MILITARY-VOLUNTARY ENLISTMENT

720 STEERS RECEIVED

Women's Latrines To Be Paneled

GILA COOP INCORPORATION ARTICLES SIGNED, MAILED

Consumer Cooperative Articles of Incorporation were signed yesterday, and have been mailed to Washington today, disclosed Tadashi Iwamoto and Masato Kato, co-chairmen of Butte Study and Research Committee.

The articles were read and studied by the congresses of cooperative delegates from Butte and Canal with the Study and Research Committee. They were signed by the Canal board of directors, Butte incorporators, and members of cooperative committees of the two Community Councils.

Rebates With Cash Receipts

To keep a record of all sales for rebate on profits, the community stores are now issuing cash register receipts with each purchase, stated Gilbert Kuramitsu, superintendent of Community Enterprises.

Kuramitsu emphasized the necessity of saving receipts because they are the only basis by which rebates can be made.

CHANGES TO QUESTIONNAIRE

SHOE STORES CLOSE DOORS

Shoe shops in both communities are closed and will remain closed for an indefinite period, pending the arrival of ration cards or some similar form for proper allocation, announced Gilbert Kuramitsu, superintendent of Community Enterprises.

Kuramitsu stated that the dry good stores are still conducting sales and that further yardage orders are on their way here.

ORGANIZATION OF BLOCK FIREFIGHTERS

For the evident purpose of safety, the Canal Fire Department approached the Central Block Managers and proposed the organization of a group of volunteer firemen in respective block, which would be composed of 6 to 10 members.

TAJIMA ON CITIZENSHIP

The Japanese people in the United States are going through a great test. The Japanese Americans are hardest hit. Some are desperate and estimate their citizenship as of very small value. Those who do not have American citizenship know its real value. One of my sons is Japan-born and has no citizenship in this country. He wrote me and said, "We must believe in America. We aren't getting a decent deal now, but would we get a better one in ____? Of course not. And in the future, America is quite apt to be the only country where freemen will have any chance to follow their ambitions."

This is the greatest value of American citizenship.

Young people! Do not give up your citizenship under any circumstances. Hold it, cherish it. The founders of this nation had won and held this freedom with their blood. Could we win it at less cost? Let us not be bitter about our present status. Listen to your country calling. Respond splendidly and manfully. Win American heritage and leave it to your posterity.

HOW TO SPEAK TO JAPAN

The best answer we could make to Japan's appeal to racial hatred would be action proving that the Japanese propagandists are wrong. The indiscriminate internment of all nisei (American citizens of Japanese parentage) makes us extremely vulnerable, for example, in view of our government's liberal treatment of Italian citizens and even German residents in America. We can best correct this by releasing the nisei who are found on investigation to be loyal Americans, while keeping in custody Japanese citizens and Kibei (Japanese-Americans educated in Japan) unless they are known to be harmless. The process is already underway, but should be speeded up and publicized--especially in propaganda aimed at Japan and East Asia. —The Nation

Loyalty is not the question. The one and only issue is SURVIVE OR PERISH. If the sign-up of volunteers is good, the Japanese-Americans will have friends on the outside. If it is not good, they will have NO friends ANYWHERE.

It is true that there have been injustices. It is true that there are still injustices. But if the sign-up is not good because of them, the American people, who are watching, will deem us. The injustices are not in issue; the issue is DO WE TAKE THIS CHANCE FOR A GREAT PUBLIC RELATIONS DRIVE, OR DO WE REFUSE AND DOOM OURSELVES. True, we cannot forget the injustices--no one has a right to ask us to forget them--but we are either going to remember and ruin ourselves, or remember and give ourselves a fighting chance. Choose quickly.

Only two types of people are going to oppose this thing: those who do not know that all America will turn against them if they fail in this, and those who know but who believe that their future lies in Japan. We may as well face the issues.

The whole nation is looking at this drive. If it succeeds, we have no guarantee that all our problems will be decided favorably; but if it fails, there is no hope for us in this country. The United States will have only one interpretation of failure: DISLOYALTY. And we shall be finished here.

Then where? Latin America? They are watching this thing too.

Europe? Europe is not a healthy place--and they are watching too. And they own Africa.

Australia? They have been against immigration even without watching this experiment.

Well then--Japan? Let us quit fooling ourselves. Even the most fair-minded

Nisei Still in Ariz. Free Zone

Thirty to forty families of Japanese ancestry still reside in the free zone north of Mesa, disclosed C. A. Mitten, publisher-editor of the Mesa Journal Tribune while on a recent visit to the center.

He added that many other families live in communities near Mesa. Almost all are engaged in farming.

Mitten came to the center on Tuesday with six other men, all directors of the Mesa Chamber of Commerce.

GILA VEGETABLES CONTINUE TO ROLL

The Gila farms and the packing shed have been the scene of intense activity during the past week as 955 sacks of cabbage from fields 66 and 69, and 417 sacks of carrots from field 48, occupying four freight cars, rolled off the siding at Casa Grande. This brings the total carloads shipped out to 42, of which six left during this month.

Within three days, the "Easy" boys of the Canal hauled 1,372 sacks to the siding, as two carloads left Tuesday for Poston and Tule Lake, one on Wednesday for Manzanar, and another on Thursday for Idaho.

NEW RENTAL BOOKS ON LIBRARY SHELF

Now on the rental shelf at the Canal library are MEIN KAMPF by Adolf Hitler, "THE GAUNT WOMAN," best-seller. Edmund Gilligan, the brilliant writer of sea-stories, is at his best with this new thrill-packed novel. Adventure, excitement, romance, and heroism surrounds the "Gaunt Woman."

Anthropologist Discusses Group Relation Problems

Speaking from the viewpoint of a cultural anthropologist, Dr. R.H. Lowie of the University of California, addressed a packed hall of young people on the topic, "Group Relation," Wednesday night at the Butte Buddhist Church.

Groups, he said, are naturally suspicious of each other for a variety of reasons, including economic competition and prejudice, or the feeling of identity with one's own kind. He cites the case of the Know-Nothing Club, which at one time gained enough power to put up a candidate for presidency in 1852 on the platform that America shall be reserved only for Anglo-Saxons and not for the large immigrating groups of Germans and Irish.

Dr. Lowie states that he came from Austria when he was ten years of age and grew up under the influence of a largely Germanic culture. He calls himself for that reason, a marginal man—one influenced (continued on page 4)

ed by two cultures. An advantage is such an individual is that he gains a greater, deeper understanding of groups and human problems. Disadvantage is a conflict of emotions arising from the cultural differences.

The melting pot theory of America has been scoffed at by many, he declares. However, after the passing of the first generation of immigrants, when the theory does not apparently work, the second generation begins to assimilate the American pattern. Danger here, he states, is that they often lose the good things of the old country.
