VOTING HEAVY

Topaz residents Tuesday elected 34 councilmen to hold office in the Community Council.

Final election results found 22 issei and 12 nisei in office, 7 of the 12 being members of the present Council. Sixteen of the successful candidates won their posts by acclamation.

29 VOTES 100%

Voting in all of the Center's 34 occupied blocks was especially heavy, with Block 29 making a perfect record with 100% of its eligible voters appearing at the polls. Block 9's 159 voters represented the largest single voting group.

The new Council representatives, who were to have met with the present Council this afternoon, will take office July 1 and will serve until the end of the year.

SEMI-FAMILY STYLE SERVICE INSTITUTED IN DINING HALLS

Semi-family style service has been inaugurated in all dining halls as a result of a meeting held by a committee of chefs Monday, according to Brandon Watson, chief project steward.

The new system will incorporate a partial family and cafeteria type of service, with rice and salad being placed on the tables and the entree and vegetables served at the counter. Waitresses will serve soup, beverages, and dessert at the tables.

Complete family style service, which was to have been started several weeks ago, met with little success at that time, and this new system has been devised as a result.

It was pointed out by the committee that after a short trial, semi-family style service might be extended as it may appear advisable in the future.

SOCIAL ANALYST SCHEDULES TALK

Dr. Weston La Barre, social analyst of Topaz, will speak on "Race and Civilization" at Dining Hall 33 this Friday from 8 PM.

Sponsored by the Topaz Archeological Society, the lecture will be open to the public. Dr. La Barre, who was professor of anthropology at Rutgers University prior to his coming to Topaz, will make one of his final appearances as speaker before he leaves soon for induction into the armed services.

CUB FIELD DAY TO BE HELD SATURDAY

The Topaz Cubs will hold a field day this Saturday at the high school plaza from 1:30 PM, according to the Community Education division.

Included in the program are speeches by Project Director Charles F. Ernst and Cub Commissioner Drayton Nuttall, and numerous field events.

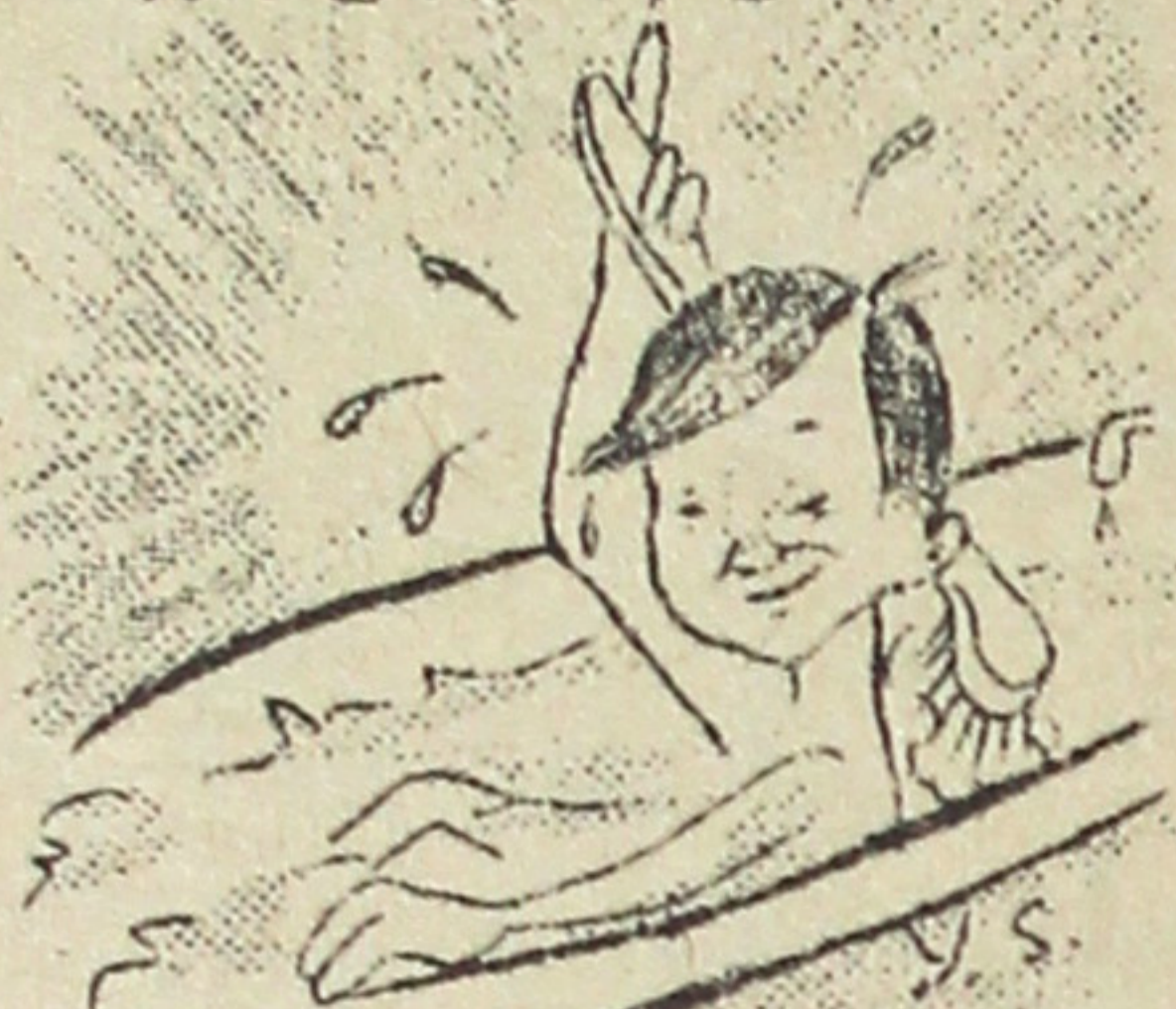

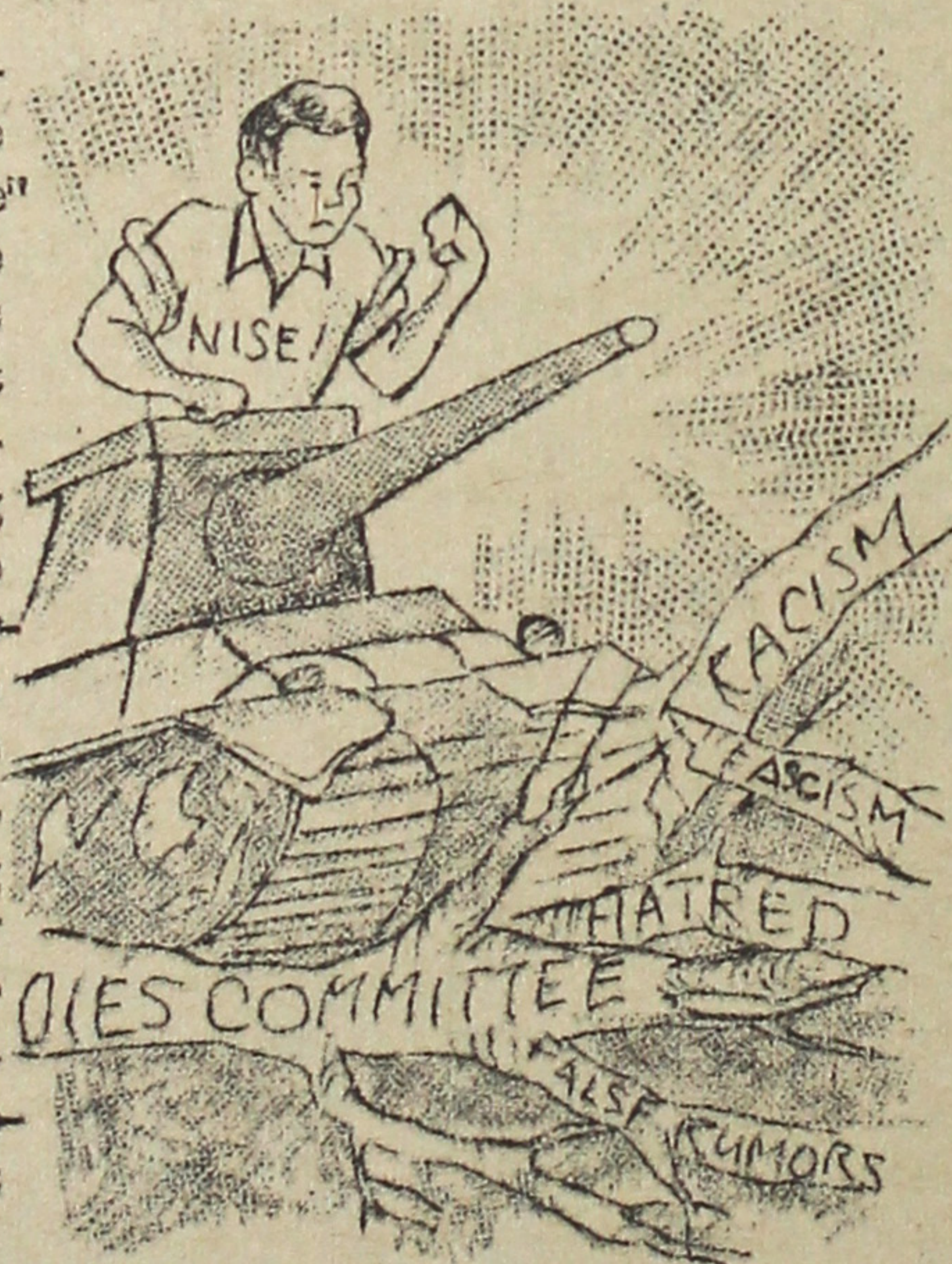
We felt pretty free until the bus drove up to the gates of Heart Mountain. This center, I found, was like Topaz, because it too is fulla Japs--only strange Japs.

Things Heart Mountain have that Topaz ain't--a bath for men, one of the women's is partitioned off for men; snow in June; natural green surroundings, none of that imported stuff for us!; a high school that will knock your eyes out, including a beautiful auditorium as large as any in a metropolitan city (that's no lie, either!); sugar for breakfast wrapped in little packages; a children's playground with metal swings, merry-go-rounds (hand pumped), slides, etc.; canteens that have everything including table lamps at \$1.65; brick chimneys in all barracks and mess halls; and there are other "ain'ts" but I'll take it easy this time.

As you are probably aware by now, the Dies committee has picked your people as its next victim. The committee's dissolution would occur this June 30 unless Congress voted it additional funds and an additional period of life.

The end of the Comintern having removed the force of the "Red Menace" as an argument for the committee's life, it has suddenly discovered that there are 10,000 saboteurs and spies among your people who have been let out on work permits. Also that you are "the best fed civilians in the world," an argument proved by citing the gross amounts of food delivered to your camps each week--but ignoring the number of people whom such food must feed.



I cannot help repeating that a counter offensive by your people is essential if the United States and you are to be saved the consequences of the fascist acts now being urged. You must take steps to acquaint the American public with the fact of the existence of thousands of loyal Japanese Americans who want to serve the war effort with their whole hearts but who are being prevented from doing so by a racist attitude which would do Hitler proud.

There are large groups of Americans whose sense of fair play and whose understanding of the democratic issues at stake will enable them to appreciate your position and to support it. But the time for action is growing ever shorter.

ARIZONA RESTRICTIVE LAW TO BE CONTESTED BY JACL

WRA AIDS JOB PLACEMENT OF NYA STUDENTS

Substantial progress in finding jobs for the young men and women affected by NYA's cancellation of its agreement to provide vocational training in resident centers is reported by the WRA.

According to information received from the Twin Cities, no difficulty is being experienced in placing the 75 youths enrolled in vocational training courses in Minneapolis and St. Paul.

TRAINEES PLACED

Twenty-eight of the young people in training at Salt Lake City who returned to Minidoka are now preparing to leave for Cleveland and Chicago where jobs have been found for them, and efforts are being made to uncover employment opportunities in the Salt Lake area for those who do not want to go East.

From Des Moines, Iowa, it is reported that several Manzanar NYA trainees have been placed, and a WRA relocation supervisor is now in the area looking for schools in which others can continue their training.

FOOD, HOUSING PROVIDED

Those enrolled at the NYA centers who have not yet been placed are being provided with food and housing by the WRA and will be furnished with transportation to the place of employment as soon as job opportunities for them can be found.

BABY CLOTHES

Two large bundles of baby things have been received by the Welfare department from the American Friends Service Committee in Philadelphia, according to Mrs. Brandon Watson.

The bundles contained an assortment of hand-made baby clothes, blankets, sheets and other baby items.

The legality of Arizona's recently enacted law (House bill No. 187) making it almost impossible for persons of Japanese descent to make a living in that state will be contested by the JACL, the Pacific Citizen reported this week.

This law, according to Mike Masaoka, executive secretary of the national JACL, "has created a state in which, for example, a lady cannot buy face powder from a druggist; a dentist cannot do work on persons of Japanese ancestry; and farmers cannot buy crates or boxes for their produce."

Signed by Governor Sidney P. Osborn in March, the law, which became immediately operative, made necessary public notice and a report to the secretary of state of any commercial transaction undertaken with a "person whose movements are restricted by operation of law or by any executive or other order authorized by law, or from a person who is not eligible to citizenship."

CENTER RECEIVES TURKEY POULTS

Five hundred turkey poults for New Year's dinner were received this week by the Agricultural division. More poults are expected next week for the Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners.

The purchase of an additional 42 head of hogs was also announced.

Completion Of Woodshop Near

Construction on the high school woodshop building, which was started about a month ago, is nearing completion, according to Henry R. Watson, chief of the Public Works division. This week work is being done on the wiring and the installation of windows.

Work has also begun on the foundations of the auditorium-gymnasium.

The Kibei team, representing Blk. 12 A, conceded the tilt in the 5th inning to their adversaries.

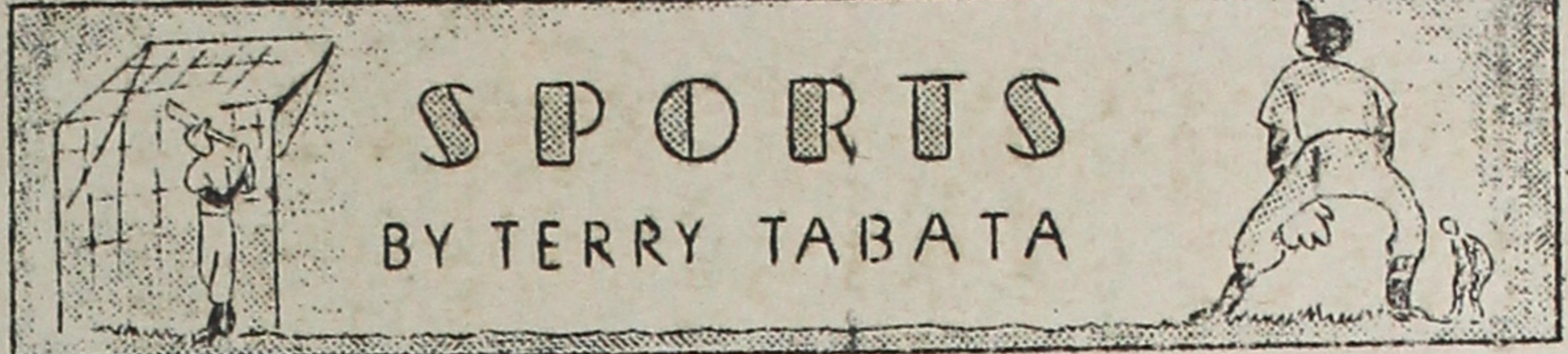
