

## Youth Sign on Reaching 17 Registration for Clearance

All evacuees reaching the age of 17 should be registered on Form 126 (revised) regardless of their sex or citizenship. Director D. S. Myer instructed in a memorandum to the project.

Registration should take place as soon as possible after the individual reaches his or her 17th birthday. Form 126, revised, is a leave clearance form. The registration conforms with the WRA policy of signing up all evacuees, 17 and above, for clearance.

## COOP RECEIVES LICENSE TO OPERATE IN ARIZONA

### FEE COLLECTION BEGINS THIS WEEK

All Pool's Day was a significant one for the residents as on that day was signed a license for the Gila River Cooperative Enterprises Inc. to operate in the state of Arizona. It gave legal status to the only administrative and business function within the center owned and operated wholly by evacuees, who are members of

the Coop. Six weeks hence, after filing affidavit of publication for six times in a Coolidge paper, all red-tape will have been severed, stated Masato Kato, executive secretary of the Cooperatives.

Membership certificates for the Coop arrived yesterday, and its distribution and collection of membership fees will probably commence this week, said Kato. Yesterday, also, transfer agreement of assets and liabilities was signed between the WRA Community Enterprises and the Cooperative. Signed, too, were operating and rental agreements.

Lending further significance to April 1, from that day all checks issued by the Enterprises were signed by Shobei Sasaki, treasurer of the Coop, and Gilbert Kuramitsu, general manager. It was revealed that employees of the Enterprises received their March payroll Saturday.

## FEDERAL HOUSING AID MADE AVAILABLE TO RESETTLERS

In cities where the housing situation has been most acute the National Housing Agency has established War Housing Centers, where new arrivals are given information on available living quarters. This applies to family apartments and to rooms. Relocation officers of the WRA are also in a position to direct persons relocating to church groups and other local agencies who are willing to lend assistance in finding housing accommodations.

The government leases large homes and other buildings and converts them into multi-family units and dormitories.

Some of the cities in

the middle west where War Housing Centers are located are: Michigan: Battle Creek, Detroit, Flint, Muskegon, Pontiac, Saginaw; Kentucky: Louisville; Ohio: Akron, Canton, Cleveland, Dayton, Lorain, Marion, Newark, Springfield, Warren; Illinois: Chicago, Rockford; Indiana: Evansville; South Dakota: Sioux Falls; Wisconsin: Madison, Milwaukee; Kansas: Dodge City, Garden City, Kansas City, Wichita; Missouri: Kansas City.

Other cities in these states and none of the cities and towns in Minnesota, Nebraska, Iowa or North Dakota have as yet a housing shortage therefore no WHC.

# Senator Chandler Outlines Evacuee Disposition Program

Just after he had returned from a first-hand view of the relocation centers including Rivers, Senator A. B. Chandler, chairman of a sub-committee of the Senate Military Affairs Committee, outlined three steps of his proposed program for the disposition of evacuees and the centers.

The three steps, he explained, are: (1) all who will volunteer or who can be drafted should be put in the army; (2) disloyal should be imprisoned in concentration camps; (3) those who are loyal and able to work should be certified by the FBI and allowed to take jobs.

The senator said that this was his personal view and he could not yet speak for his sub-committee, which will meet next Tuesday to consider what recommendations to make.

Chandler stated that his intention was to save the country a substantial part of the money WRA is spending. The WRA was

appropriated \$70,000,000 last year, and according to the senator, is asking for \$90,000,000 this year. It was believed that the large part of the appropriation this year will be used for the resettlement program.

On the basis of answers in the military questionnaire, the senator said he found 25 to 50% of the evacuees disloyal. At Manzanar, he said, 50 to 60% had answered loyalty questions in the negative.

## BRAIN FOOD BUSINESS HIGH

The flourishing fish business in the colony will be expanded this week in Gila as markets will be opened at block 20 and 59 ironing rooms for weekly sales on Friday. At Canal, the market remains in block 6 for Thursday sales.

To prevent overcrowding, a ticket system of sales has been evolved, whereby tickets will be issued weekly on first come-first serve basis, and sales will be made in order of tickets issued. It was stated that fish will be rationed henceforth also.

The Enterprises spiked rumors that fish sold on Fridays in Butte were leftovers from Thursday's sales in Canal. They stated that each sale is a sell-out, and there is no possibility of the above.

## PEAS, BERRIES MAY BE CURTAILED

Because residents have been going out to the farm and picking peas without any authority, a shortage has been created and it has not been possible for an equal distribution among the mess halls, announced David Rogers, of the Farm Management.

A similar situation has been created with the strawberry crop, and unless people cease to pick the crop and destroy the plants, there will not be many strawberries available for local consumption, it was pointed out.

Plenty of melons and cantaloupes will be available for the mess halls shortly, stated Rogers, which will be a genuine treat for the warm summer days to come.
