## VOLUNTEERS AID HARVESTING OF PROJECT CROPS

Before the anticipated frost can injure to great extent the crops planted on the project area, steps are being taken to harvest as much of the farm produce as possible, according to the farm section.

More than three fourths of the tender crops have been harvested to date with the aid of volunteer workers and high school students.

There is a sufficient supply now of the following crops for center consumption next month: green and dry onions, cabbage, swiss chard, nappa and melon pickles. About 1,600 lugs of tomatoes have already been picked.

Celery, potatoes and broccoli are growing rapidly. There will be sufficient celery to supply the needs of residents for November and December. Potatoes are expected to mature a satisfactory crop for harvest in November. Broccoli will be harvested this week.

## WATER MAINS REPAIR SOUGHT

Cognizant that the damaged water system in the project must be repaired before the advent of the freezing season in approximately 6 weeks, the administration, in conjunction with the community council labor committee and labor crews, conferred yesterday morning to work out a practical solution to the difficulties.

It was determined that a regular crew of 30 men is necessary to commence the repair of water mains immediately. The support of residents, including the Tule Lake arrivals, is

The third group of transferees from the Tule Lake center, including 529 persons, will arrive at Delta station at 6 PM today, according to a telephone report from Roscoe E. Peil, WRA representative, in Ogden at 1:30 this afternoon.

Induction and medical examinations will be conducted at rec 4 as before. Rec 3 will be devoted to inspection of hand baggage.

The new arrivals will be housed temporarily in 14 rec halls tonight until permanent quarters are made available for them tomorrow afternoon.

## 476 IN FINAL TOPAZ CONTINGENT

Comprised of 476 persons, the final contingent of Topaz segregates will leave tomorrow noon from Delta for the Tule Lake center. Accompanying the group will be George H. Lafebregue who has been segregation officer here for the past two months.

With the completion of the segregation program here 1471 residents will have left this center to be exchanged for 1489 new residents from Tule Lake.

Blocks affected on this trip include 3 through 28. All transferees will gather at their respective dining halls to prepare for their departure tomorrow morning from 8:30 o'clock.
