Equipment Survey Starts To Find Actual Facts In Charges

A compulsory survey of all farm equipment owned by the evacuees at the time of evacuation started this week in both communities, stated A. F. Chamberlin, evacuee property officer.

The survey was instituted as a result of the claims made by interested parties and organizations that a large amount of evacuee-owned idle farm equipment are stored in California. The survey, Chamberlin stated, would give as fair a picture as possible of the actual facts.

The latest reports from Orange County, where most of the agitations are centered are that huge caches of idle equipment have been found.

Jeopardizes Future Leaves

Though the benefits of living in a free zone should be made available to as many residents as possible, if the few who are violating WRA regulations relative to leaving the community continue to do so, there will be no other alternative other than to revoke all visiting leaves for all other residents, warned Project Director Leroy Bennett, in a statement to the press yesterday.

According to the Project Director, reports have come in indicating that a few evacuees have been taking WRA automotive equipment and driving out of the Project area limits during daytime and evening hours. Only persons with

Rundquist Urges Resettlement

Ardent advocate of resettlement and a maker, Executive Secretary George E. Rundquist of the Committee on Resettlement of Japanese Americans urged the residents to resettle as the best practical solution to the minority problem they constitute in America before the CAS Council, Tuesday night.

FRIENDS IN WISCONSIN

A nisei was employed at a super-market in Madison, Wisconsin. He had gone there soon after the outbreak of war. It was spring of 1942. Japan had been piling one victory on top of the other in a big hurry, and the American people were becoming Jap-conscious. It finally got to the nisei. The manager of the super market reluctantly fired him following pressure from his customers.

But in that town was a Legionnaire, a man by the name of Bull. He was incensed by the unfairness of the deal, and he refused to let injustice prevail. He talked--clearly stating his stand.

In Madison a Jew, Rothschild, who operated the largest department store, heard the story. Perhaps he saw a parallel between anti-Semitism and anti-niseiism. At any rate, he was a democrat, a decent human being, and very much of a man of courage. He hired the nisei.

Soon after that, a local resident telephoned Rothschild. "Say, is that a Jap working for you?" he demanded.

Rothschild asked the man for his name. It was Scandinavian. Was it a Swedish name? No, Norwegian.

Rothschild was quick on his feet, "Oh, a Quisling, huh?"

Madison, today--because a Legionnaire and a Jew believed in fair play--is a tolerant town.

PACIFIC CITIZEN--

Opposing a bill now before the Senate military affairs committee to return the management of the war relocation centers to the army, the Jewish Peace Fellowship in Los Angeles has written Senator Robert Reynolds, chairman of the Senate group, declaring that such a move "works a hardship upon the American democratic ideal."

"The more totally we regulate citizens (Nisei) without individual hearings, the greater harm we do to our own ability to solve problems in a democratic fashion," the letter to Sen. Reynolds stated. "Without any self-sympathy, we probably can say that as Jews we intuitively feel the harm a society may do unto itself when it handles a minority with unnecessarily restrictive methods... We will appreciate your continued efforts in the relocation of the Japanese."



Rundquist came to the center Tuesday to bring to the evacuees a picture of employment and living conditions on the outside. He has scheduled a series of meetings with community leaders and residents. Tomorrow night, he will address all interested residents at mess hall 16.

As a representative of the powerful Federal Council of Christian Churches, Rundquist's primary job is to contact groups and leaders on the outside to sell the resettlement program and evacuee workers, and to organize effort to aid it.

scale of 1" to 50 feet. Completed models, averaging from 18 inches to 2 feet in length, are beautiful things to behold.

Three of each type of warship will be constructed, after which they will be submitted to Washington. If the ships are approved by the Navy Department, as Julius has every reason to believe they will be, fifty of each model will be built and the whole ship construction project probably put on a commercial basis somewhat like the camouflage net factory.

HOT WEATHER MEANS SUNBURNS

With the onset of hot weather we would like to call to the attention of the Project residents two important points. First, particular care must be exercised by parents of babies and young children in order to avoid exposing them to severe sunburn. In this climate, children especially, are burned quite severely after very short sun exposures. In order to avoid this, be sure that children are not allowed to run around with their bodies exposed to the sun except for short periods of 5-10 minutes. This may be increased by the same amount daily until the child will be able to stay out any length of time without danger.

The second point is to call to the attention of parents of children possible dangers which may arise from scorpion bites. Children should be warned to be very careful before picking up stray objects lying on the ground.
