READY RESPONSE TO MEMBER DRIVE

Immediate whole-hearted response to the membership drive for the Consumer Cooperative was reported at a combined meeting of temporary congress of cooperative representatives and the Butte Study and Research Committee, said and Tadashi Masato Kato Iwamoto, co-chairmen of the latter group.

Block 58 showed up a membership list of 251 members out of 272 residents to head the leaders. In close succession are blocks 46 with 249, 72 with 244, 39-243, 33-248 . Most of the other blocks are closely pressing the five for leadership.

At the meeting, proposals were formulated to ther revealed, and everybe presented for the approval of the temporary congress at a special meeting to be held this evening at 42-3-A.

At Canal, following a meeting of temporary congress of cooperative delegates, the proposals were taken back to the blocks for approval. The block sentiments will be aired when another meeting is called next week.
