Mizukami Is First Inductee

Pegler in his discussion of Rivers and the relocation program in his column on April 29 and 30 was critical of the dumping of loyal and disloyal into the same centers.

Stamp, Bond Day Tomorrow

Invest Wisely; Preps To Sell

Winding up a week of hectic activities, a joint drive for the sale of war stamps and bonds will be conducted tomorrow by both Butte and Canal. Free movies, an all student talent show, sports events, and a matinee dance will crowd Saturday's activities, designated as the Day of Athletics and Entertainment.

High school members of both Butte and Canal will be recruited on Victory Day, to sell War Stamps and Bonds to interested residents. Bonds may also be purchased at the canteens, administration building or the high school offices.

Bond applications received on Friday will be taken to the Valley National Bank in Phoenix to be changed into bonds. These bonds will be delivered to all purchasers on Monday.

Brown estimated that the fund amounts to over \$50,000, which will be shared by approximately 7,000 workers. The cut for each worker will be based on the WRA payroll as of Dec. 15, 1944, to April 30, 1945 said Brown. The share for each worker will probably be issued before the end of the month.

The trustees have applied to the WRA Washington office for a license to permit payment to blocked nationals, licensed nationals and citizens in order that all persons entitled to money from factory funds may be paid directly, it was said.

O. WADA, 72, STILL MISSING

On the sixth day after his disappearance, Otomatsu Wada, 72, 63-14-B, remained unfound despite repeated efforts to locate him. Wada is reported missing since 2:30 p.m. May 1.

LET'S BUILD A NEW BRIDGE

The back-to-California movement has always remained a strong one among the evacuees. Why?

California and the two other Pacific Coast states are the ones the evacuees were ousted from. They are the three states, particularly, California, which have fostered the yellow peril scare. They originated the "anti" laws. California was responsible for the act of 1924 which forbade the immigration of Japanese to America. California is the present source of most of the anti-evacuee publicity.

Then can evacuees have any illusions that it will be any more kindly than it has been?

From the Middle-West and the East we are getting ample evidence that the people there are more receptive to evacuees and infinitely less prejudiced than the Westerners. Evacuation burned a bridge behind them. It will be wiser to build a new bridge--many of them to the 40 states east of the Rocky Mountains--than reconstruct a shaky one back to the past. It's far saner to go where evacuees are more welcome than to set a stage for another evacuation.

Headed For Failure?

Unless the assistance of qualified evacuee instructors can be obtained, it appears that the WRA training program to develop and renew skills needed on the outside is headed for failure.

We are aware that there are a number of people who are capable of teaching night school material but are wasting their time in relatively unimportant positions. If you believe in America, in the future of the nisei; if you believe that people deserve a chance, then you see the importance of the Adult Education classes, and that the vacancies in instructor's positions must be filled immediately.

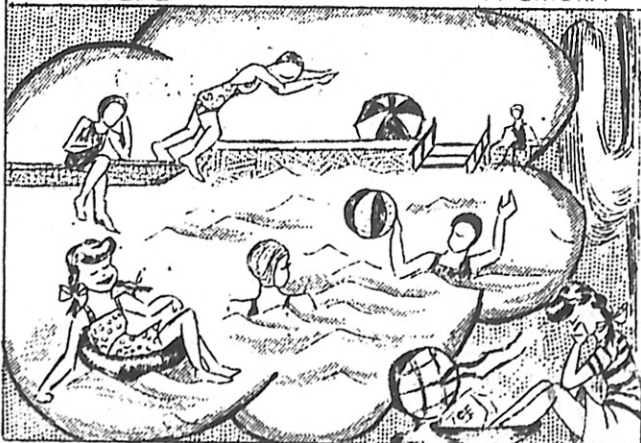

New Vegetables Near Harvest Honeydews, Melons In Abundance

Cantaloupes will soon make their appearance on the mess tables as the first pickings of the 27 acre crop is expected to begin around June first. Initial pickings of the 134 acres of watermelons will start about a month after the cantaloupes.

Other melons planted on the Project farms are 30 acres of honeydew and 4 acres of casaba.

First pickings of the string beans have just begun. String beans are a new crop for Arizona. The first plantings look promising, and if the weather doesn't turn extremely hot or if strong wind storms don't arise, a good crop is expected.

Experimental planting of celery was not very successful. Plants were set out in the field too late for a good crop. Distribution of 9,724 pounds of celery have been made to the mess halls.

The first harvest of the 44 acre crop of bulb onions is expected about May 25.

Adult Education Teachers Needed \$19 Positions, No Degrees Required

Nineteen dollar positions as Adult Education secretary and as Adult Education instructors must be filled to provide training for employment on the outside and for replacement within the project, according to a joint announcement by Mendel Lieberman, Adult Education supervisor and the Employment Division.

The secretarial opening is in Butte alone, but both communities are in need of instructors in shorthand, accounting, office manners and practice, business English, advanced English, and playground work. In Canal, there are also openings for teachers of English to the issei.

No degrees or credentials are required for such teaching. What the students need is anybody who knows a little more than they do about the subject--and the need is great.

MORE DEPART TO BEET FIELDS

Another contingent of four families and 22 single workers left the colony yesterday afternoon by bus for beet farms in Colorado and Nebraska territory of the Great Western Sugar Company.

Jack Maynard, recruiter for this company, announces that the labor situation is improving in this area and that shipments may be discontinued after next week as thinning operation will be well underway on many farms by that time.

VEGETABLES

75 Carloads Leave Gila

Since the November harvest, 75 carloads of fresh vegetables have been shipped to the different relocation centers to date.

Included in the shipments were 6,000 bell pepper plants to Topaz and 25,800 tomato plants to Granada and Topaz from Gila nursery. Among the other vegetables shipped were beets, cabbages, carrots, green onions, and turnips.

At present, an average of 3 to 5 carloads a week are being shipped to other centers.

Three war crops have been planted. These are the cotton, flax, castor bean crops. Forty acres of a new type of cotton have been planted for seed. Threshing will begin on the 66 acres of flax this month.

In its first year, a small crop of strawberries has been planted. Six hundred and thirty-two pounds have already been distributed to the mess halls as of April 30.

Other recent plantings on the Project farms includes 25 acres of corn, 33 of cucumbers, 22 of peanuts, and 36 acres of mango beans to be used for bean sprouts.

HEALTH COLUMN



Dr. J. Slooth, M.D.

Although it is known by most people that the sanitary conditions of a city have a direct bearing on the health of the people who reside there, it seems that many people take this fact for granted but do not fully realize or appreciate its significance.

There are many things which must be done in order to maintain sanitary conditions in the mess hall, latrines, and laundries, other than those things which appear immediately obvious. Furthermore, the public health of the community is dependent upon a rigid control of anything which has to do with sanitary conditions in all parts and facilities of the Project as a whole.

The Medical Department maintains a Sanitary Corp which is trained to inspect all these facilities mentioned above which have a bearing on the sanitary conditions in the Project. On the basis of the reports which are submitted to the Chief Medical, recommendations are given to the block managers, mess hall supervisors, and other individuals concerned, pointing out to those individuals what the deficiencies are and of the steps that must be taken in order to correct them.

Although this system is good, it is also extremely necessary that each evacuee become conscious of the sanitary conditions existing in his own latrine, his own mess hall, and a round his own block in general. It should be his particular concern to find out what the Sanitation Corp has to report about his own block.

With these thoughts in mind, the Medical Dept. is instituting a program whereby these things may be expedited. (Part II of article continued next issue.)

DOUCHA GIVES COOLER TIP TO RESIDENTS

To prevent breeding grounds for mosquitoes, scorpions and other insects, J.C. Doucha, senior engineer, asks center residents to avoid the excessive use of water in their coolers.

Besides forming puddles under the coolers which provide excellent breeding grounds for insects, the humidity in the room is unpleasant if the coolers are flooded with water.

The proper procedure to feed water to the cooler is to open the valve just enough to flood the pad and then adjust flow so that the water just barely drips down.
