## ERNST REVEALS FULL DATA ON TSUCHIDA CASE

Following is an excerpt from Charles F. Ernst's letter to the Council on the Tamotsu Tsuchida incident. Tsuchida was removed to the WRA camp at Leupp, Arizona. At the end of 3 months, Ernst will review the case.

\* \* \*

"On June 2, a member of the Administrative staff, while standing in front of the dining hall in Block 20, saw a man approaching who was being chased by another man who turned out to be T. Tsuchida. He was carrying a piece of 2 x 4 lumber about 2½ feet in length with one end shaped into a handle.

### PROTECTION SOUGHT

"The first man asked for protection, and the member of the Administrative staff took him to the Internal Security headquarters and identified the pursuer as Tsuchida.

"The Internal Security officer sent a warden to Tsuchida at Dining Hall 13 to ask him to come to the IS office for an interview. Tsuchida replied that he would only do so if served with a warrant.

### PREVIOUS RECORDS

"I was on my way back from Washington, D.C., and so the matter was allowed to rest until my return on June 7. In looking into the Tsuchida file, I was reminded that he had previously been brought to my attention on two occasions. Once he had assaulted a young fellow resident of Block 13, and he had been brought before the Judicial Commission which reprimanded him, but gave him another chance on the understanding that he would cause no further trouble.

"It appeared to me that Tsuchida was a man who had his own ideas of right and wrong, but instead of ob-

## 2 SENTENCED FOR ASSAULT

In one of the most serious cases of its type reported since the establishment of the Center, 2 issei, Genjiro Morizawa, 53, and Kiyoshi Tanaka, 63, were Tuesday sentenced to jail on assault and battery charges arising from a scuffle between the two which took place June 11.

According to a report released by Project Attorney Ralph C. Barnhart, the combat started when Tanaka hit Morizawa with a rock, knocking him down. Bystanders pulled Tanaka off and attempted to quiet him, whereupon Morizawa pulled a razor out of his pocket and made for Tanaka. In fending off the attack, Tanaka received a rather deep cut on the arm and 2 cuts on the hand.

Since there were 2 separate encounters and neither man was justified in making an assault on any basis of self-defense, the report continued, both were charged with assault with dangerous weapons.

The men were brought to trial at the district court at Fillmore, and both pleading guilty, Morizawa was sentenced to 4 months in the county jail with 60 days suspended conditioned on good behavior while Tanaka received 90 days with 50 days suspended for good behavior.

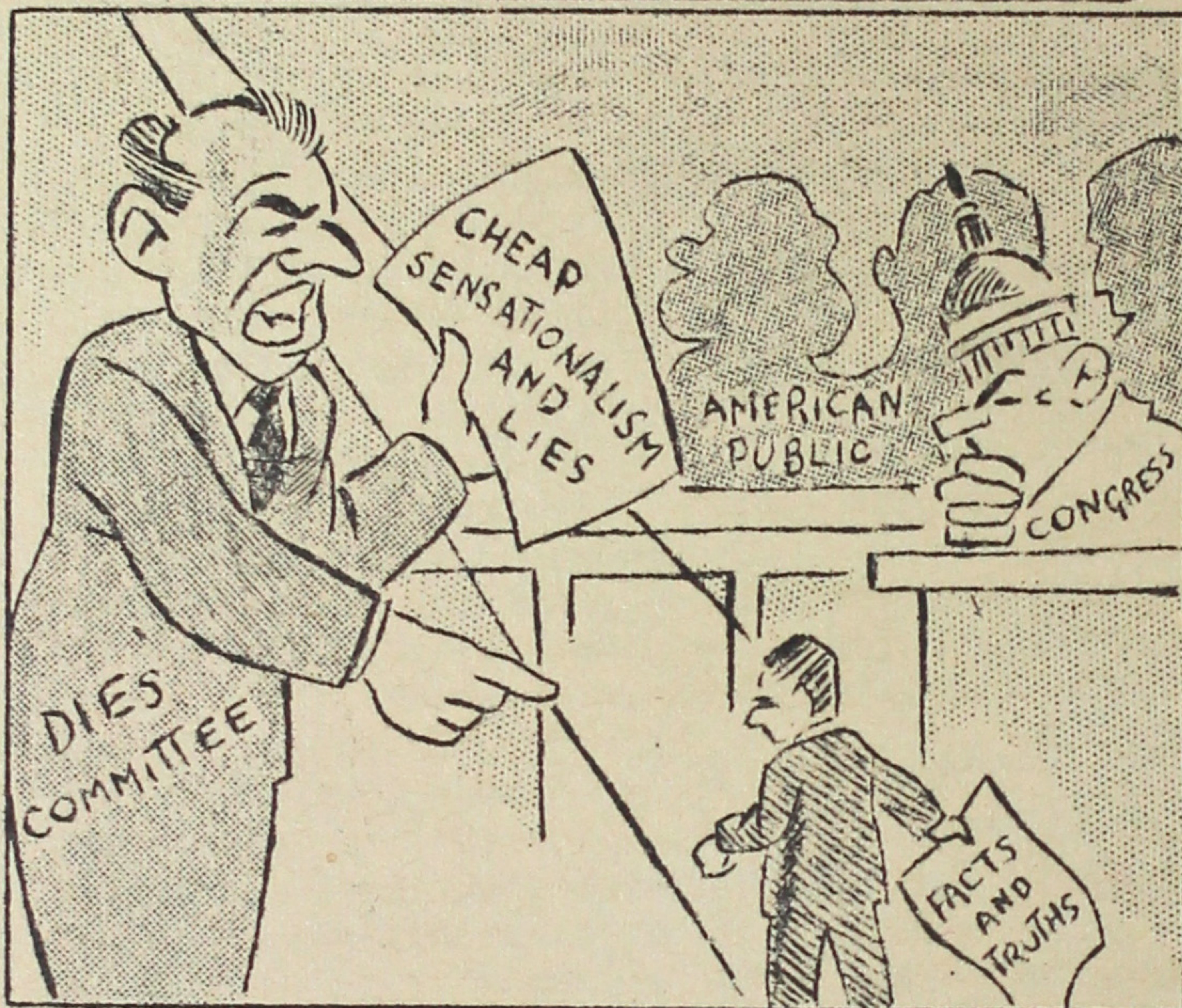

## LITTLE MEN, WHAT NOW?

The following are excerpts from Bill Hosokawa's column, "On the Inside", which appeared in the June 5 edition of the Heart Mountain Sentinel:

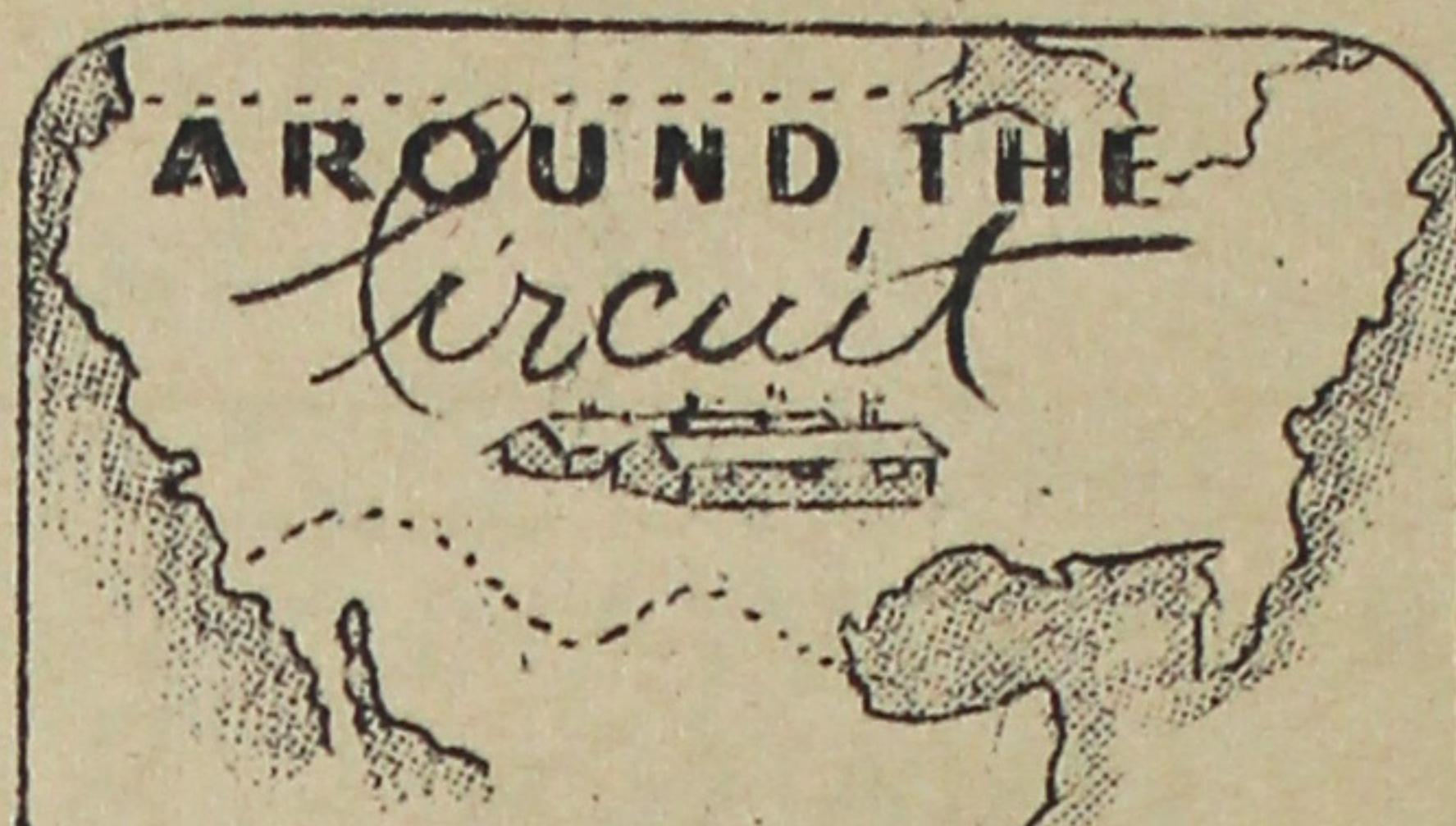
It is time the American people rose in arms against that colossal fraud, the Dies committee on un-American activities. Under pretense of ferreting out the nation's enemies, that committee wallows in fantasmagoria, embezzling taxpayers of their money by using appropriations for witch-hunting. The sum result is not a safeguarding of the nation from internal enemies, but disruption of national morale and dissipation of our energies in internecine strife...

The latest phantoms to be added by the Dies committee to the long list of our etherial foes are 10,000 Japanese Americans who, according to a Dies spokesman, attended a "North American College of Military Virtue" in Japan where they were trained to wreak sabotage upon their return to this country.

The Dies committee has been the objective of public ridicule and official censure. But of this matter we knew too little to comment. Now, however, when Dies looses his human bloodhounds on us, we are in familiar territory and are able to damn Dies for the demagogue he is.

When Dies makes those fantastic accusations against those of Japanese blood in this country, he also hurls charges of gross incompetence and neglect of duty on a number of highly esteemed arms of the government.

...let the record stand for itself. There has not been a single case of sabotage in the United States which can be laid to the nisei or their parents. Nor have charges of disloyalty ever been filed against any nisei in our courts.

## AG DIVISION CALLS FOR MORE WORKERS; PLANTING CONTINUES

Despite an extreme shortage of help, a small crew of 60 to 80 full-time farmers, aided by volunteers from the high school and various divisions, worked night and day for the past 2 weeks to plant thousands of onion, broccoli, cabbage, and cauliflower plants.

Forty-five acres of potatoes will be planted by next week, along with celery, cabbage, bell pepper, egg plant, and tomato plants.

A hundred full-time workers are needed at once to plant carrots, beans, peas, radishes, and spinach by the end of this month, it was reported. Watermelon, asparagus, cucumber and other crops may be discontinued or lessened depending on the number of workers.

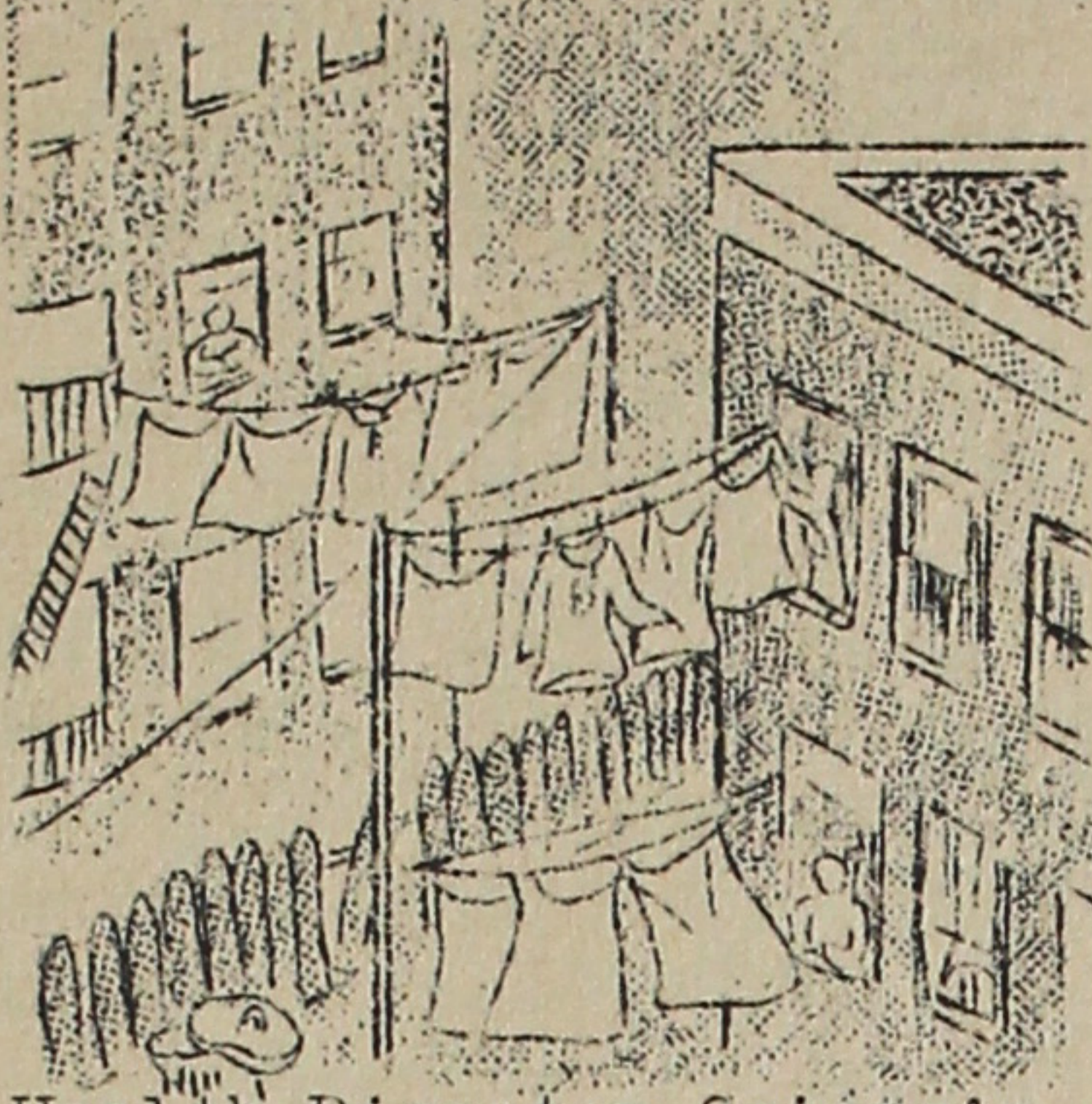

# WOMEN'S MIRROR

It is certainly disheartening to see that certain Pacific Coast dailies still persist in associating all things discreditable with the Japanese, even after they have long since been evacuated. This week we see the San Francisco Examiner, on its front page, flaunting Health Director Geiger's drive on 'Japtown' by a "house-by-house examination of teeming, filth blighted blocks where occupants live and sleep 15 to a room". But the paper does not identify who the occupants are.

All through the article, 'Japtown' is stressed. The fact that Negroes are now residing there is presented with little emphasis. It is a known fact that unfortunate Negroes recruited by shipyard agents in Houston, Galveston, Chicago, Detroit, and other cities, were told "there was housing available for them" in San Francisco.

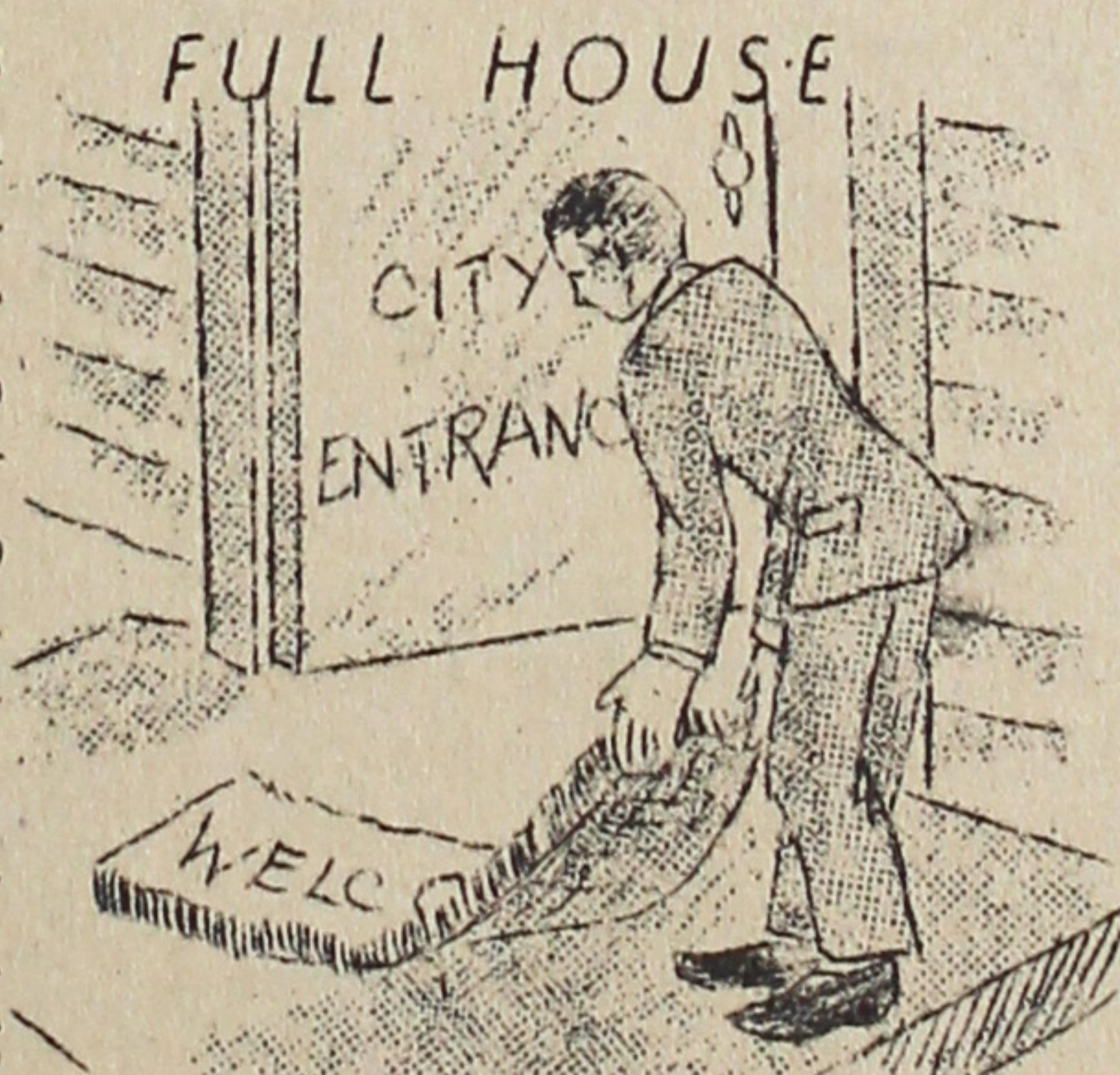
Many Negroes are sleeping in cars, all-night theaters, and cafes, until they are able to strike up acquaintances with other Negroes and go to live with them in already over-crowded quarters.

Before the war while the Japanese were there, the Post Street community never appeared to us as a 'Japtown slum' or a place of filth. The Japanese had neat sunny parlors, and clean kitchens. Many had flower gardens and potted plants, goldfish aquariums and silk paintings.

The present situation, through no fault of their own, is especially unfortunate for our Negro friends. Shunned and rejected from most sections of the city, thousands of them were forced to live in the vacated homes of the Japanese which housed no more than a few thousand prior to evacuation.

Anyway, we wish that the Negro housing problem would be solved soon so that papers like the San Francisco Examiner will stop harping on 'Japtown.'

Friends write to us telling us that certain cities have about as many Japanese, nisei or no, as they can absorb for the time being. They say they may like to move on elsewhere themselves soon, if they find housing. Of these, Salt Lake City and Chicago are two. A friend says: "Am also enclosing a clipping from today's Chicago Sun. (He enclosed 3 clippings all about institutions and organizations threatening strike in order to oust nisei who have joined the staff.) It's too bad that some Americans still persist in branding the nisei as 'treacherous and untrustworthy'. I know such people would change their opinions quickly enough if they gave the nisei a chance to work side by side with them even for a short time. An example is the Shotwell Company where there is absolutely no friction among all workers--white, Negro and nisei."

continued diet of beef heart, liver, pickled mutton, tripe, and tongue, we've become so inured to seeing exotic types of meat at our meals that we won't be surprised a whit if one day the steak on our plate started to neigh.

Somehow or other, though, the eating of horse meat seems to offend custom far more than the eating of, say, tripe. It may be somewhat of a shock to those of our readers who have delicate palates, but we're willing to bet that sometime or other they've eaten horse meat--without knowing it, of course. The reason is that salami, a luncheon meat which is so highly in demand at present that it sells for about a dollar a pound, is nothing but horse meat with some donkey meat and a little pork added.

In Europe, quite unlike the custom here, horse meat is in high repute. Gourmets there declare that the best and most easily digestible meat in the world is that of a colt which hasn't yet been weaned or fed on grass.

Horse meat is said to taste like turkey, while soup made from it is said to resemble chicken broth.

千九百五十七年二月十一日、西印度の小島ネビスに、後年その養はれた國家の主要人物の一人となつた、一少年が生まれた。

# ALEXANDER HAMILTON

On the 11th of January 1757, there was born in little West Indian Island of Nevis, a boy who was to become one of the foremost citizens of his adopted country, and who was to have a large part in determining its Independence, its form of government, and in working out the details of its administration. This was Alexander Hamilton.

His mother died when he was very young. His father was not so situated as properly care for his son, so he was sent to the adjoining island of St. Croix, to live with his mother's relatives who were people of means. He later entered a preparatory school at Elizabethtown in the Jerseys. He then went to New York City, and entered King's College, now Columbia University.

About the time of the breaking out of the War for Independence, Hamilton organized a company of the college students who adopted the name "Hearts of Oak". Later Hamilton was appointed the Captain of the first company of artillery raised in the Colony. He so thoroughly drilled and disciplined it, that the attention of General Greene was attracted. He sought the acquaintance of Hamilton, and spoke most enthusiastically to Washington about him, saying that he was a natural master of men, and a young man worthy the attention of the Commander-in-Chief. As a result Washington made him a member of his own staff. Hamilton became Washington's private secretary. Washington had the greatest confidence in Hamilton's judgment. "So much did Washington value his advice, that when he wrote his "Farewell Address", "acting as every wise man would do under the circumstances" he asked Hamilton for his opinion, as he also asked James Madison for his. Washington desired to get the different points of

view of two large minds, on so important a document.

After the Constitution of the United States had been framed by the Constitutional Convention, a severe political struggle took place to bring about its ratification by the States themselves. There were selfish political interests at work to prevent ratification.

The influence of Alexander Hamilton, through his speeches and writings, so brilliant and convincing, did much to bring the people of the United States to understand the absolute necessity for a strong Federal Union and for a Constitution to safeguard the liberties of the Country. In the State of New York, the opposition to ratification was most violent. But Alexander Hamilton, during weeks of furious debate in the State Convention, spoke again and again in defense of the Constitution. When the weary weeks of contention were passed, the vote was taken; and Alexander Hamilton's arguments had votes enough to carry the ratification of the Constitution. He had saved the day.

After Washington was elected President, and while he was making up his Cabinet, he visited Robert Morris, the Superintendent of Finance during the War for Independence and said:

"The Treasury, Morris, will of course be your berth. After your invaluable services as Financier of the Revolution, no one can pretend to contest the office of Secretary of the Treasury with you."

This flattering offer, Robert Morris promptly declined. He recommended Colonel Hamilton as the Secretary of the Treasury.

"He knows everything, sir!" he replied, "To a mind like his, nothing comes amiss."

Washington then appointed Hamilton to be Secretary of the Treasury. Hamilton took up his duties. The Country and the States were in debt. He

organized the finances of our young and new Nation, putting them upon a sound basis; he provided funds with which to pay the National debt, so that the United States of America "might command the respect of the Nations of the World."

It was Alexander Hamilton who laid the foundations of the financial system of our Republic.

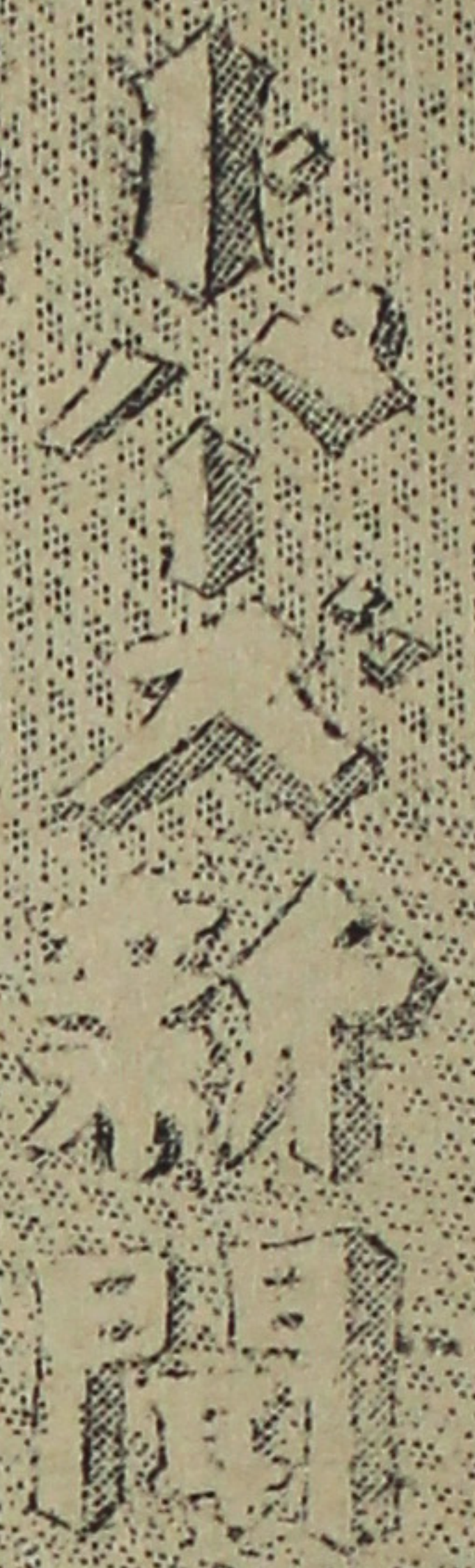
Therefore we must bear ourself more stoutly and reconstruct ourselves and also keep up with this developing world.
