NET WORK ENDS

After five and a half months of operations, the camouflage net project closed down under order from the War Department. Yesterday the garnishing grounds there over a thousand evacuees had provide wholesome activity for the young people in the center.

Accreditation

RIVERS HIGH SCHOOLS TO GET RATING SOON

Following an inspection of Butte and Canal high schools by O.K. Garretson, officials here were notified that the high schools of both communities will receive a B rating by the Arizona State Committee on Accreditation. This rating will enable high school students to enter universities or colleges upon graduation.

The B rating was given because of the lack of complete shops, libraries, laboratory, it was revealed.

Practically all of the private and Catholic high schools in the state have B ratings, he added.

Following are excerpts from a letter received by Miller:

I wish to compliment you and your staff on the

quality of work they have done despite obvious deficiencies in plant and equipment. On the basis of information gained relative to the qualifications of your staff, the nature of your curriculum and the facilities afforded for instruction as well as the attitude of the student body, I feel that I can recommend to the Arizona State Committee on Accreditation the

granting of a Class B rating to Butte high school and Canal high school. This rating would serve to give official recognition to both of your schools, and in the event of the transfer of pupils to other high schools or the application of your graduates for admission to colleges would facilitate the acceptance of credits.

ARIZONA STATE LAW AIMED AT EVACUEE ENTERPRISES

An Arizona State law which states that anyone having business dealings with any persons whose movements are restricted must give notice of such business transactions by triple publication in a newspaper and file a copy of the notice in the office of the Secretary of State, was enacted in the closing session of the 16th legislature. The law has been in effect since March 23.

"The law applies to any person who enters into any contract, agreement or understanding written or verbal, involving business relations with persons of restricted movement, or who purchases, sells trades or exchanges with such a person any real personal property, commodity or thing, except goods, wares or merchandise for personal consumption," according to the Phoenix Gazette.

PART-TIME AMERICANS

As a study in conflicts the efforts of Arizona's chauvinists to aid in the democratic war effort and at the same time insist that persons of Japanese ancestry should not settle in their state bring moments of amusement (tinged with indignation).

The latest blow is the law, operative October 23, which in effect will minimize or make almost non-existent business transactions between the residents of Arizona and the nisei and issei. The law demands that any business transaction must be preceded by a triple publication of the intention to do business, except where goods, wares, or merchandise is sold for personal consumption.

Nisei and issei farmers and business men are in a quandry; they can neither buy material and equipment for business purposes nor sell their products. Dental attention was refused a nisei, and by the same token medical care is subject to the law. Lawyers say that a person of Japanese ancestry cannot even have a haircut without going through a lot of legal rigmarole.

With this law California's reactionaries have been outdone in a discriminatory, un-American practice. Is it not an act of sabotage to hinder the "Food for Victory" program? By what moral law has the state the right to deny dental or medical treatment to any person who may require it? How on earth can such a law be written into the books without openly jeering at the democratic principles for which the nation is at death grips with forces which would strangle them?

Furthermore the law which does not specifically name persons of Japanese descent, but rather states persons whose movements are restricted, can be interpreted to include everyone except those serving in the armed forces inasmuch as there are many places restricted to the general public.

Arizona's zealots have sunk from the sublime to the ridiculous in this effort. Rumblings of the nation at such legislation can be heard already. It's a mighty shaky fence that Arizona's part-time American straddles.

NEW YORK DISPATCH

Kathleen Iseri, ex-Gila, is working as secretary in New York relocation office under Robert Cullum. She was transferred lately to the New York office from Washington. She writes as follows:

"I am writing this from New York and writing because I thought you might be able to help stir up interest in relocating in New York, New Jersey, etc. As stated in a Gila News editorial it is not sound thinking to wish to return to California--after all it does not want us.

"Take New York. There is such a mixture of people of all nationalities here, no one pays any attention to you. Employment opportunities are limitless, defense work, especially, and skilled and professional. For the skilled it would be so much better to come here instead of going out as unskilled farm labor or domestics.

"The greatest obstacle this office is faced with is Eastern Defense Command clearance to work in a war industry and EDC clearance to enter this area. Secondly we have to contend with the reluctance of the nisei to take advantage of the many opportunities open to them today.

"Cost of living here is not bad at all--in fact much lower than in Washington. That place is no place for relocation, everything is so expensive, and it's so crowded.

"Mr. Myer was in the office yesterday. He told me about Mrs. Roosevelt's visit to Gila. He is here to attend the JACL conference.

"Everyone in this office is wonderful. They work so very hard for us. The office is located at the far end of Manhattan, a block from the famed Wall Street. For myself, I wouldn't trade my job for the world.

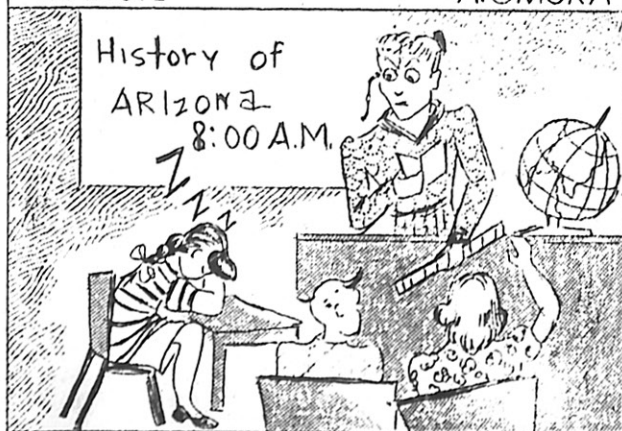
"I want to do all I can to help the nisei. Although, EDC clearance takes about six weeks to come through, it's worth waiting for. I shall do all I can for anyone who is interested, hoping for favorable results."

CLOTHING ALLOWANCE CHECKS DUE SOON; DELAY UNAVOIDABLE

In answer to the numerous inquiries from both Butte and Canal regarding the delay in payment of clothing allowance, Mary E. McCarthy, clothing supervisor, stated that the checks should be received in a few days.

Explained Miss McCarthy, "The delay in payment of the clothing allowance is due to the many factors involved in the processing of the vouchers. The clothing orders are made up from the regular payroll and the payrolls are not available to the Clothing Allowance Section until all payrolls have been submitted to the Disbursing Office. This means at least 5 weeks have elapsed before the order can be typed and submitted to the Finance Section by the Welfare Section. The voucher is then made up by the Finance Section and after auditing and posting it is submitted to the Disbursing Offices in Los Angeles for payment. All clothing orders are being expedited as fast as possible and any further questions should be taken up with the Clothing Allowance Department. A reasonable amount of patience and confidence in those who are doing everything possible to get the Clothing Allowance checks to the individual concerned would be appreciated."

Families HOSTELS URGED FOR RELOCATION

Assured now that the hostel plan is feasible, the American Friends Service Committee is bending its efforts to convince family groups of the advisability of resettling through the hostel, said Miss Esther Rhoads, representative. Miss Rhoads said that to date only ten families have resettled via the Chicago hostel.

The Friends are supervising two hostels at present. She said that one was opened recently in Cincinnati, Ohio. A hostel supervised by the Baptist Home Mission Council is operating in Cleveland. A hospitality arrangement under John Copithorne, recent Gila visitor, is opening Des Moines, Iowa. Dr. Clarence Gillette, former pastor of Santa Maria, California, Japanese Union Church heads a hospitality set-up in St. Louis, Mo.

Miss Rhoads said that the Service Committee is largely acting as an advisory group to the evacuees now since the facilities of Federal employment and other services and the WRA is available to the evacuees.

White worked in the eastern Nebraska for a month before coming to Gila to acquaint himself with evacuees, and the leave procedure. When he returns to regular work next month he will take charge of the relocation office in Des Moines, Iowa.

Though predominantly an agricultural area, Nebraska and Iowa nevertheless has many industrial opportunities, he revealed. Many war plants are operating in small communities in these states. He pointed out that the farm offers are substantial, and will likely result in greater savings than the jobs available in cities.

after millions of square feet of camouflage nets had been turned out for use in the battlefronts of the world to keep military objects from the eyes of the enemy. The use of airplanes for observation has made nets increasingly important as a battlefront necessity. In Rivers now ship model construction remains the only work directly applicable to the war effort.

Captain Robert Patton of the RAF who recently visited Rivers said of the net workers, "If all war workers in Great Britain and America worked as quickly and as efficiently as the men and women at the net factory are doing, the war will be shortened by five years."

The average production per person exceeded by 100% the amount estimated by the authorities. The highest average per person done in one day was about 3,800 square feet. The highest plant average per day is one million three hundred thousand square feet.

Drawing will be held after the movie at the amphitheatre on Friday, June 4, at 7:30 p.m. Besides the afore-mentioned prizes, there will be others.

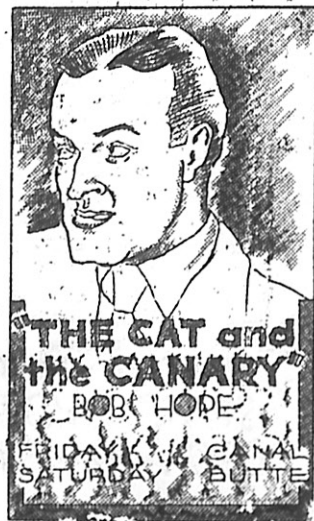
