



HOSPITAL ASKS FOR BOTTLES NOT IN USE

Dr. D. Boardman is sending out a call to the residents for the return of all hospital-issued prescription bottles and medicine droppers not in use.

In 4 months over 5560 bottles and 500 droppers have been issued to the Topaz residents.

83% OF RESIDENTS OVER 17 YRS. NOW REGISTERED

Approximately 5000 or 83% of the Topaz residents over 17 years of age had completed their registration questionnaires this afternoon, it was reported by Claude Cornwall, who is in general charge of the registration headquarters located in Dining Hall 1.

With a total population of 6100 persons subject to registration, about 1100 remained for the final scheduled day, Thursday.

3 blocks are listed for Thursday with Blocks 35 and 36 reporting in the morning and Block 28 slated for the afternoon. All those who for one reason or other have not been able to sign up at their appointed time are urged to appear on Thursday and complete their papers.

Of the 1450 male citizens over 17 years of age it was estimated by Cornwall that about 1250 had registered by the end of this afternoon. In addition to the male citizens, there are about 1500 female citizens and 3150 aliens who will have been registered when the books are closed.

Charles F. Ernst, project director, pointed out that now is the time for every resident of Topaz over 17 years of age to sign up for leave clearance. As was previously announced, aliens who applied for repatriation

prior to January 28 do not have to register at this time, but he suggested that it will do no harm for them to do so, and that it might be helpful someday if they had applied now while the registration machinery is functioning. Such a registration, he said, will in no way affect their repatriation application, but there is always a chance that circumstances will change, and that the person who has filed for repatriation might want to apply for leave clearance. By registering now such a change would be much more easily effected later.

2ND NURSERY GROUP OPENED

The Pre-school department announces the opening of its second pre-kindergarten group for elder nursery age school children from Monday, March 1, at Rec 27.

The school will be in session from 2:30 to 5 PM daily.

INTERVIEW

"EVACUATION A TEST" - BONDFIELD

"The evacuation has become a trial which the Japanese American people must face," asserted Rt. Hon. Margaret Bondfield before her departure yesterday afternoon. "I hope that the Japanese American people in the future would be able to look back with pride at the courage and patience shown during this evacuation."

Miss Bondfield, who was formerly the Minister of Labor of Great Britain, a member of the House of Commons and the president

of the British Trade Council, departed for Montana after a 3½-day stay here as a guest of Charles F. Ernst, project director, and Co-op chief Walter Honderich, both of whom she met in 1938 when she was in America in connection with her study of social work and the co-operatives.

In the United States for her sixth time, she has been travelling over this country since December, 1941, to promote Anglo-American friendship.
