All day yesterday, Butte residents were without water for their laundry rooms and shower rooms. They went to bed last night without their customary shower.

But working all day yesterday and most of last night in the cold wind and rain and the mud, a crew from the Engineering Department finished repairs early this morning on the main water pipe supplying Butte, which broke for the third time in two weeks.

Transportation Division re-routed many of their trucks to supply the mess halls with water for cooking purposes.

Excessive pressure in the pipe, combined with the vibration of the turbine pump overworked under pressure, caused the break (continued on page 3)

WORLD TODAY

President Roosevelt and Winston Churchill returned this week from a secret meeting in North Africa. The announcement was not made until they had returned in their respective capitals. What they decided may determine the future of the world for generations.

But other men may also have an influence on those generations. Such men as Burton K. Wheeler and Wendell Willkie. Both had something to say when the North African meeting was announced.

Willkie questioned why a unified high command had not been decided upon and why a definite statement in favor of the Fighting French had not been made. This is consistent with Willkie's announced policy that he intends to be a loyal participant in the war and the following peace, but a constructive critic of the president's conduct of both.

Wheeler also was consistent. He expressed doubt that the meeting had decided anything. He doubted that it was anything more than a dramatic gesture. He questioned whether it would have or had had any effect on the war.

Perhaps neither of these men will help or hurt what was done by the North African conference; but both may have a tremendous effect on the support which Congress gives the president both during the war and in the all-important peace arrangements which follow. They will either have a world view and act like statesmen or they will allow party feuds and personal antagonisms to direct their actions.

Willkie has given every indication that his is a world view. There are many who suspect that Wheeler, on the contrary, is against whatever Roosevelt is for. The people may have the final voice in determining whether pettiness or statesmanship shall write the final peace. —M.F.

## SOLDIERS DENIED JUSTICE

The significant portion of the Battle JACL's memorial to the National Emergency Board reads as follows:

"...take immediate steps to restore to American Citizens of Japanese Ancestry now serving in the Armed forces of the United States all rights and privileges of American citizenship. We specifically request for them the right to travel freely in all parts of the United States as any other American."

Whether such memorials will produce results or not, is a moot question. But it is a reminder that men who have dedicated their lives to this nation are not permitted the same rights that ALIENS of other nationalities are entitled to. It is a reminder, too, that those very soldiers are denied free access to relocation centers in the military zone to visit relatives and friends—a consolation that by any standard of human decency should not be denied them. —JN

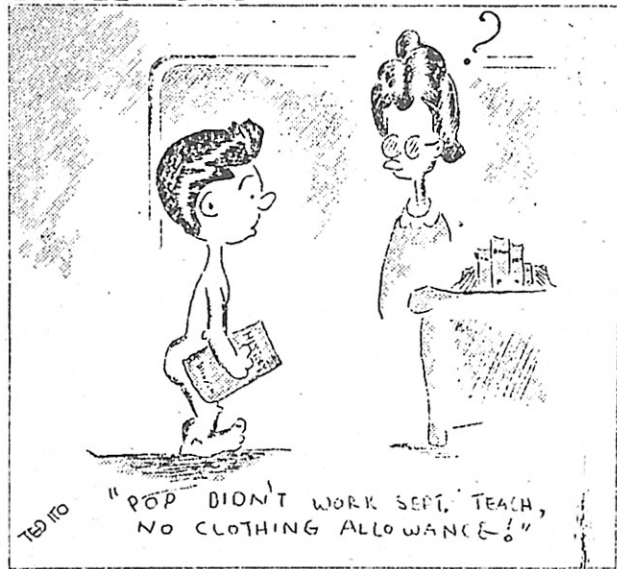
## FIREMEN, DOUSE THAT FIRE

**Winter Vegetable Harvest Continues in High Gear**

Harvest of winter vegetables continues apace. In mid harvest now are 26 acres of broccoli, and 43 acres of cauliflower. Still being cut are 60 acres of cabbages and 59 of lettuce. In smaller acreage, carrots, turnips, and nappa are available for mess hall talbos.

Planted and available for center menus over a period extending three months are peas-58 acres, beets-17, carrots-18, endives-5, nappa-12, swiss chards-3, cabbage-8, corn-5, celery-9, lettuce-50, and green onions-2 acres.

Seed beds have been prepared for tomatoes for transplanting after danger of frost is over.

## National Journal Features "Arizona City Of Exiles"

Rivers is graphically described in the latest Christian Century under the heading, "Arizona City of Exiles," by Dr. Albert W. Palmer, President of the Chicago Theological Seminary and a visitor in the colony several weeks ago.

Palmer, with a quick eye and an absorbing mind, learned much of Rivers in his brief one-day stop-over. He observes that "here you certainly have an interesting experiment in a limited form of communism, an experiment likely to be remembered and worth watching carefully as it unfolds."

"Will California let them come back? Will doors of opportunity open for them elsewhere? Will an effort be made to deport them all to Japan—as foreign a country to most of them as to any other Americans—or if not, will they be segregated and limited here in America? These are questions they are asking."
