The work daily performed by these female laborers comprises road-making, bridge-building, timbercutting, architectural construction of numberless kinds, horticulture and agricultrue, and feeding and sheltering of a hundred varieties of domestic animals, the manufacture of sundry chemical products, the storage and conservation of countless food-stuffs, and the care of the children of race. (All this labor is done for the commonwealth, no citizen of which is capable even of thinking about "property".)

The period of infancy is long; the children remain for a great while, not only helpless, but shapeless, and withal so delicate that they must be very carefully guarded tely their nurses undereach thoroughly knows all that she ought to know in regard to ventilation, disinfection, drainage, moisture, and the danger of germs -- germs being as visible, perhaps, to her come to our own eyes under the microscope. Indeed, SEPARATISTS Without bitterness or all matters of hygiene are conditions of her neighborhood.

Inspite of this perpetual labor no worker reher toilet many times a day. But as every worker is born with the most beautiful of combs and brushes attached to her wrists, no time is wasted in the toilet-room. Besides keeping themselves
