MYER DEFENDS JAPANESE IN RADIO SPEECH

In a short radio talk, Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, defended the position of the Japanese in relocation centers Thursday night.

Appearing in the March of Time program, Myer said, "Not one disloyal activity or case of sabotage has been recorded.

"The vast majority of those in the centers are American citizens and over 72% have never seen Japan.

"Let us deal with them not as Hitler might but in the American way," Myer concluded.

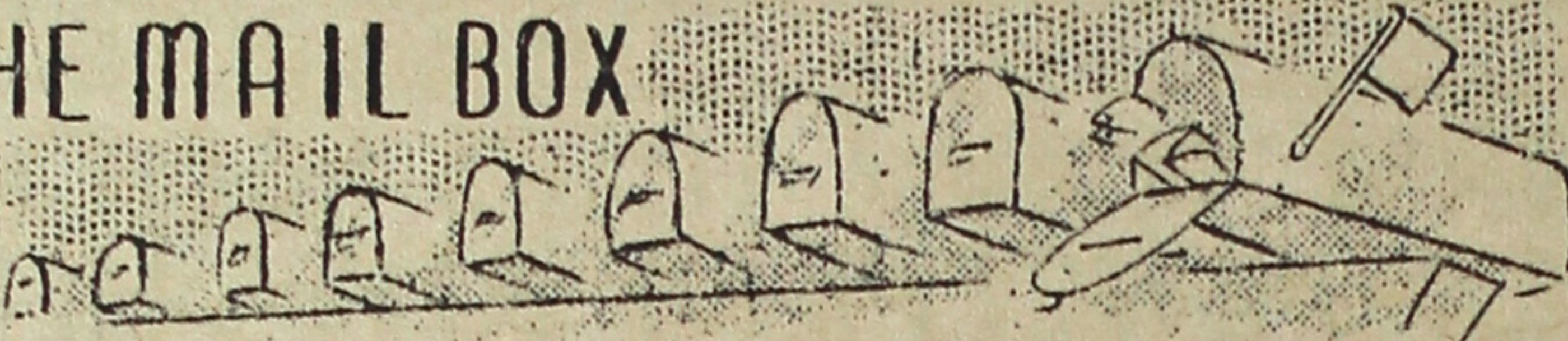

In the Yasui case the lower court which had ruled that Americans of Japanese descent are not citizens was told by the high court to strike out its findings and remanded the case for resentencing.

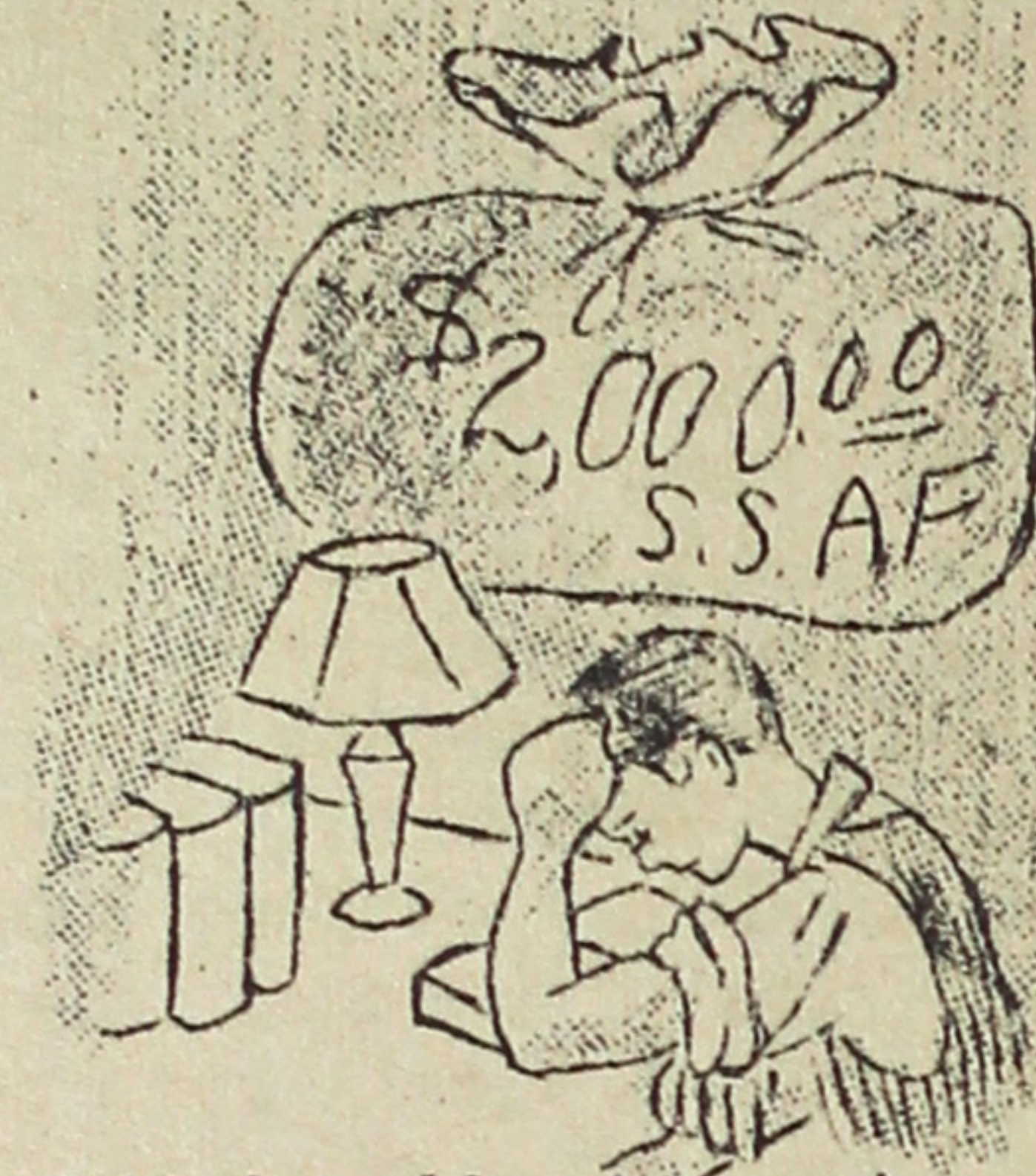

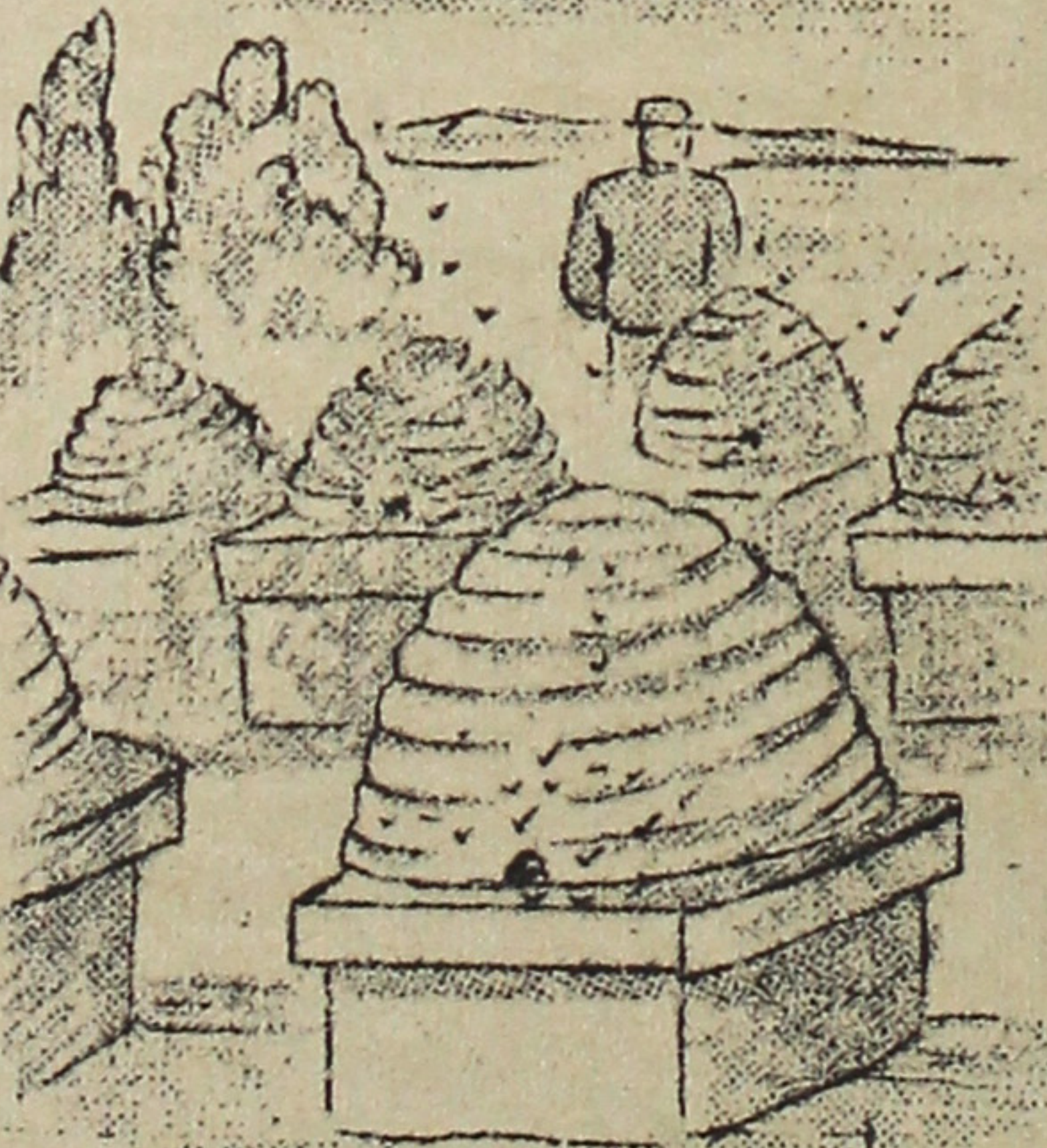

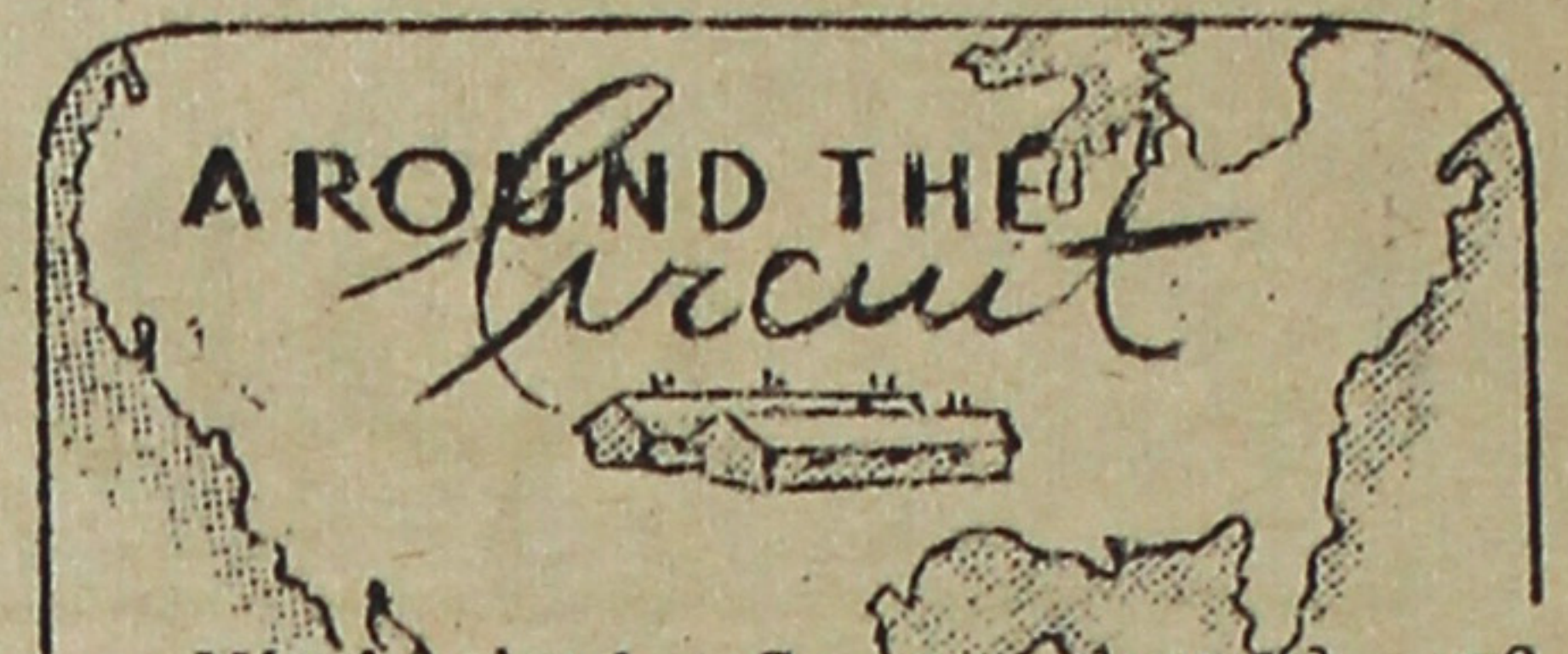

There are 817 evacuees now attending 278 colleges while others are in nurses' training and other schools, C. V. Hibbard, director of the National Student Relocation Council revealed, according to information received in Topaz.

The Topaz school students aided immensely in the planting of the farm crops especially during the last few weeks when workers were sorely needed, it was stated by Roscoe E. Bell, chief of the agricultural division.

The students were called upon to help on the farm due to the extreme shortage of labor and limited planting season. With their assistance, through the co-operation of Dr. Golden L. Woolf, principal of the high school, the residents are assured of having vegetables during the coming months.

"I hope that the students will assist us in future whenever necessary," Bell concluded.

A son of a local resident makes the newsreel!

We were seeing navy-taken newsreel shots of the Attu landings in a movie house when all of a sudden we saw a familiar face of a former Oakland youth, chubby Sgt. Ben Moriwaki, helmet and all, looking up the side of a vessel from a landing barge.

To make sure that we weren't deceived by our eyes we stayed until we had seen the Paramount news over again. Yes, the familiar face was that of Moriwaki whose father and younger brother, Tad, are in the Center.

Correspondents reveals

that the AJ soldier's S. F. Bay region and Fort Sill pals in various parts of the nation went to see the movie and they too were convinced that it was he.

Moriwaki visited the Center last December on a furlough.

A letter written by Moriwaki on June 12 reached here on the 22nd. In parts it read "Just wanted to let you know that all is well up here. Returned to Hq. after a short trip and had quite an experience. You've probably been hearing about it over the radio. Very busy...no town or recreation outside of a show...is really sad (out here). Give my regard to all the folks because I'm

having a difficult time trying to answer all the letters which piled up. Getting along O.K. and am in the best of health."

Another letter was received from an AJ soldier who was reported to have been with Moriwaki and whose rumored death was currently circulated in the Center. At the time of the Attu landing, Staff Sgt. Roy Ashizawa writes, that he was in a field hospital for appendectomy, and that Sgts. Moriwaki and Yoshio Hotta, also of Oakland, came to see him after they had returned from the operations. Ashizawa and Hotta's families are in the Center.

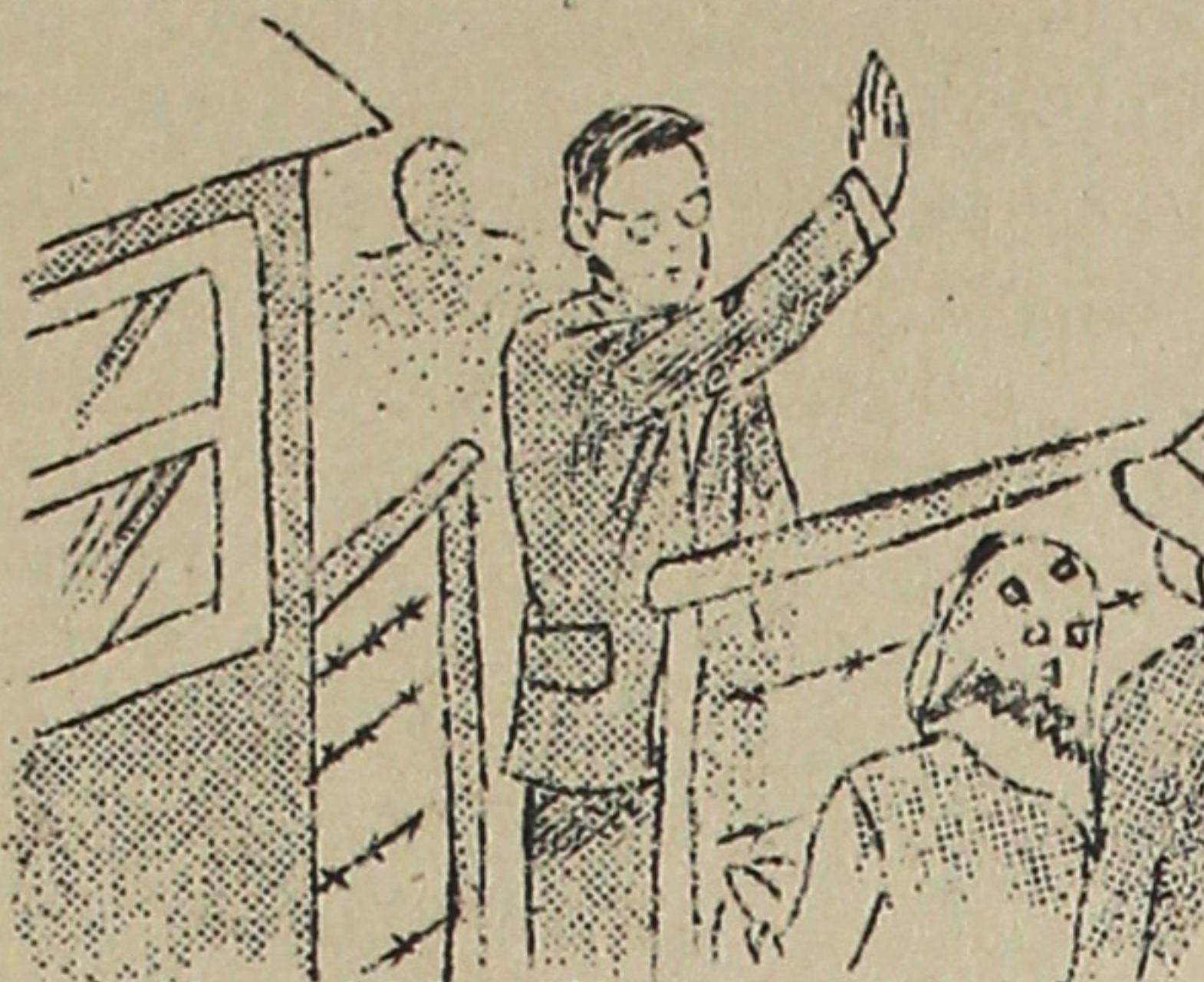

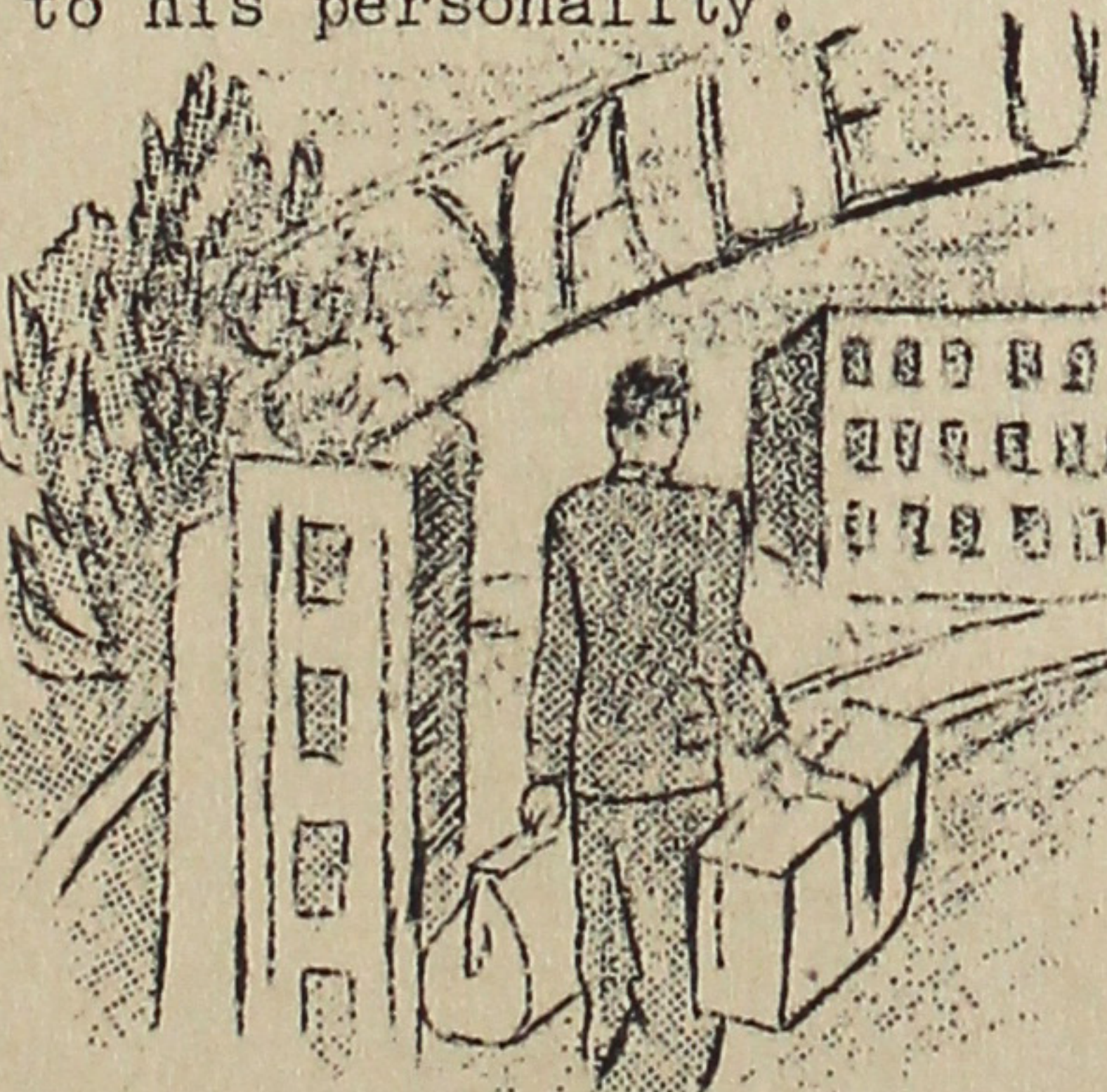

Really, though, the dust isn't so bad--if you are in an air-conditioned, dust-proof house, hundreds of miles away and your hair needs washing anyway!

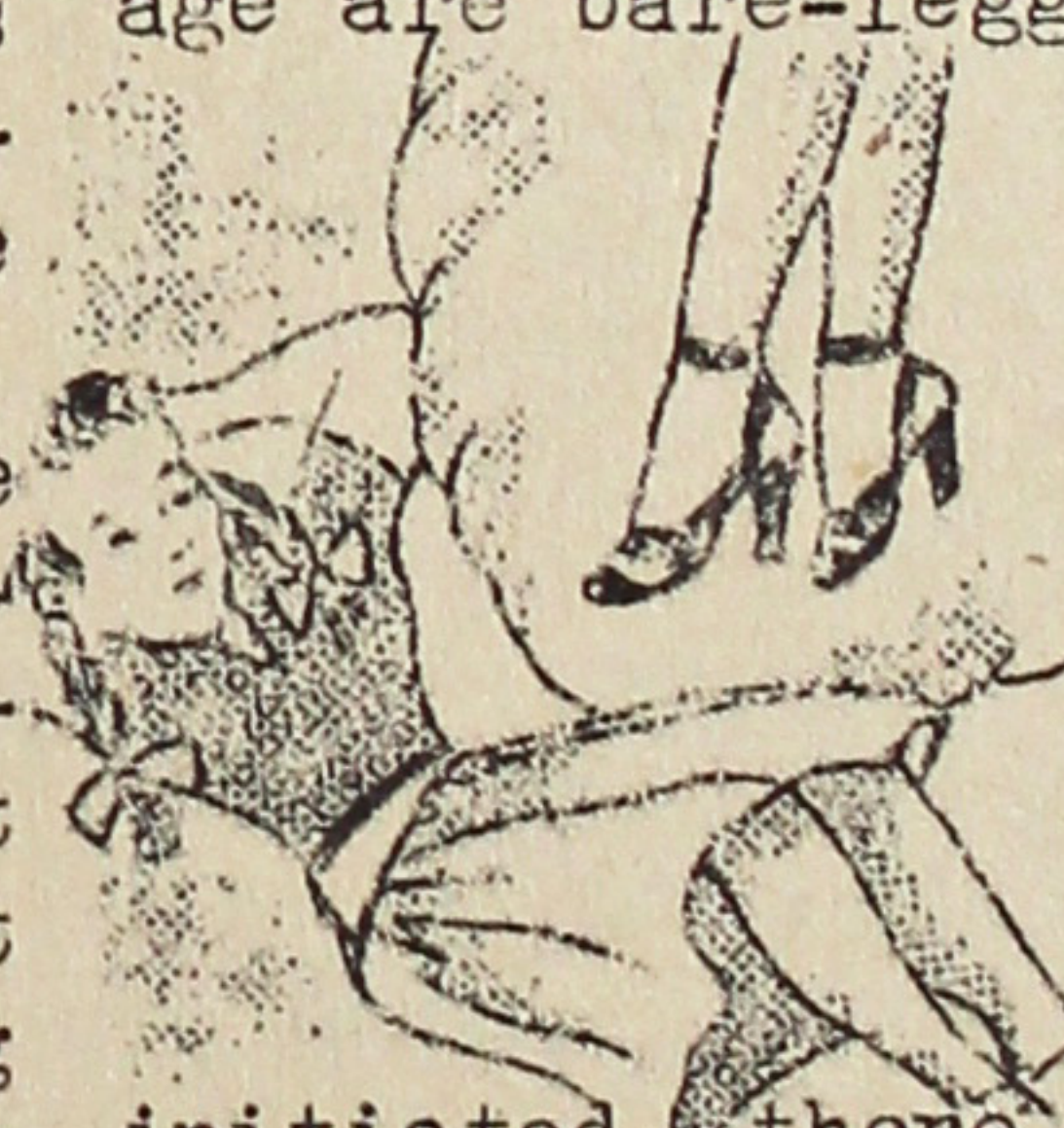

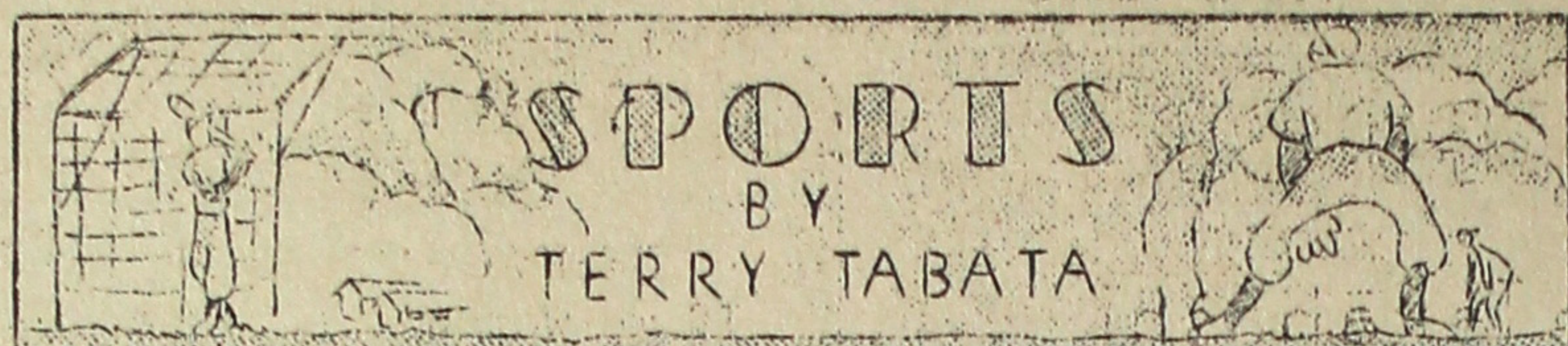
WHISTLES

米國人の敬ふ米國人

フジマール・ウィリアムス

彼が、いつ生れたか誰かな事は判らない。千六百年か千六百七十年頃であらう。其の誕生地も歴史家によつて違ふけれども大体に彼がロンドンで生れ、父は其處で洋服屋を営んで居たと思はれて居り、オリヴァークロムウェルの遠い血縁であつたとも言はれて居る。

若きフジマールは、ケンブリッヂ大學に學び、後、友人なるエドワード・ニコルズの門下で法律の研究をしたと傳へられて居る。彼は法律にも飽足らず、次に傳道者となる爲、勉強した。

彼の苦惱は激烈であつた。荒野を這つて逃亡した其の時の寒氣と飢餓の影響に彼は生涯をまよへた。

彼はインディアン達、マサニ族、カニカス族の間に友人を得た。困窮と不遇の中に在つた彼を救助した。彼は彼のインディアン友人達であつた。

春になり、シコンクに彼は小屋を建て、耕作を始めた。時、プリマスの知事ウィンスローは、彼を驚くして彼に人を遣はし、シコンクはプリマス植民地の境界線内にある事、マサチューセツトベイ植民地と紛争が起るやう

對岸に移るやう忠告した。苦味不平を言はす。彼はシコンクに建てた小屋も一生懸命に耕作した畑も直ちに捨てる準備をした。彼に従つた五人の仲間と獨木舟に乗つて川を下つた。

彼はインディアン小唄とソックス小唄を這廻し、密林をのぐる美しい渺茫たる水面を、ミシシッピ河口に近き、ところまで漕いで行つた。

此處にフジマール・ウィリアムスは再び建設と將來の農作準備とを始めた。彼は「我がなやみの日に、我に賜ひたる神の慈愛深き攝理の感謝記念に」とて此の地を「プロデンス」と名づけたのであつた。

是等婦人労働者により日に行はれる働は、道路工作、架橋、木挽き、建築工、園藝、何百種の家庭の飼育と保護、化学的日乾し生産物の製造、無限の食料品貯蔵と子女の養育である。

労働はすべて共和政で其目的は殆んど女性ばかりの子孫の養育と訓練である。蟻の嬰兒の期間が長い。幼児の時代も随分長い。彼らは自分では何も出来ないばかりか、形も無い。同時に少々氣候が変化しても細心の注意を拂つて保護しなければならぬ程、脆弱だ。幸に彼らの看護婦は健康法を辨へて居る。排水も、湿度も、換氣法も消毒法も、我々なら顕微鏡下で見るやうな梅園の危険もよく知つて居る。實に衛生學の凡てを心得て居るその近隣の衛生状態について、間違ふやうな看護婦は一人も居ない。

こんな不潔に働いても誰も取り乱したりしない。誰もきちんとして清潔で一日に何回となく化粧をする。併し彼らは大抵生れつき、その手頭に奇麗な櫛と刷毛とを持つて居るので、化粧室での時間の浪費はない。

嚴格に自分の清潔を保つその上に、家屋も其家の庭も子供達の爲に、一絲も乱れず整頓して行く。地震、噴火、洪水、又は大戦争以外には何ものにもその日課として居る掃除、拭掃、消毒の作業をさせぬ。

要するに、動物として、黙認されて居るのみである。

女性の特別階級——母蟻候補諸氏——は男性と組織む爲特別な季節は極短時日だけ男性に屈從する。

母蟻候補は働かない。そして結婚生活をしなければならぬが、蟻達は夢にも男性と友情を結ぶことなどは出来ない。それが一番不真面目な時間の浪費だと言ふばかりでなく、男性を言ひ表せぬ程、驚かして居るからでなく、婦人労働者たちは婚姻は無能である。彼は女達は道德的本能によつてのみ女性であり、すべて

の優しさ、忍耐と、我々が母性と稱する深慮とを持つて居るが、その性別は佛教の傳説にある龍女のやうに消滅してしまつた。

捕食動物や、堂々とやつて来る敵に對する武器を彼女達は持つて居る上に、大きな軍勢が彼女達を保護して居る。それは戦隊隊員で体格も族とは思はれぬ程大きい。(未完)

AMERICANS WHOM AMERICANS REVERE

ROGER WILLIAMS

The exact date of Roger Williams' birth is unknown, probably about 1604 or 1607. Nor are his historians agreed on the place where he was born. It is generally thought that he was born in London, where his father was a tailor. He is also said to have been distantly related to Oliver Cromwell. Young Roger Williams attended Cambridge University. After leaving Cambridge, he is said to have studied law under his friend Sir Edward Coke. Then, not being satisfied with law, he studied to become a minister.

PURITANS

In those days in England, many members of the Established Church believed that the Church needed reforming, or purifying. These members were called Puritans. They were severely persecuted. A number of them emigrated from England to Massachusetts Bay.

About a year after the settlement of Boston, a young man came hither from England. He, too, had left home because of religious persecution. He was Roger Williams.

SEPARATISTS

The Puritans of Boston had not actually separated from the Established Church, as had their neighbors, the Separatists of Plymouth; they had merely "purified" their mode of worship. Roger Williams soon electrified them by urging not only separation from the Established Church, but asserting that no Government had a right to interfere with the religious faith of anyone. The place of the Government, he said, was to prevent crime, not to enforce any form of religion.

"SOUL LIBERTY"

Every man had the right to "soul liberty" he asserted.

The Puritans bitterly opposed him. After a few years, since he continued

to preach and teach his beliefs, they tried him in their court and banished him from the Colony.

FLIGHT

In the middle of a New England winter, he was forced to leave his wife, child, and many sorrowing friends, and flee through the snow to safety. He had with him to direct his way only a sun dial and compass. His sufferings were terrible. He never got over the effects of the cold and hunger which he endured on that flight through the wilderness.

He had made friends among the Indians, with Massasoit and Canonius. And now that he was in want and distress, it was his Indian friends who aided him.

SEEKONK

In the Spring, he had begun to build and plant at Seekonk, when Governor Winslow of Plymouth, in the kindest of spirits, sent him word that Seekonk was within the bounds of Plymouth Colony; and in order that there might be no trouble with the Massachusetts Bay Colony, he advised him to move across the water.

Without bitterness or complaint, Roger Williams prepared immediately to abandon the cabin he had built at Seekonk, and the fields which he had so industriously sown and cultivated.

NEW LIFE

With five companions who had joined him there he entered his canoe and dropped down the river. They rounded Indian Point and Fox Point and sailed up a beautiful sheet of water, skirting a dense forest, to a spot near the mouth of the Mooshausick River. Here Roger Williams commenced to build again, and to prepare for future planting. He gave the place the name of Providence, "in grateful remembrance of God's merciful providence to me in my distress."

ANTS

The work daily performed by these female laborers comprises road-making, bridge-building, timber-cutting, architectural construction of numberless kinds, horticulture and agriculture, and feeding and sheltering of a hundred varieties of domestic animals, the manufacture of sundry chemical products, the storage and conservation of countless food-stuffs, and the care of the children of race. (All this labor is done for the commonwealth, no citizen of which is capable even of thinking about "property".)

The period of infancy is long; the children remain for a great while, not only helpless, but shapeless, and withal so delicate that they must be very carefully guarded against the least change of temperature. Fortunately their nurses understand the laws of health; each thoroughly knows all that she ought to know in regard to ventilation, disinfection, drainage, moisture, and the danger of germs--germs being as visible, perhaps, to her myopic sight as they become to our own eyes under the microscope. Indeed, all matters of hygiene are so well comprehended that no nurse ever makes a mistake about the sanitary conditions of her neighborhood.

In spite of this perpetual labor no worker remains unkempt; each is scrupulously neat, making her toilet many times a day. But as every worker is born with the most beautiful of combs and brushes attached to her wrists, no time is wasted in the toilet-room. Besides keeping themselves strictly clean, the workers must also keep their houses and gardens in faultless order, for the sake of the children. Nothing less than an earthquake, an eruption, an inundation, or desperate war, is allowed to interrupt their daily routine. (Cont)
