CITIZENSHIP RIGHTS FOR NISEI TO BE DEFENDED

Sign-Up Meets For Females

The first in a series of meetings during which registration of women will be discussed, is temporarily scheduled for tonight, announced Captain Norman Thompson.

Two meetings a night will be conducted in the various mess halls, and women between the ages of 21 and 44 will be issued invitations. Speakers will be Lieutenant Roberta House, Captain Norman Thompson and Project Director Leroy Bennett.

DOUCHA IS NEW SR. ENGINEER

Czechoslovakia-born John C. Doucha, Gila's new senior engineer, came into the center Sunday morning, and on Monday morning he was at his duties.

Confronting him are the problems of pushing WPB approvals for vitally needed buildings. Also requiring his attention is the construction buildings already approved.

GIFTS BESTOWED TO NEW-BORN

Gifts for new-born babies will be sent by many people in the country, as an expression of their feeling of fellowship for the evacuees in the relocation centers, if the names of the infants can be forwarded to the Clothing Committee of the American Friends, according to a letter received by the Community Activities Section from the AFSC.

The gifts "might be complete layettes or some individual pieces of clothing, or whatever might be suggested," the letter said.

MYER WIRES REASSURANCE

Reassurance that citizenship rights of the citizen evacuees is being recognized and will be defended was given in a teletype from WRA Director Dillon S. Myer to Project Director Leroy E. Bennett. The message reads:

"I have been informed that evacuees at several centers have asked for reassurance that citizenship rights of those evacuees born in the United States will be recognized. You are authorized to inform the evacuees at your center that the War Relocation Authority recognizes and will continue to defend those citizenship rights."

Departers May Get Ration Books Upon Request

War ration books number 1 and 2 will be issued to evacuees leaving the center on indefinite leaves, provided they request for it at least five days prior to departure, stated John Landward, leave officer.

In event the evacuee does not obtain the book before departure, arrangements will be made so that he can get them. The evacuees who received ration books no. 1 before evacuation, will have it returned upon application if he leaves the center.

REVENUE AGENT EXPECTED SOON

A revenue agent will visit Gila during week of March 1 to give assistance in Federal Income Tax matters. Exact days when agent will be here will be posted in block manager's office on March 1 or 2.

More Agitators Rounded Up In Centers

Evacuees suspected of fomenting disturbances were removed from two more centers, according to AP dispatches from Manzanar, California, and Klamath Falls, Oregon.

At Tule Lake Relocation Center, 27 evacuees were jailed, following several days of agitation over registration for job clearance and selective service. In Manzanar Relocation Center, 11 men were taken into custody as a climax to weeks of minor disturbances at the center.

Earlier at Poston and Rivers, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, with the aid of U. S. Deputy Marshals, had removed 7 and 26 men respectively.

Non-Registered Must Report

All male citizens and non-citizens between the ages of 17-38 who have not been notified and have not registered as yet, report without fail to mess hall 41 tomorrow, Feb. 26 between the hours of 8 a.m. to 12 noon, announced John Landward, administrative assistant.

Pumps Disposed of Long Fuel Lines

This week, another little inconvenience was gone. No longer were the evacuees hearing the raucous horn of the fuel-bringing trucks; no more were they forming long queues to wait patiently for their turn.

Instead, the evacuees were going to the fuel reservoir in each block and cranking the pumps for the tea-colored liquid.

The Canal branch of the NEWS-COURIER moved to the new room building.

HEALTH COLUMN

Rabies or hydrophobia is an acute specific disease which, unless cared for, brings forth death in practically one hundred percent of the cases. All mammals are susceptible, although the disease is most common in the carnivorous; hence rabies is primarily a disease of the lower animals which occasionally is conveyed to man. About 85 percent of animal rabies is found in the dog and the remaining 15 percent is distributed among coyotes, wolves, foxes, ground squirrels, rats, cats, cattle, sheep, and swine.

Human rabies occurs when an infected animal bites man, but sometimes infection is possible by the saliva of animals entering minute skin abrasions as in licking.

The virus (germ) of rabies is found in the saliva of the infected animal and when introduced into the human tissue, the virus travels along the nerves to the spinal cord and finally up to the brain resulting in certain death.

This state is an endemic area of rabies, that is, rabies is present at all times. The ultimate source of rabies is found in the wild coyotes, foxes and rodents of the open country. The domestic dog contracts the disease from these animals and gives the infection in turn to man. For this reason the stray dog is the major menace responsible for human rabies.

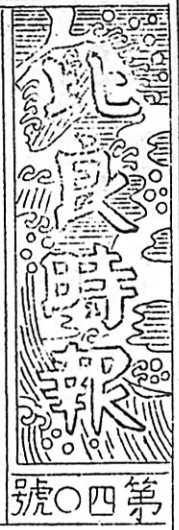

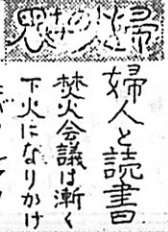
