SUCCESSFUL FARM PROGRAM AIDED BY VOLUNTEER HELP

With the volunteer farm work program swinging rapidly into stride, Roscoe E. Bell, agricultural head, assured residents that Topaz will have most of its essential crops planted this year.

Over a million plants will be set this week, George S. McColm, associate agronomist, said, including celery, bell pepper, tomato, and egg plant.

The possibility of a victory garden for each block was predicted for next year by McColm. As soon as irrigation and other facilities are developed within the Project, each block will have an opportunity to utilize every available soil.

A survey of the private victory gardens located mostly along the eastern side of the City reveals that such crops as daikon, radishes, carrots, beets, and spinachs are adapted to the soil.

SIMPLIFIED PROCEDURE FOR USE OF ALIENS IN WAR PLANTS TOLD

Urging full use of all loyal aliens, the War, Navy and Justice departments, and the Maritime Commission jointly announced shortening and simplification of the procedure whereby holders of government airplane and "classified" contracts may obtain permission for hiring aliens within 2 weeks.

A statement signed by Secretary of War Stimson, Attorney General Biddle, Secretary of Navy Knox, and Maritime Commission Chairman Land also emphasized that government contractors may employ aliens as freely as citizens on all other types of work;

and in fact, such contractors are forbidden by Executive Order 8802 from discriminating in hiring because of a worker's race or national origin.

"Even on aeronautical and classified contracts, if a qualified applicant whose services the contractor has no reason to doubt, the contractor is obligated to co-operate with the applicant in applying for consent to his employment," the statement said. It went on to say that failure to employ such an alien is a breach of the contract anti-discrimination clause and contrary to national policy.


