The population of Rivers at midnight of September 24th, totaled 3140; in Canal 263 and in Butte 2877. Of this number 359 already have their plans made to relocate this week.

13 buses will leave during this week: 2 on Monday night; 3 on Tuesday; 3 on Wednesday; 3 on Thursday; and 2 on Friday. All of these will depart from Butte.

36.5 percent of the 29,198 evacuous who left the centers on termain leave between December 31, 1944, and September 1, 1945, have returned to California and in the last week of August, 50.4 percent of the relocators from all centers went to California.

Hostels do not have room to store freight and most shipments sent to them must be placed in private storage at the owner's expense. Mr. Tom Reynolds of Evacuee Property states that people who have no permanent address when they leave the center can put their freight in project storage until they can have it sent directly to them after they are relocated.

Mr. James H. Terry, Project Attorney, has made the following statement:

"The Evacuee Property Office and the Project Attorney have stated that all claims of Yokohama Specie Bank depositors and creditors in which the assistance of those offices are requested should be taken up with the Evacuee Property Office or the Project Attorney before October 6th. If assistance can be rendered and it is probable that each individual claimant will have to proper and file his own claim."

Bullock-Wilshire store in Los Angeles is interested in receiving applications for work from its former evacuoe employees. Bullock's downtown store already has established a policy of rehiring former employees of Japanese ancestry.

Wolfe Costume Designing School is welcoming returning evacues girls, Miss Frances Naruse from Granada is now attending. The course includes illustrating, patternmaking, and drafting -- nine months' course. Several graduates of this school have been placed with FKKO Studies.

The principal attornoy of WRA has reported:

"Mr. Goorgo Mills tells me that they are receiving hundreds of letters from evacuees inquiring as to when they may expect dividend payments from the Yokohama Specie Bank. He is advising that the Superintendant of Banks hopes to be able to make the first payment not long after October 1, 1945. Mr. Mills would like to have the writing of these letters discouraged as much as possible as he says answering them is consuming time and money that will be reflected in the amount of the dividends payable. Perhaps a notice incorporating the information as to the probable date of payment and an explanation of the possible consequences of individual inquiries could be published at the Centers. It would probably also be advisable for the Centers to again publicize the fact that claims should bo mado as soon as possible. Mr. Mills says that only about 50 per cent of the depositors have filed claims to date and that failure to get claims in more rapidly may delay liquidation and payment of dividends."

Returnees employed at the Billy Gordon's dressmaking establishment in Hollywood have done so well that Mr. Gordon has asked the Los Angeles WRA office to find a model, size 14, 5'6" to 5'8" tall, to wear the new Fall styles designed in the movioland manner. Many prominent stars are said to buy their clothes at this establishment.

A list of hostels in Northern California have just been received. It includes 6 in San Francisco; 1 in Visalia; 10 in Sacramento; 1 in Santa Rose; 2 in Fresno; 4 in Oakland; 3 in San Jose; and 4 in Watsonville.

People who relocated to the Wilson Plantation in Arkansas are well satisfied with the situation and prospects for the future, according to material sent to Mr. Todd from the Acting Relocation Supervisor, James R. Walter, in New Orleans. One of the Japanese-Americans now attending the Wilson High School has been elected Vice-President of his class. Everything is going pleasantly and in Mr. Walter's opinion, the Wilson Project will be one of the largest and most successful relocation onterprises.

Mr. and Mrs. George Seichi Cmori and their daughter, Kikuyo Beverly, from Gila, are now established at Glen Cove, Long Island, in the country home of Mrs. Bruce Tuttle. Kikuyo is attending the local high school. Prior to evacuation, the Omori's lived at 511 East 4th Street, Los Angeles, where they operated a restaurant. While in ila, Mr. Omori was the Mess Hall Chef.

Wataru Takeshita, former editor of the News Courier and Tadashi Hamane whose parents live in Block 63, are teaching at the University of Minnesota in the ASTP School and both live at 910 University Avenue S.E., Minneapolis. Tadashi Hamane recently was discharged from the Army after serving for more than three years in the Pacific.

Ernest Iwanaga, secretary to the Canal Red Cross, has relocated. The Canal chapter of the Red Cross closes on September 15th and all assets, cash balance of \$210, were forwarded to the Facific area of the Red Cross in San Francisco.

The Kawai's have been in Des Moines since July 1944. Their new home is at 3401 Urbandale Avenue, Des Moines.

"When You Arrive In New York" is a new pamphlet issued by the Resettlement Council of the Japanese American Organizations in New York City. It has a directive map, explanations in Japanese, and a list of those who will welcome and assist relocators arriving in that city. A number of former Cilans are listed. These pamphlets have been distributed to the Block Managers and the Relocation Advisors.

Mr. Ronald Kanagawa, a young Nisei chick sexor in Kansas City, Missouri, offers a course in chick sexing to other Nisei with assurance of work in hatcheries after completion of the course. Three former residents of Poston and Los Angeles, Tetsuo Sakamoto, Mitsui Oba, and Hisao Sakurai arrived in Kansas City to enroll in this course. Mr. Kanagawa resided in Sacramento before evacuation.

At Pasadone Junior College there are 33 Nisei -- and 200 war veterans of other races.

"At first the Nisei kopt together in groups," says a story in the Pasadona Star-Nows about the opening of school, "but the groups soon broke up and there was a mingling with other students and friends at the school as in prowar days."

And the same paper had a photo of Holen Morita from Gila River being welcomed by Jane Pedley, former aircraft worker who is now a fellow student.
