## CARNIVAL

### \$2000 PROFIT DISTRIBUTED

Grossing \$3,290.11, the Fourth of July carnival netted \$2,053.40 after deducting expenses for supplies and prizes, it was revealed today by Fred Koba, festival chairman.

Expenses for the fete amounted to \$1,236.71, according to Sasate Yamate, finance division head.

A total of \$1,691.32 was given to the Student Scholarship Aid Fund, \$1,-500 from carnival profits and \$191.32 from private sales and special events sponsored during the week end. 25% of the net profit was divided among the concessions.

Following are the sums contributed by the special groups: coronation ball, \$17.25; sewing school, \$25; art school, \$23.55; artificial flowers, \$26.20; adult entertainment, goh, and shogi, \$15.96; softball games, \$40.28; and commercial sewing, \$20.19.

The festival committee allocated \$40.90 to the maintenance and operations division of CES, and set aside \$12.50 for a theater party for carnival participants.

## Field Director Visits Center

E. D. Whitaker, field assistant director of the WRA visited the project Tuesday.

Whitaker, supervisor of the two Arkansas centers, inspected the setup here and conferred with administrative officials. He expressed special interest in the high school construction and farm project.

He left for Minidoka yesterday.

The WRA has called a meeting of all project directors to be held at Denver, Colorado, July 26 and 27, to consider the whole matter of persons who have repatriated and those who are to be assembled at a segregation center.

## WORKERS LEAVE FOR OGDEN CAMP

The first contingent of 78 young women workers departed from Topaz yesterday for the FSA operated work camp at Ogden.

These workers will be employed in the 10 or more canneries in the Ogden district.

Miss Eleanor Gerard, vice-principal of the Topaz high school, accompanied the girls where she will assist in the organization of leisure time activities for the group. While in Ogden, Miss Gerard is expected to obtain the services of a couple to act as permanent camp counsellors, similar to the setup at the Provo camp.

With four large CCC buildings to serve as dormitories for 300 persons, the camp is in excellent order, according to Placement Officer William Campbell, who returned from an inspection visit of the camp Monday.

The co-operative kitchen is well-equipped. Cooks will be provided to serve meals to workers at cost, it was reported.

## CAMPER GETS APPENDICITIS

Thirteen-year-old Sammy Nakashige's sudden appendicitis attack aroused campers at Antelope Springs late Tuesday night.

D.E. Johnson, high school biology teacher, drove the boy to the Topaz hospital where he was operated on next morning.

Young Nakashige is now recuperating, it was reported.

Also, the welfare section has established a special department in rec 23 to give all persons who have requested repatriation or have answered negatively to question #28, and who may be puzzled over any point, a chance to discuss these matters.

While the information received from the Washington offices of the WRA set June 1, 1943, as the deadline for cancelling repatriation requests and changes to question #28, persons affected should visit the welfare office and indicate this fact, so that they may be notified if any new instructions are received on this point.

"It will be helpful to project directors attending the Denver conference to have as complete a list of questions that are in the minds of the residents as possible," said Charles F. Ernst, project director.

He added that 8% or about 600 residents would be affected by the segregation order to be carried out by September 1.

# CIO REQUESTS INFORMATION OF EVACUATED MEMBERS

So that the CIO can get in touch with the residents who have been or now are members of any affiliated labor union, it asks that such residents send their names and addresses to the National CIO War Relief Committee, 1020 Vermont Avenue, N.W.; Washington, D.C.

Names and addresses of other Japanese-American CIO members on leave or in the army are also requested.

The CIO has informed WRA that "it is anxious to be of service to its members in problems of employment, job security and placement, as well as problems of housing and security when Japanese-Americans move into new communities."

By maintaining contact with individual members, the CIO committee states, it will be able to counsel on job opportunities and to help build favorable labor sentiment in advance of the time they enter a new community.



ウアイタミン A B C を多く含み、今日重要な野菜として一般に用いられるトマトは、始め南米ペルーに産し、主として墨國土により珍重がられたと云ふことである。欧洲に於ては、観賞植物として栽培されたが伊太利人により始めて好食料品として認められ、盛に地中海沿岸地方に栽培された。次ぎて英、佛、獨、諸國に移植され半ば食料半ば觀賞用として作られた。米國に於て其價值を認められたのは、一七八一年頃と云はれてゐるが、一般に重要作物として栽培するに至ったのは、一八七〇年である。最初他から買入れたのである。一九二五年の米國産額は、全額として六千一百万丹に達し、商業罐詣、ラーブル用共に需要を激増、今日はトマトジュースとしても、一般に保健上飲料として愛用さ
