission indicate more job pracements are being made right now in and around New York City than at any previous time. Although there are cutbacks in war industries, the United States Employmont Sorvice expects that largo numbers of workers will be needed in food products, textilo, and apparel industries. Veterans are returning to formor omployment and are finding now jobs in increasing numbers - at the rate of 7,000 to 8,000 per month.

"Poople are more noble hero than back in Cali-fornia, "Yamamoto conti-nued. "There is nothin g like their bunch of jeal -ousy here. I have nothing to complain of and am get ting along 100 per-cent O. K. Whon I go into town once in a while, I'll bet no one evon looks at I don't believe in sitting waiting for luck to come. If you keep on moving, you have some good luck somewhere. They represented to Moars, the complaint reads, that they had each paid \$500 apiece to "commercial-ize the soulptor's ability," although he claims they only said so to deceive him and lead him to believe that they had faith in the promotion of the enterprise.
