

REPORT FROM TOKYO TRANSLATED

seph C. Grew's "Report From Tokyo" has been translated into the Japanese language by the Japanese American Committee for Democracy and is ready for release, according to a circular from the group.

This is the first book to be published in America in the Japanese language since Pearl Harbor, and it will be available shortly for \$1.25.

Written by former Ambassador Grew upon his return to this country from 10 years of service in Ja-

Former Ambassador Jo- pan as the representative book was issued last November so that the whole American beople might have the benefit of his knowledge and experience in Japan, and could have a picture of conditions in that country today.

The book has been read in English by thousands of Americans, and became a best-seller immediately. In the Japanese language, "Report From Tokyo" will have an equally widespread interest for the issei and kibei, it is believed.
