#### Council Chicago Approves Ordinance

The City Council of Chicago recently approved an ordinance which prohibits racial discrimination in city employment and on any jebs to be performed for the city by private contractors and sub-contractors. The ordinance was introduced by two Nogro aldermen and was passed by a voto of 39 to 1.

A broador clause in the ordinance calls for a \$200 fine against any person found guilty of practicing racial disorimination in such matters of employment as hiring and firing. The ordinance as stated that unions shall not discriminate on the basis of color.

Mr. Themas Wright, Executive Director of the Mayor's Committee on Race Relations, told the War Relocation Authority that although the Logality of cortain measures in the ordinance may have to be tested in the courts, this public ordinance represents a tremendous step forward in trying to make democracy work. 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After making the survey, Mr. Hikida made the following comments about business in Chicago.

- 1: "My survey shows that there are more than 180 businesses now owned or operated by resettlers in Chicago and more than 50 percent of them were opened since the first of this year."
- 2. "The majority of them are owned or operated by Issei."
- 3. "It is amazing to note how easily businesses are acquired by resettlers in Chicago. New businesses are increasing at the rate of two or three in a week!"
- 4. "Resettler businesses are mainly located in five different districts of the city and there is plenty of room and opportunities in Caucasian and colored districts."
- 5. "It was the unanimous opinion of all the businessmen that Chicago offers good business opportunities for resettlers; that people are nice and easy to deal with."
- 6. "Have not met a single person (out of total of 180) who complained about business being bad; they all expressed opinion that business was very good."
- 7. "No racial feeling interfered with their business."
- 8. "There are more opportunities in laundry, cleaners, shoe repair, gift, and flower shops."

# HOSTELS HELPS FOR HOUSING

The Rosettlement Committee of Pittsburgh has announced that a hostel is now in operation for evacuee families locating to that city.

At Seattle, Washington, Sunao Shimomura, an Issei, is reserving several rooms at his New Cascade Hotel, 716 Dearborn Street, for returning Japanese.

At Seattle, Washington, twelve returning families recently found housing accommodations in the Renton-Highlands Federal Public Housing Project. Tenants are furnished with lawn mowers, grass seed, and fertilizer if they wish to improve the appearance of their homes.

The hostel in Des Moines, Iowa, averaged twenty-one persons in June and twenty-one in July. The directors have assisted contantly in house hunting.

In Oakland, ten families of servicemen moved into the housing units of the Richmond Housing Authority, Wall and South 18th Streets. Arrangements for this federal housing was made through WRA.

The Friends Hostel in Des Moines, Iowa, is remaining in operation on a month to month basis. For this reason, reservations should be made well in advance so that the hostel will know how long to remain in operation.

The hostel in Columbus, Ohio, is located at 627 Lazelle Street. Facilities for cooking are available. The rent for family groups, up to four people, is \$5 a week; above that number the charge is \$1 per week for each additional member of the family. Interested citizens and supporters of the WRA program in Central Ohio provided furniture and the initial cost of painting this hostel. Reservations may be made through the WRA Office, 3660 Aiu Building, in that city. Additional staff members to assist in finding suitable living quarters for evacuees have been added to the WRA staff in both Cleveland and Cincinnati, Ohio.

The Buddhist Temple and Hall in Visalia, California, was recently converted into a hostel for returning evacuees. Rev. and Mrs. Z. Kawasaki are in charge of the hostel.

At Watsonville, the Presbyterian Church at Pearl and El Estero, has been converted into a hostel. It opened August 22nd with Rev. Asano and Y. Manaka as co-managers. It will accommodate thirty-five persons.

Tom Inouye, manager of the Royal Court Hostel on East 9th Street in Cleveland, Ohio, has circulated cards stating that his establishment is "Nisei Head-quarters".

## HONOR TO MISEI WETS.

Major John Woodward of Seattle, who recently returned to the United States with the 87th Mountain Infantry from the European Theater, mentioned that his division "took their hats off to nobedy except Nisei troops".

Capt. Thomas E. Crowley has been sent by the War Department on a speaking tour in Northern California. He will make his appearance before various groups telling what he knows of the Nisei work with the Armed Forces and urging fair play and tolerance. Capt. Crowley is a returned combat hero.

A standing ovation greeted S/Sgt. James Yoshinobue when he returned to his home town of Torrance on August 30th and spoke before the Rotary Club. Yoshinobue is forty-seven years of age and is a veteran of both world wars.
