Twenty-six enrollees in the NYA resident training schools will entrain for Saint Paul, Minnesota, early next week, as the vanguard of hundreds more who are expected to go in the future.

Nine will leave Monday and the balance will follow on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Youths interested in learning skills not taught at the St. Paul school are advised that additional NYA training schools teaching other skills will be opened soon to meet.

CRYSTAL CITY REUNION CAMP BEING READIED FOR FAMILIES To House Transferred Evacuees

Evacuees may join interned family members in the reunion camp at Crystal City, Texas, soon, announced William Tuttle, social welfare head, yesterday. Simultaneously he revealed the rules which will govern and conditions which will prevail at the camp.

Transfers from a relocation center to the reunion camp will be approved only after a careful investigation has shown that the transfer will be in the best interests of all members of the family and of the government.

Japanese and German internees and a small number of other nationalities will occupy the camp together with their families.

NYA OPENS NEW JOB FIELDS

The implications of the WRA-NYA agreement to accept nisei in NYA resident training schools are tremendous. In the schools, nisei will be trained in industrial skills and are practically assured of jobs in six weeks to four months.

The pre-war nisei world was a narrow one. The average nisei either took over his parent's business or worked as domestic, gardener, or with a firm owned by one of his own kind. Their greatest kick was that opportunities were so limited. The limitations were partially the nisei's fault (because he was not aggressive enough, nor daring enough to strike out east, and he was a victim of a defeatist philosophy), and partly because opportunities were not for people of their race.

Unfortunate though wars are, one of their few good results are that they tend to level mankind. This is happening in America where even the down-trodden negroes are getting jobs they never dreamed of attaining. Once they attain some concessions, history verifies that by and large, the status quo ante never returns.

Nisei, despite their position being a peculiarly unfavorable one, are also getting an opportunity to crash fields they never have been able to in bulks before. The field of industrial labor in the Middle West and East is capable of absorbing and willing to absorb thousands of nisei. With a natural manual aptitude, industrial skills are a cinch for them.

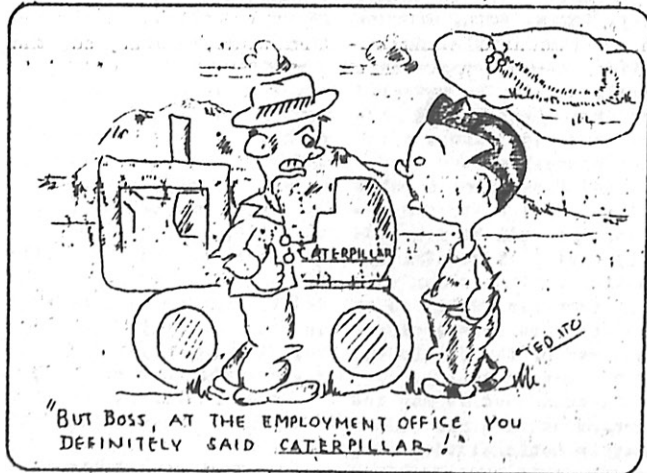
The opportunity is here, but nisei have no developed skills. Now, however, with the NYA agreement, nisei have a chance to learn skills.

Already 100 have applied for the schools from this center. Next week, the first groups will be leaving for the St. Paul, Minn. training school. These people are driving a wedge into new fields through which other nisei can enter them.

THE WOMEN

Will the nisei women lag behind women of other groups in attaining their full stature?

In Europe and in Asia, some women are bearing arms. Most of them are taking the places of their menfolk in the fields and factories, American women, from the (continued on page 5)

'FARMING CONDITIONS IDEAL' SAID OF COLORADO AREAS

Hayasuke Yamamoto, 72-8-B, has just returned from an inspection trip to Colorado farms in Great Western Sugar Co. territory. He will go back with his family on indefinite leave to a farm he has located there.

He reports that public opinion, soil conditions, schools, roads, cities, towns, etc. are excellent in Colorado and that there are many opportunities there which make Colorado farming areas ideal for relocation of Japanese farmers. During the next few days before he leaves, he will be glad to give further information to any that are interested.

Yamamoto stated that a farm in Colorado wants two couples for a year around work immediately. Another farm needs a couple and four single men on the same basis. He reports that housing and other living and working conditions are excellent.

Jack Maynard, recruiting sugar beet workers for farms in the Great Western area in Colorado, warns that with beets ready for thinning now. Offers of

employment will only be available for a short time longer and that all who want to go out from here next week must be signed up by Sunday night.
