BUTTE APPROVES MEMBER FEE FOR CONSUMER COOP

Membership fee of \$1 per person to join the proposed Consumer Coop has been unanimously approved by the Butte blocks, revealed co-chairmen Tadashi Iwamoto and Masato Kato of the Butte Study and Research Committee yesterday.

The co-chairmen emphasized that membership is not compulsory. However, only members are entitled to a

voice in the coop, and to a rebate of profits if such funds are to be expended. The coop will take over all the canteens, stores, repair shops, barber shops, and other such business ventures in the community.

Subscription sheets for memberships will be distributed to each block in the near future. After the membership drive two member representatives will be elected by members of the coop. The two will probably be an issei and a nisei. These representatives will then select a board of directors from both communities. The board will draft the charter, which will be presented to the people for approval.

Canal and Butte cooperative committees are working hand in hand.

"Any number of checks over \$40 will be issued Friday to net workers for the first half of January," stated Joe Rosenblum, paymaster.

NITAO DIES OF FATAL WOUNDS

Joe Tsugawa, 46, resident of 55-3-A & B, allegedly seriously injured his wife, Kiyomi, 35, at his apartment, and fatally wounded, Jinkichi Nitao, 49, at 55-3-C during the late hours of the night of Jan. 18, and early hours of the morning of Jan. 19 with a hammer, according to an official release by the Internal Security Division. Nitao died at 8:30 a.m. on the morning of Jan. 19 in the Rivers Hospital.

Tsugawa, the release discloses, attacked his

wife after an altercation, and then proceeded to Nitao's apartment and injured him fatally while he lay asleep. Mrs. Tsugawa is in serious condition at the hospital.

The assailant was apprehended by the Internal Security wardens led by Chief William E. Williamson. He was surrendered to the custody of the Pinal County sheriff at 7:30 in the morning.

Jealousy prompted Tsugawa's action, according to the release.

THE WORLD TODAY

One and a half million people died of starvation in defending Leningrad. One million and five hundred thousand suffered death by hunger rather than submit to the Nazi invader. And those who were left this week drove away that invader and rescued the people of Leningrad who were left.

What was it that sustained the stubborn Russian to win? Could the citizens of New York have done it? Or Los Angeles or San Francisco? Or Gila?

Underneath it all, the defense of Leningrad was a triumph of education—or propaganda—call it what you will.

While Americans were learning their right to get time-and-a-half for overtime, the Russians were learning their duty to the people. While Americans were getting higher pay for shorter hours producing more luxuries, the Russians were preparing their defenses against the invader.

There will be some who will say that this victory vindicates communism; but how then do they explain the amazing German will-to-win, as well as the Russian. No, it is not political system that has triumphed here; it is an educational system. The Germans and the Russians have been learning principles which they have been taught are worth fighting and dying for. We need not agree with the principles, but it is plain, the teaching has done.

We have principles that are as glorious as theirs. Why is our conviction not as strong as theirs? The blame lies at the door of our schools and our educators, our governments and our newspapers and our departments of information. Will they will as long as our military men waited to learn the lessons of this age of military and mortal aggression?

W.R.A. HAS TRIED TO MAKE THE BEST OF A BAD JOB

In its first year of operation the WRA has not let down on its promise made through its first director, Milton Eisenhower, when he said that he would "make the best of a bad job." The recent quarterly report of the Authority has just been received by the project and it outlines the tremendous task of tearing over 100,000 people away from their homes, and creating for them, communities to live in.

Reviewing its work we are struck anew by the liberal qualities of the men selected by President Roosevelt to handle a problem made particularly difficult because its very existence was due to the denial of democracy to a group of people in a country fighting for democracy.

We can see that the WRA has fought for the evacuees, and is continuing the struggle in face of a nation at war and prejudiced. It has furnished the evacuees with material needs. It has fought for a \$70,000,000 appropriation from Congress for the operation of the centers and received it. Now, as was promised, it is engaged in a tremendous resettlement in wiping out the peculiar minority problem they present to America.

The nation and the Western states we believe were wrong when the people of Japanese extraction were evacuated. But in its general attitude, program and accomplishment, we believe the WRA has tried to make the best of a bad job."

EVACUEE MUST ALSO —

Soon after the opening of the 78th Congress and the legislatures of the three Pacific Coast states, it is found as was expected that politicians are still alive to the value of the evacuee problem as a political football.

Senator Reynolds of North Carolina is hitting at the Negro minority in the South through his attacks on the nisei. The aims of Senator Wallgren from Washington and other coast Congressman and state legislators are obvious.

However, the ridiculous charges of pampering and the thoughtless charge that military control is necessary because of internal disturbances, is a foretaste of what evacuees can expect.

But in view of facts such as established by the Gallup poll that 93% of people on the coast believe that evacuation was necessary, the evacuees must bow to circumstances. Furthermore, a Manzanar must never be repeated. The cards are overwhelmingly stacked against evacuees. By thoughtless conduct, the cards can be still further piled. No more mistakes must be made that politicians can kick around through distortion. The evacuees too must make the best of a bad situation.
